That's all from Cleveland. If anybody has information on anything else from Cleveland or anywhere else in Ohio please let me know.

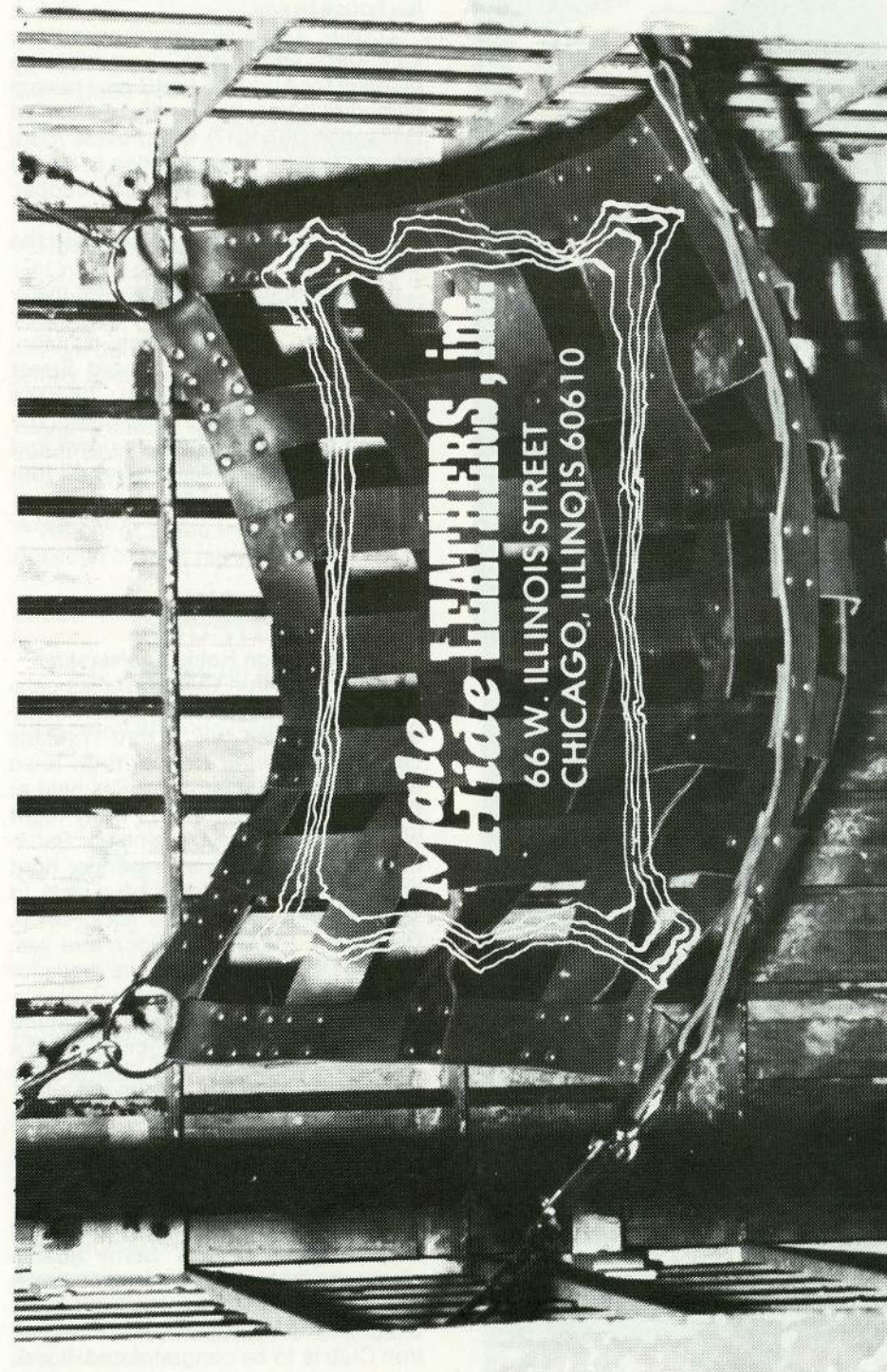

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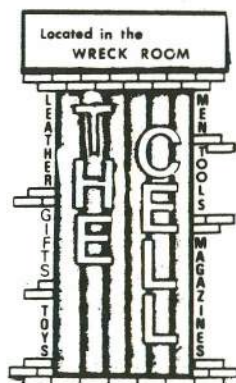
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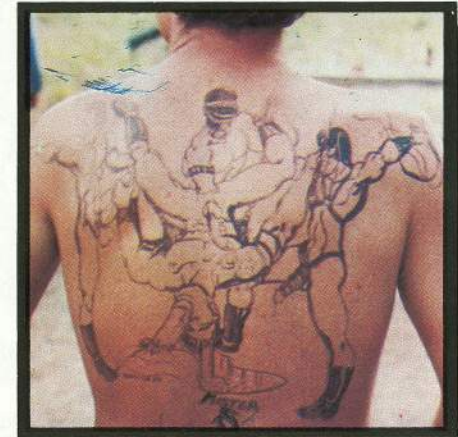
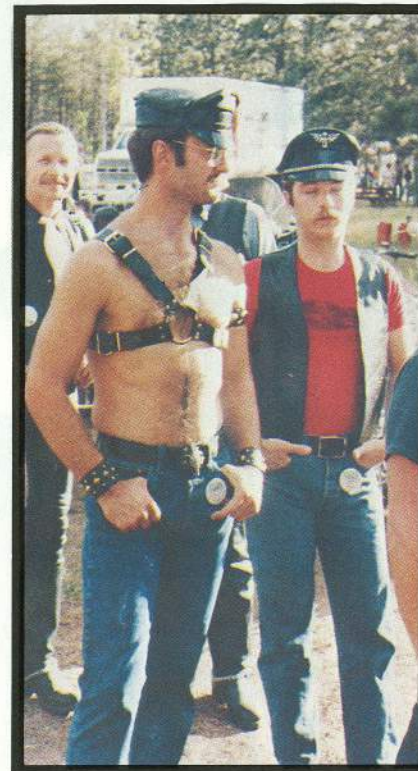
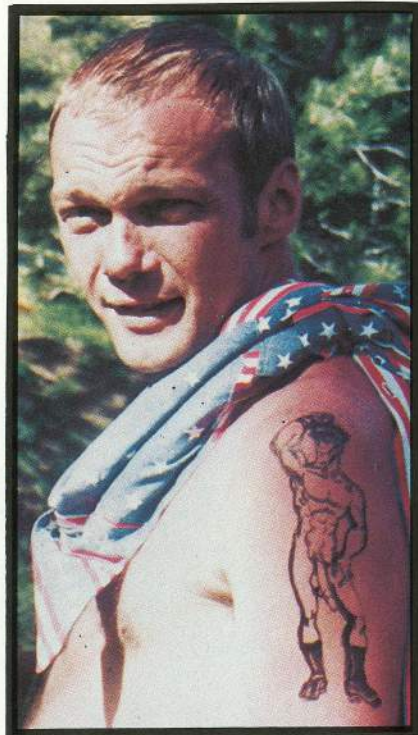
(Great Fuckin' Run)

