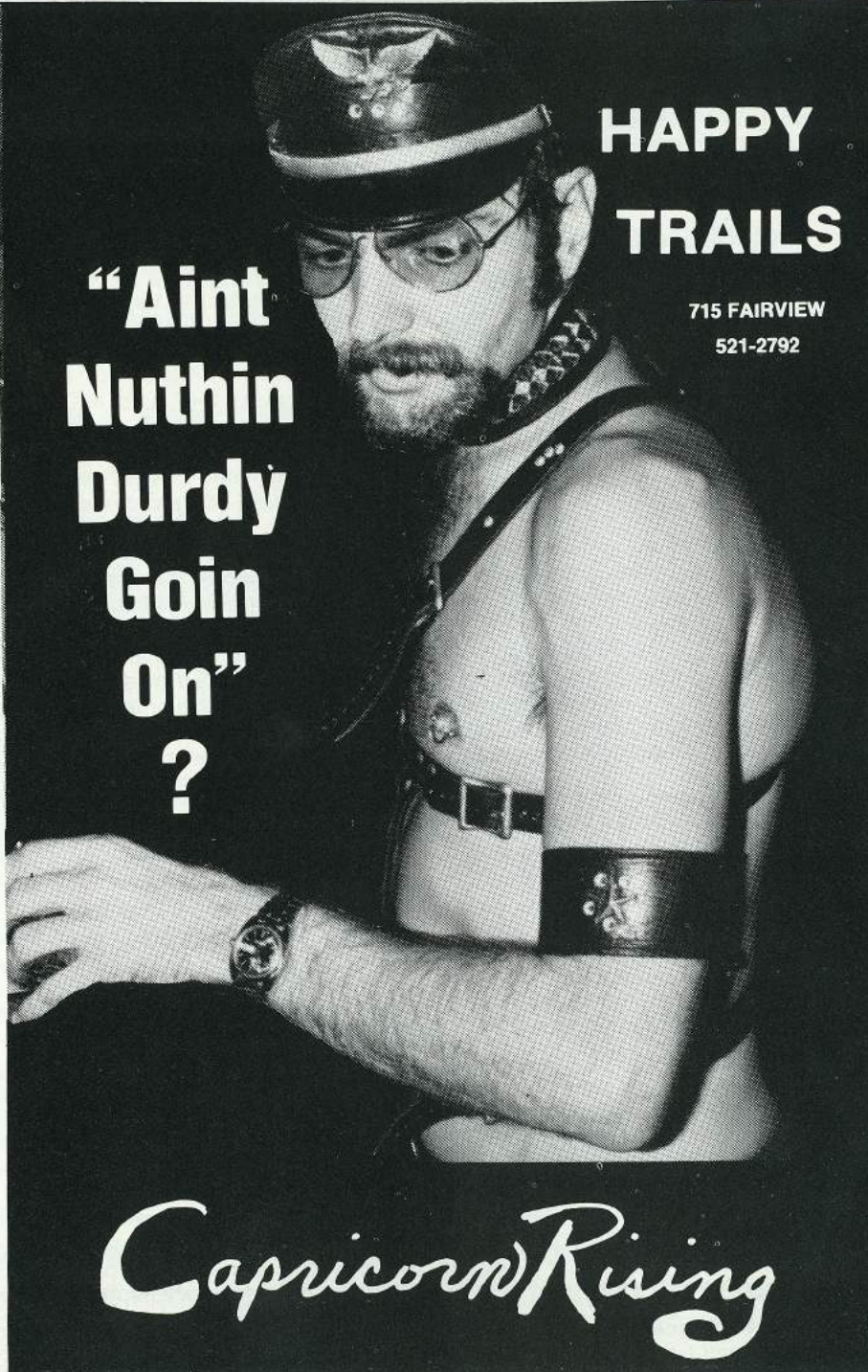

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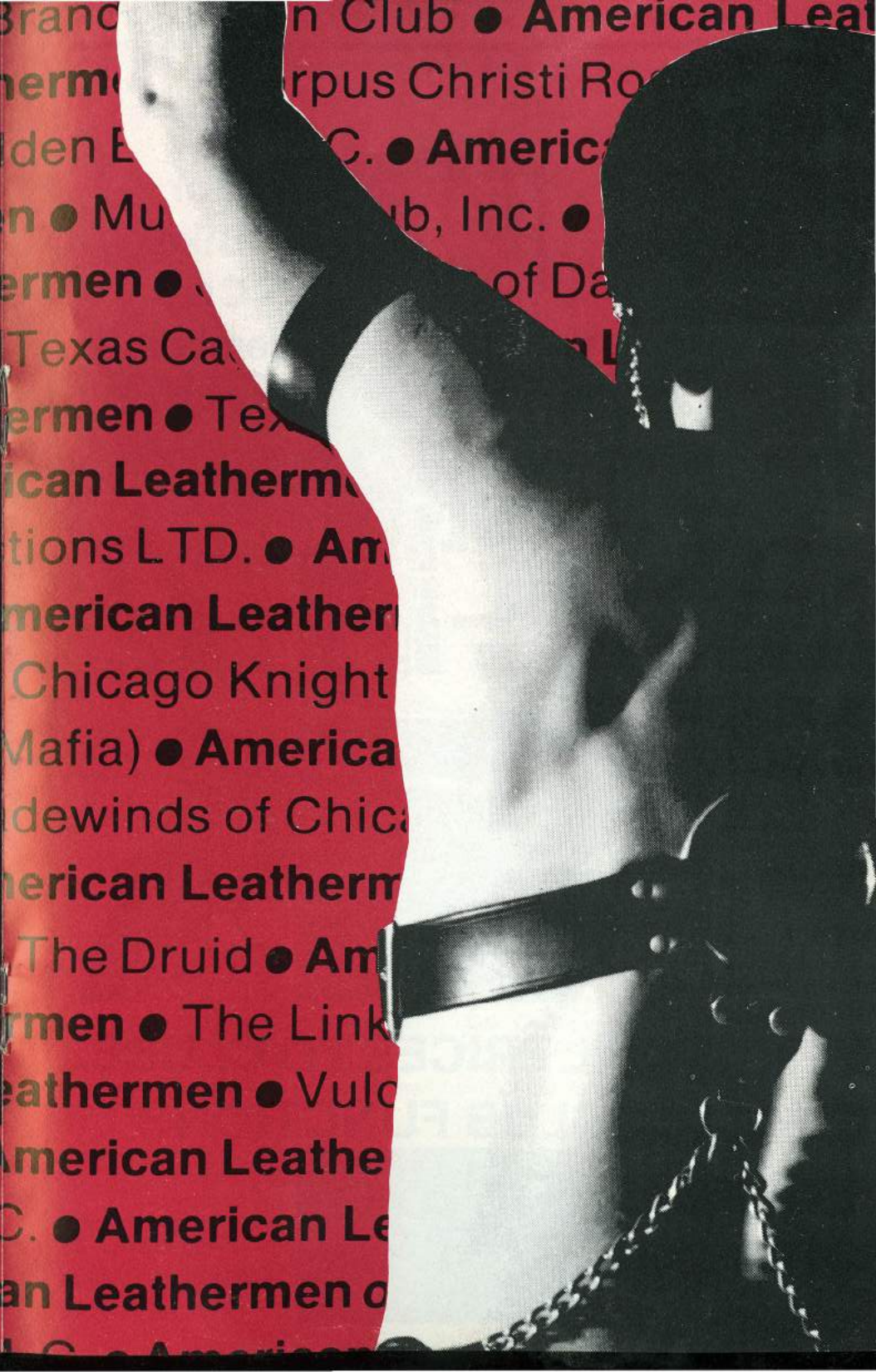
