The Companies We Keep

LITTLE ROCK, AR - The American Family Association — a deeply homophobic media watchdog group — has launched nationwide assaults on several companies, including Disney, MCI, and Schwab. These new hate campaigns are detailed in the October issue of the "AFA Journal."

Noting that "the 'AFA Journal' often reports on companies marketing to homosexuals," the October issue reprints a question about the Schwab investment company. A reader writes: "I have enclosed an article from the 'New York Times' newswire stating that Charles Schwab has supported gay and lesbian activities and is now going after their business. It would seem this calls for drastic action, like throwing them overboard, but I don't know what the alternatives are. Would you address this?"

The question is answered by "expert" Austin Pryor, editor of the "Sound Mind Investing" ("the financial journal for today's Christian family"): "This is certainly disappointing news. Indifferent to the lessons of several thousand years of human history and the moral force of Judeo-Christian tradition, our society and government has increasingly legitimized homosexual conduct... In the brokerage area, you can add Charles Schwab, Merrill Lynch, Paine-Webber and Smith Barney. Schwab was recently one of the major sponsors of the 19th annual San Francisco International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival. The company also has begun testing how to use direct-mail to reach this affluent group. . . ."

Staff at Charles Schwab confirm that the company has been besieged with hate mail. For example, Bill Smith of Smith Capital Management wrote to Schwab indicating that his clients did not wish to do business with any company that "promotes homosexuality." Noting the "degenerate impact of homosexuality on people and societies," Smith questioned why Schwab would "contribute to the promotion of a lifestyle that is estimated to be behind over 90% of AIDS cases." Schwab has received numerous such letters, each threatening the company with the loss of business: "I am morally opposed to homosexuality..." "I will most surely close these accounts..." "I was disappointed to hear of your active endorsement of gay and lesbian activities..." Reportedly, letters of support have NOT been forthcoming.

The AFA has also attacked MCI — the long distance telephone service — for "targeting homosexuals." According to the AFA: "MCI is offering special discounts on long distance phone calls to businesses owned by homosexuals. MCI is using a direct mail campaign to cross-promote with the National Gay and Lesbian Business Alliance (NGLBA), a new group the long distance carrier helped found." With homophobic horror, the AFA quotes "a letter from an MCI account executive," which states that the NGLBA is "dedicated to furthering the growth of the Gay and Lesbian business community." Finally, the AFA has renewed its censorious campaign against the Disney company, this time for releasing "Lie Down With Dogs," which is described by the AFA as "a homosexual film." The AFA warns readers that: "Disney's

Miramax film company has released a movie aimed at homosexuals, directed by and starring a homosexual, and featuring homosexual sex Although the movie is rated 'R,' reviewers describe strong homosexual content in the film's scenes and language."

No Excuses

LONDON - Last year, Robert Hale Ltd. published "Homosexuality: A Guide for Parents and Teachers." The book by Joan Gomez has been touted as a fact-based resource, though it is riddled with homophobic misinformation. For example, Gomez (who is purportedly a psychiatrist) writes that "Gay lifestyles lead to an increased likelihood of all the sexually transmitted diseases" (p.16). She also reports that "Pale colours and soft materials, such as silk shirts and corduroy are favored away from work, rather than the austere grey/black of the conventional male. The gay man spends

care and money on his clothes, whether elegantly formal or comfortably casual" (p. 47).

On the subject of gay sex, Gomez claims that research reveals: "If you go into a gay bar . . . overtures are made within a few minutes' conversation, with the explicit expectation that the encounter will include sex" (p. 94). She concludes that: "The fabric of the gay lifestyle, at any rate up to thirty-five, is made of casual encounters involving sex with a stranger" (p. 104) and "The big item missing from the homosexual act is the absence of creativity. In heterosex, there is the possibility, risk, or hope of generating a new human being, plus a huge ongoing responsibility Homosexual intercourse, by contrast, is a mere pastime" (p. 113).

In response to complaints from lesbians and gays, the publisher has issued the most outrageous excuse. A company spokesperson recently stated: "We are proud to have published the book which we feel serves a real need, but would point out that it is not intended for homosexuals." The spokesperson added: "If there are any factual errors, perhaps you would care to point them out and we will incorporate them in the next printing of the book."

New York, NY - Tennis legend Martina Navratilova has introduced "The Rainbow Card®", a Visa card designed for the lesbian and gay community. The Rainbow Card enables gay women and men to demonstrate their pride, while supporting a number of charitable causes

through the newly established Rainbow Card Foundation.

The Rainbow Card Foundation is a non-profit organization created to distribute corporate donations and revenue derived from Rainbow cardholders' annual usage to leading national gay health and education groups. Subaru of America, Inc. is the organizations founding sponsor.