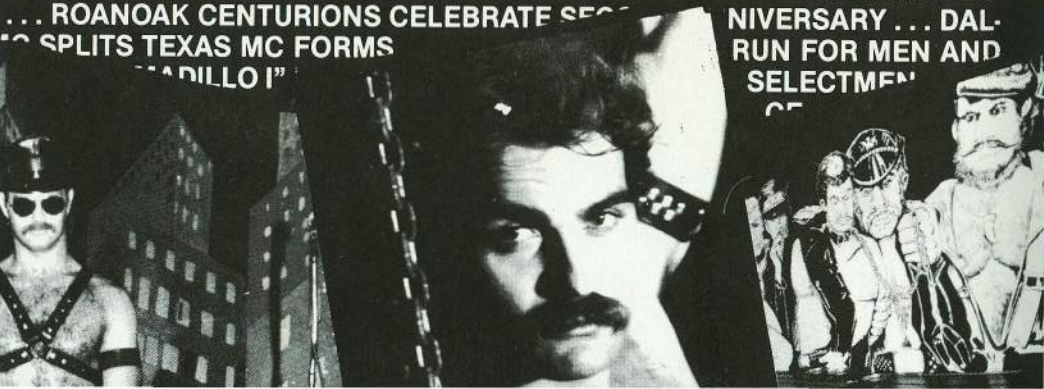

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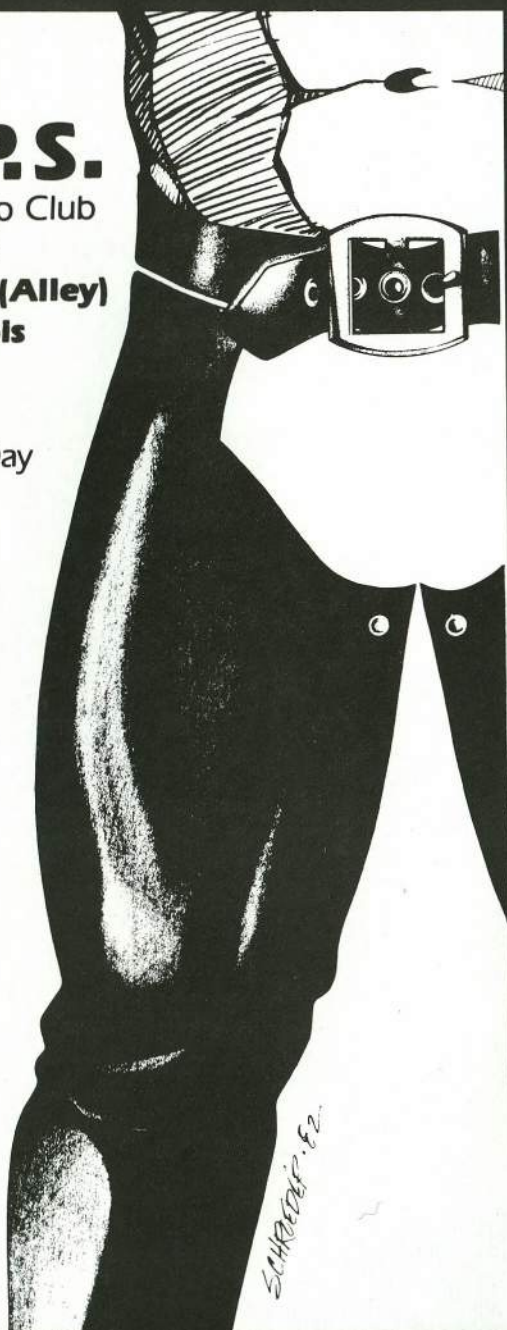
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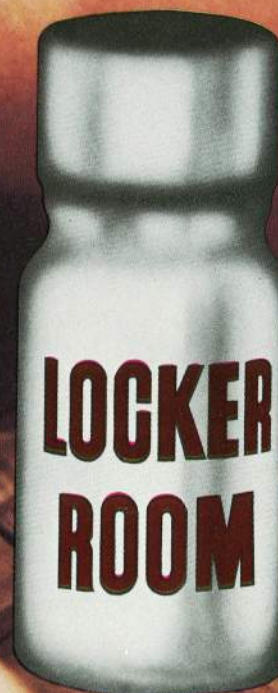

For those still able to function, there was a little bit more left. Partners served still more drinks and more food at a late-afternoon "winding-down" party and the Filling Station was the scene of farewells during its finale Sunday night.