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KNIGHTS OF MALTA ASSEMBLY '82

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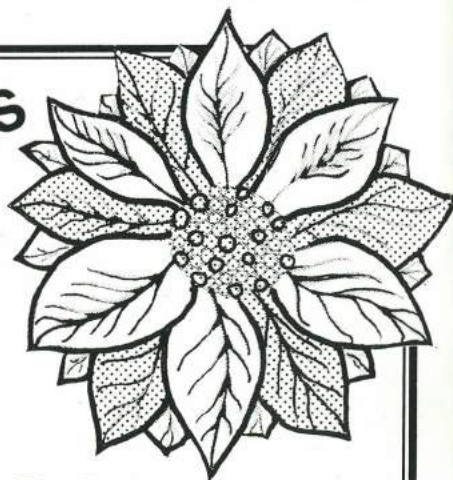

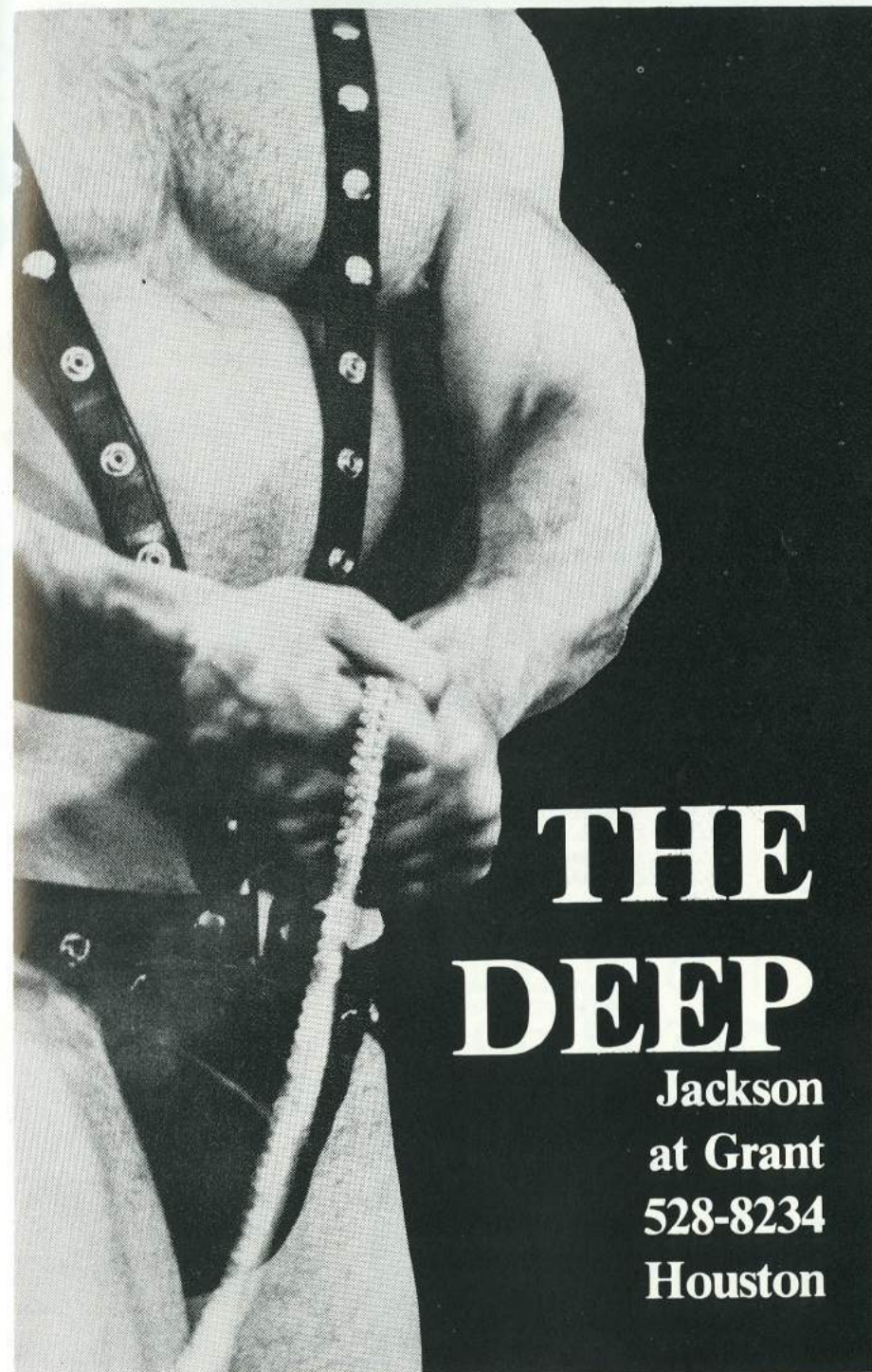
Lost Angels