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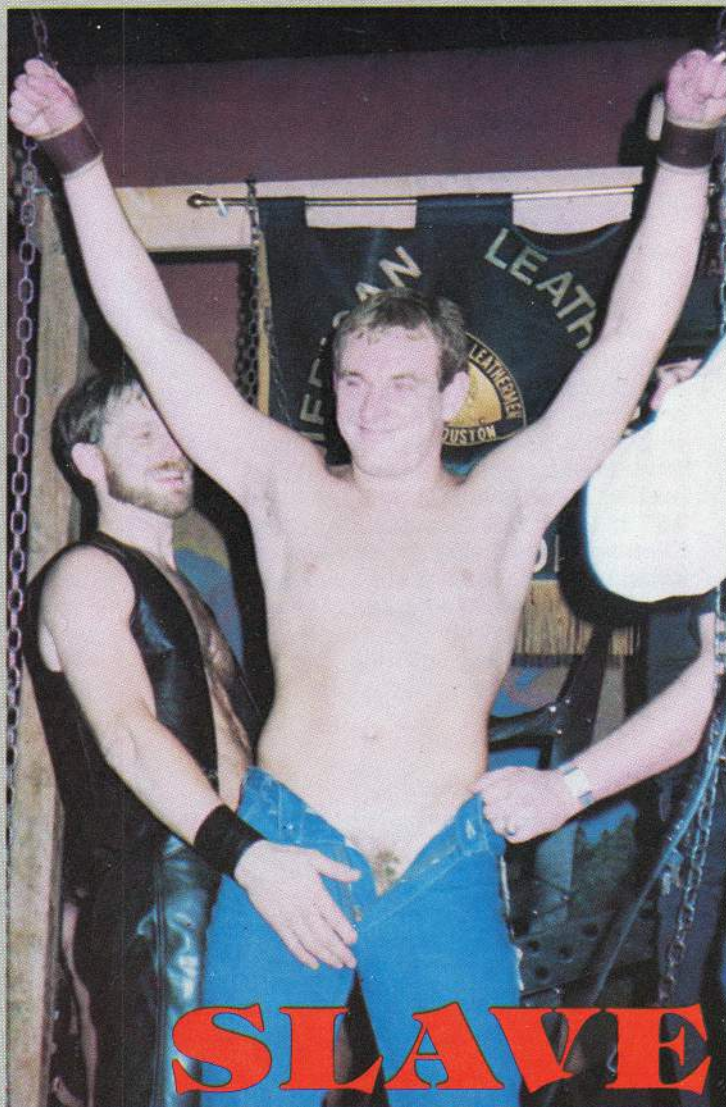
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SLAVE AUCTION

Eyes popped and levis bulged as Dungeon Masters Ron Nash and Steven Meert led the chained and collared, hunky and horny slaves through the bar to the holding pen behind the rack. Alan Lipkin and Lewis Pace had been interviewing for weeks to select this hand-picked group of 19 men.

To bring the total to 20, add Miski, special guest slave from the Rocky Mountaineers of Denver. Miski, clad in full leather, turns many heads and she can handle her bike like Evel Knievel.

Following opening greetings and remarks by special guest Colt Thomas, International Mr. Leather, 1983, professional auctioneer Eldon Spencer took over the stage

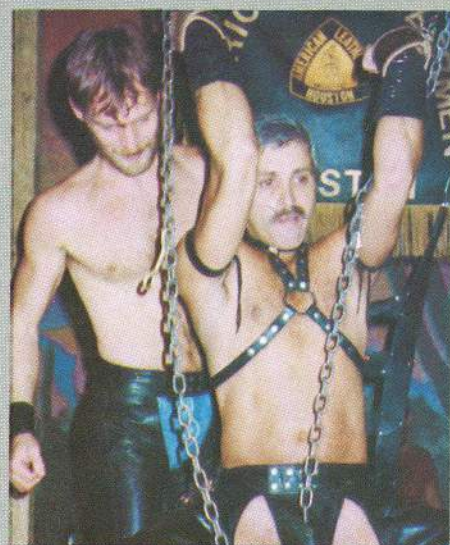
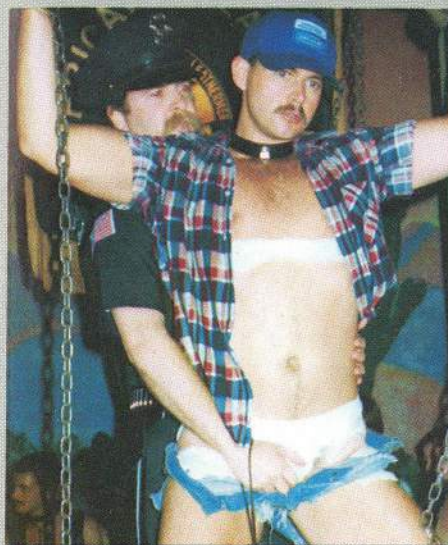