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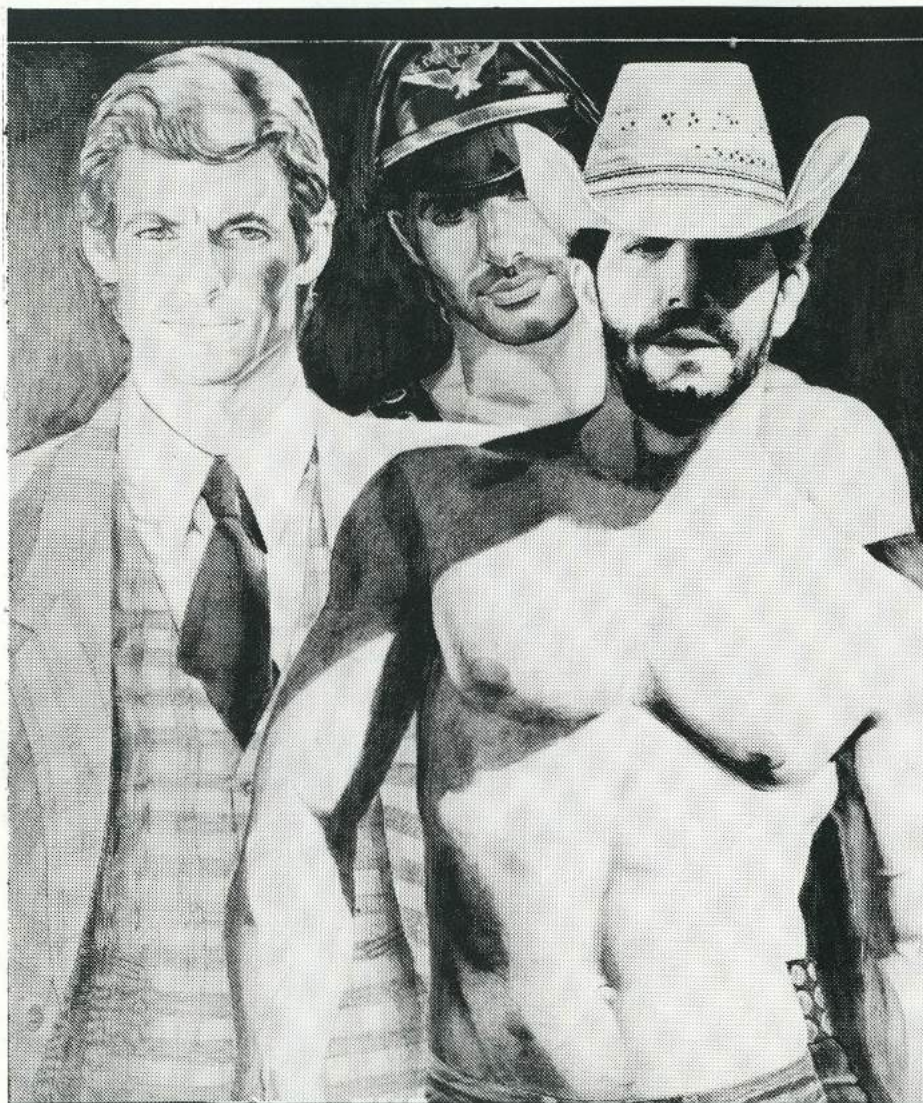
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