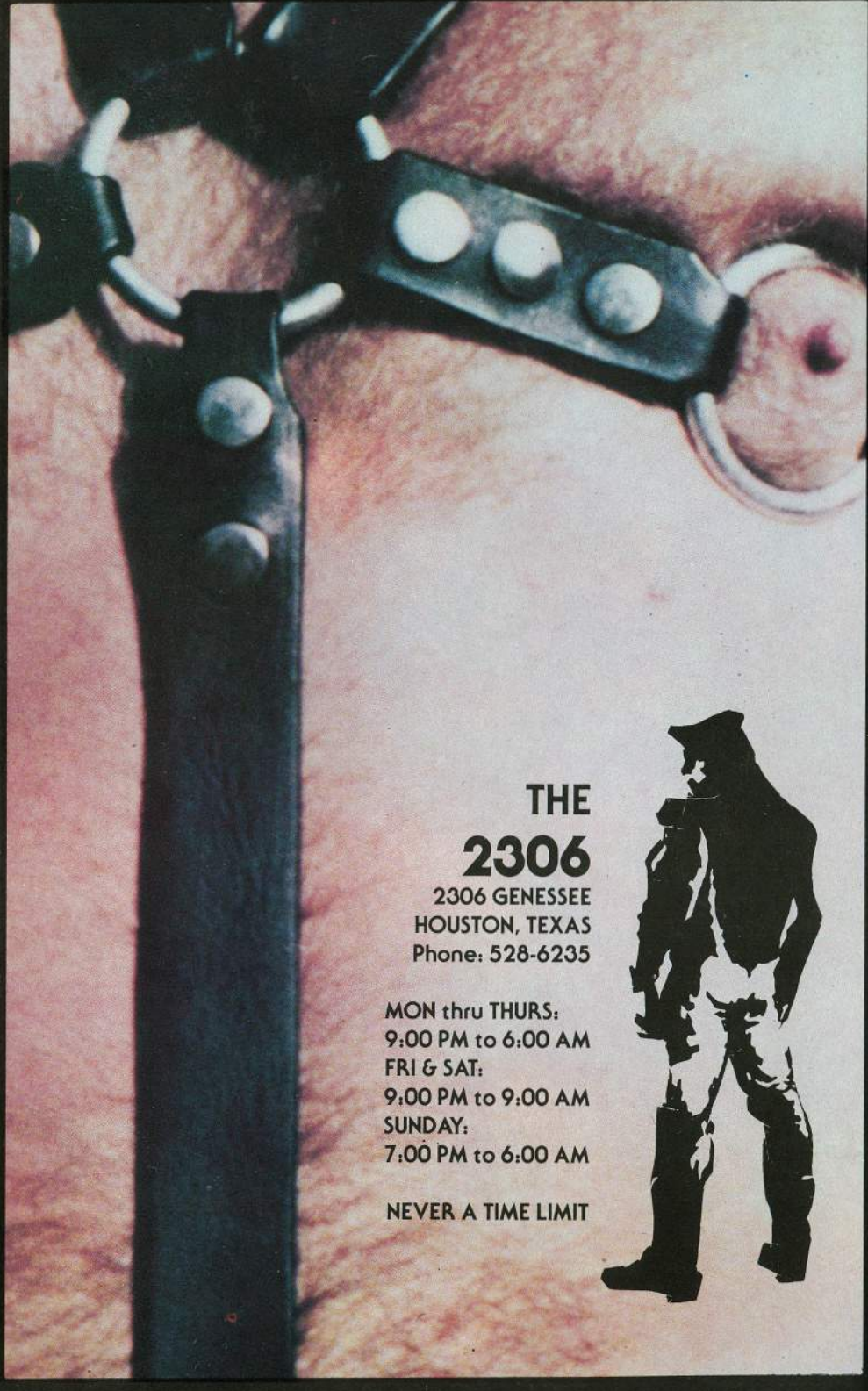

While she didn't place in the top three, Miski did cost Becky of the Colt 45's \$300.

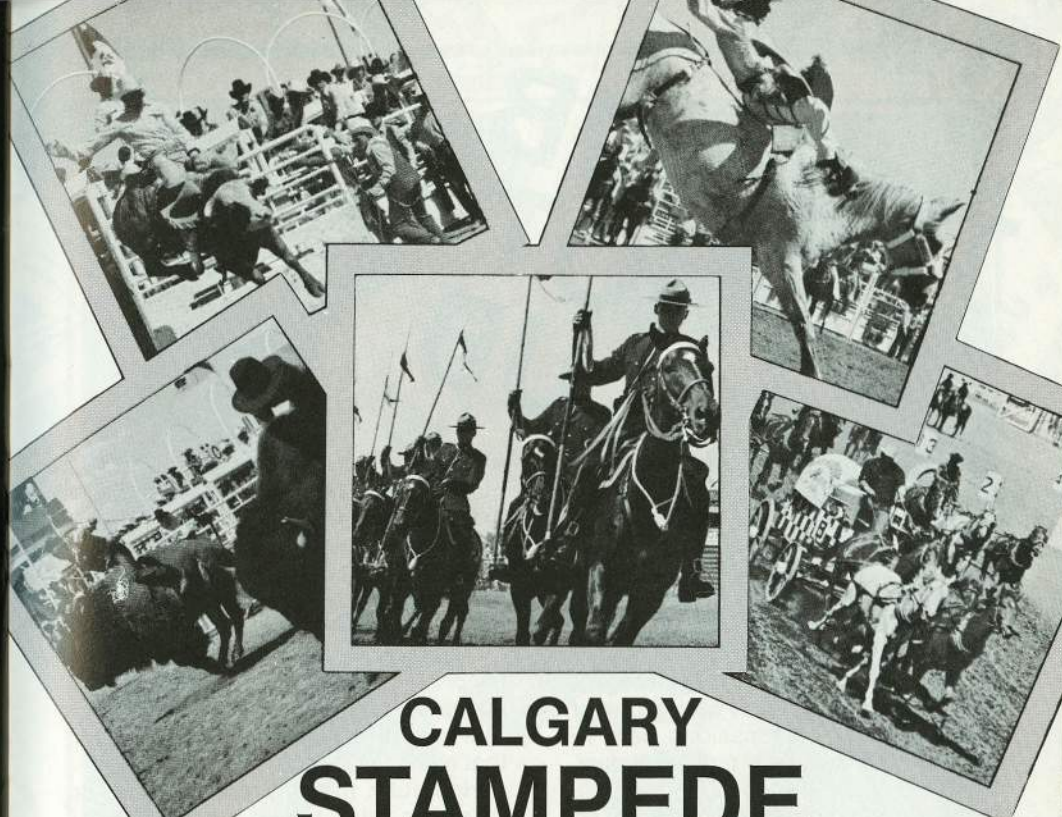


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CALGARY STAMPEDE

"Hey! Hey! We're off to the rodeo. Greatest of them all." So sings the western singer of the largest outdoor show on earth, The Calgary Exhibition and Stampede. For ten wild days of western fun in early July each year, this city of 700,000 people plays host to visitors from around the world; its population almost doubling in size.

Whatever your interests (sordid or otherwise), each day is packed with chuckwagons, breakfasts, square dancing in the streets, parades of Mounties, Indians and cowboys. The Stampede hosts world championship rodeo, chuckwagon races and stage shows with star celebrities with each day ending in dazzling fireworks against the dramatic backdrop of the city's skyline and the rugged Canadian Rockies.

If you aren't lucky enough to cuddle up with a cowboy in the hay of the horse barns, the bars host a special fun event each day of the Stampede from pancake breakfasts to hot air balloon rides over the city.

The night air may cool off when the sun goes down, but a new heat starts rising on the bar scene. Hot studs strut their stuff as they seek the title of Mr. Gay Stampede-Calgary. "Clubs are no longer needed. They're passe and dying. And don't quote me."

Speaking was a friend during one of those marathon discussions held to solve all of the world's problems overnight.

My friend's contention was based upon the original function of MCs. Gay leathermen were (and to a surprising extent, still are) regarded with a great deal of suspicion and fear by other gays and, it was therefore, a little difficult to meet other men into the scene. Originally, he argued, MCs were the best way to meet other men into leather—an escape from the sweater crowd that dominated the gay bar scene in the '60s.

The attraction then seemed to be that you could, by joining, get it on with all those hot leathermen in the club. A peripheral consideration was the idea of being part of an elite crowd; a fraternity bound by leather, pubic hairs and (sometimes) bikes.

My friend's reference stemmed from the mores of those times before social and sexual contacts with men into leather were met commercially by bars and other businesses.

Conceding the point that MCs no longer had a monopoly as the way to meet men into leather, I posted the argument that many clubs were now

meeting other needs that haven't (can't or won't?) be met commercially.

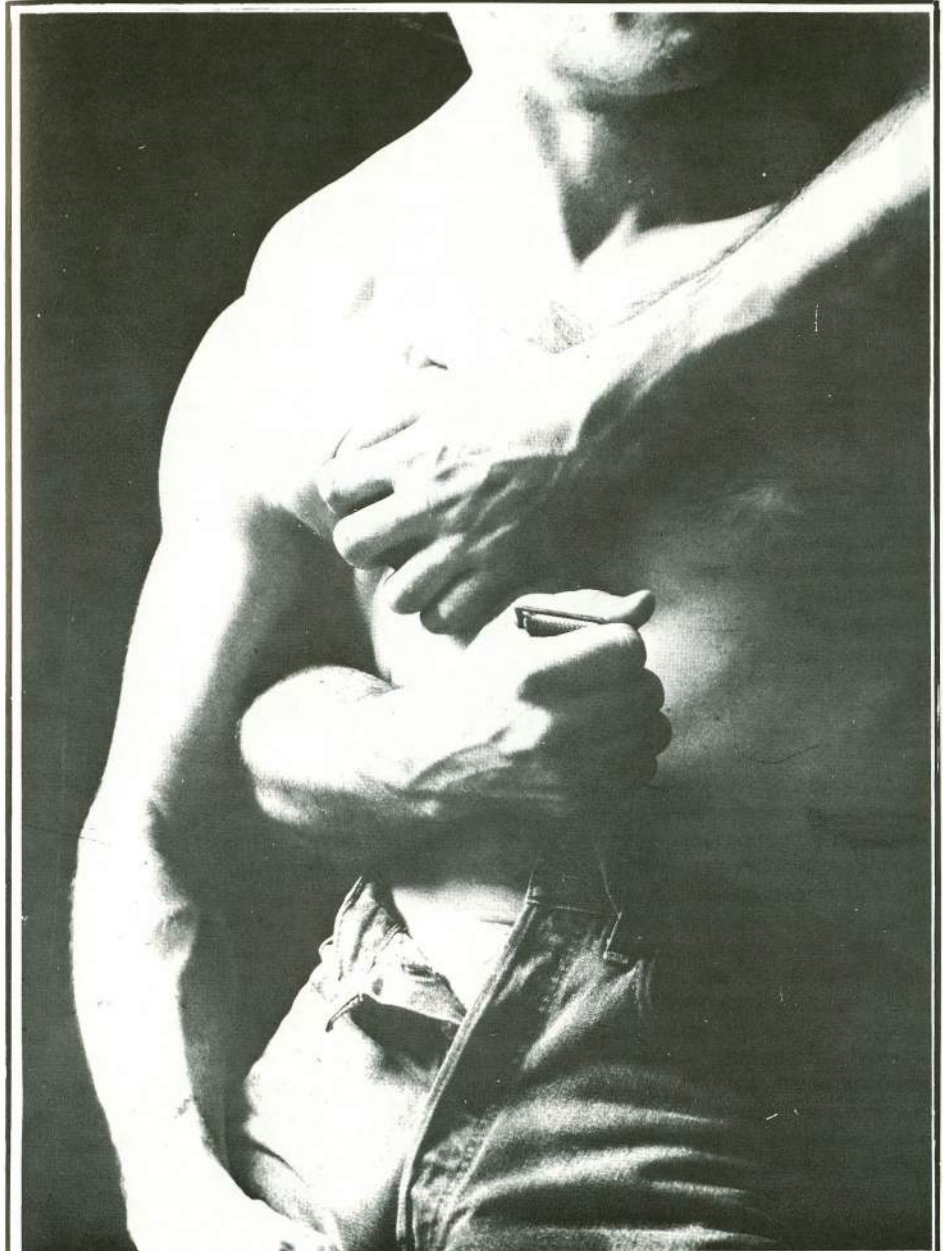
To Club: The first need is that of friendship. A simple fact is that many of us go to bars to cruise, not to make lasting friendships. There are, of course, those happy exceptions when a trick becomes a friend (or vice versa), but the accepted intent seems to be finding that special someone to play with for that night.

Hopefully, the end result of regular meetings with a given set of men, allows one to begin to relate to other members as "family." You might like some better than others, tolerate some and maybe there are members you can't look at without seeing red; but, assuming the desire to participate in a club, one tries to relate to them all in the name of brotherhood, if nothing else.

Clubs have always provided (yet not fully realized) a beginning point for men wanting to participate in community efforts. Conducting fund-raising events for AIDS research has been a recent favorite among MCs, and their success level has been very high—both in terms of money raised and demonstrating that club members can work together toward a common goal and have fun doing it.

The social and political gains already made have only superficial safety. Safety which is being eroded too quickly as our physical and emotional lives are being taken by everything from punks to AIDS.

There's never been a stronger need for banding together, in spite of the "bigness" which we've already achieved.

While there's no way to measure it, certainly some of that bigness has come from the ranks of MCs.

Many club members have business connections which are more likely to be revealed and, often merged to mutual advantage with those of their members in a club situation than can reasonably be revealed in a bar scene or meeting.

Therein lies an advantage that's been met by college fraternities and lodges for more decades than most MCs have existed collectively. The need for these social and business ties only grows stronger as the reality of the strengths of our gay economic structure becomes known.

On a more personal level, fellow club members can be very helpful with everything from advice to tools, from emotional support to just being a grease buddy when it comes to bike maintenance.

And, while it no longer seems to constitute the most important reason for becoming a member of an MC, one could certainly do worse than team up with a bunch of guys for a weekend run to a mountain retreat.

So, pick your needs for clubbing. There are several. † † †

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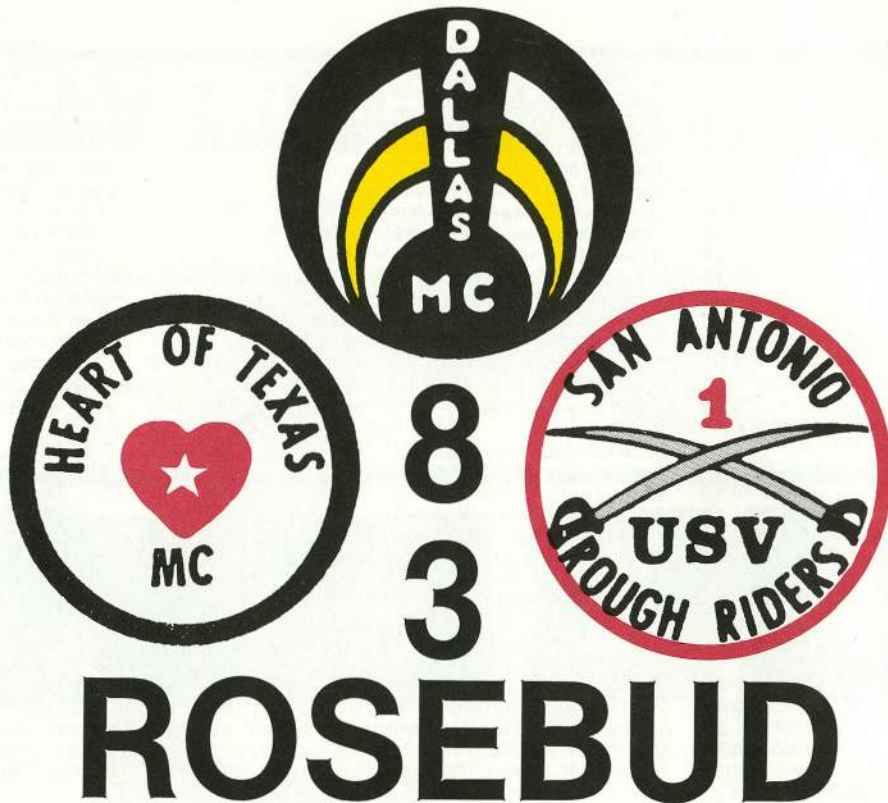

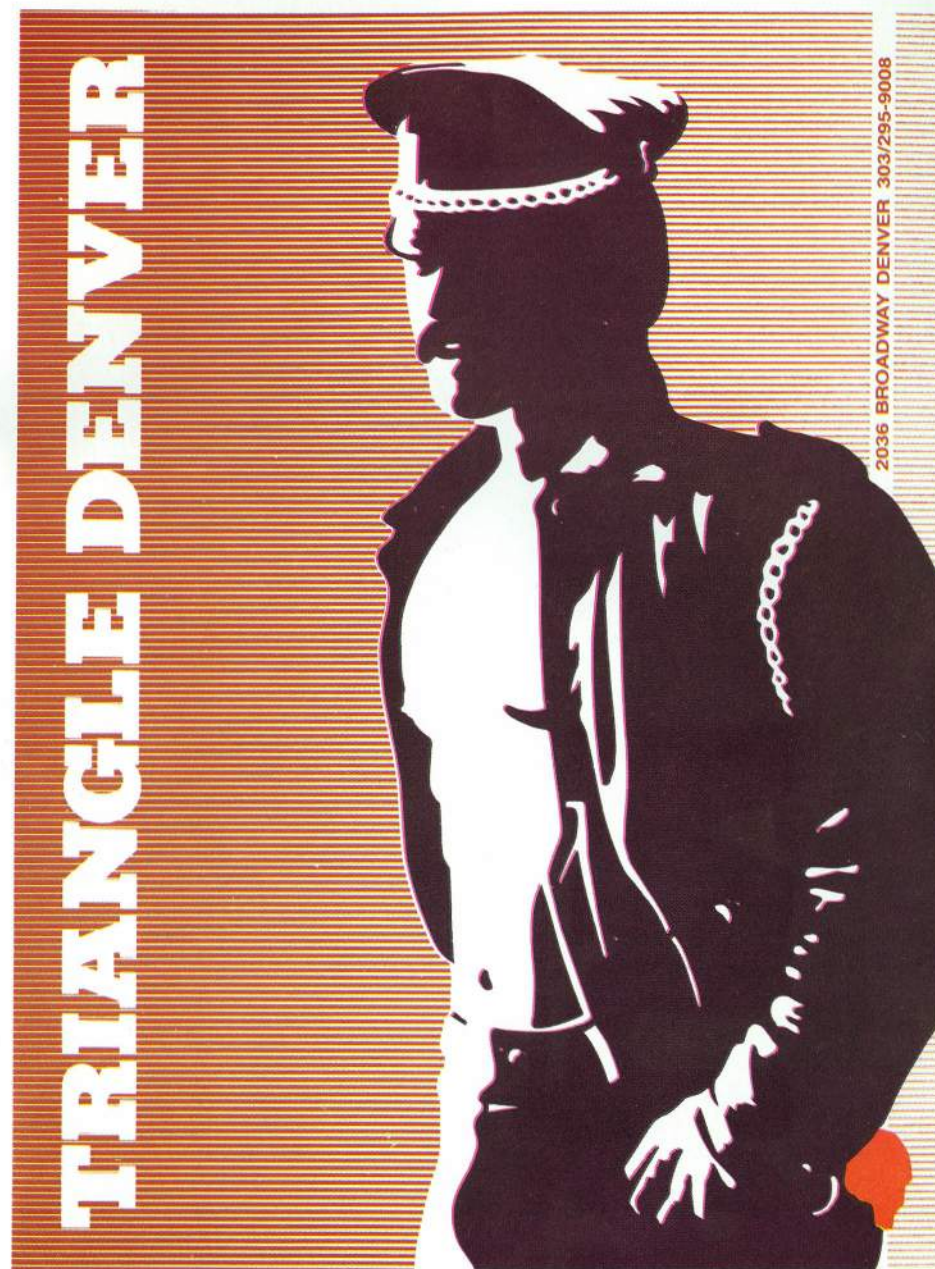