Available through Travelers Bank, USA, the Rainbow Card offers no annual fee, a low introductory rate of 6.9%, free cards for "chosen family" members, and the option for domestic partners to apply jointly for increased credit lines. The Rainbow Card and a percentage of interest paid on revolving balances.

According to Navratilova, "Our objective is to raise a minimum of 420 million for participating charities by the year 200. We can achieve this goal if only 250,000 people obtain the card and use it regularly. That's why our theme is: Get It. Use It. Got It?"

The concept for the Rainbow Card program was developed by Navratilova and Do Tell, Inc., a lesbian owned marketing company based in suburban Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Another noteworthy aspect of the Rainbow Card is its design. Adorning the front of the card is a photograph taken by Navratilova from the stage at the March on Washington where she was a keynote speaker. The visual captures a historic moment in the gay movement and features hundreds of thousands of enthusiastic supporters amid a sea of rainbow flags. The rainbow flag is a universal symbol of pride and diversity for the gay community.

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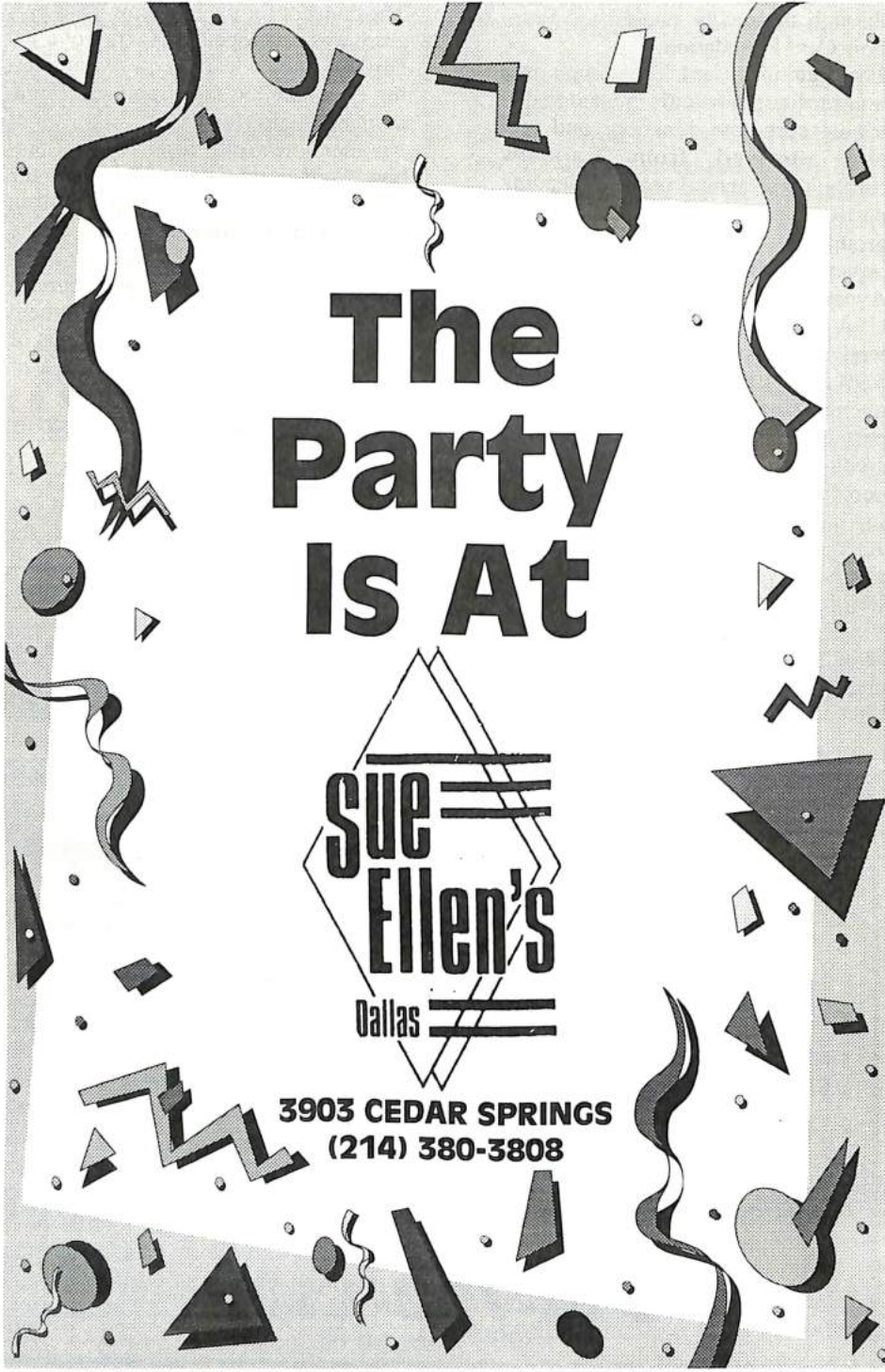

board. 3. Don't turn it on every night. There is a plug on the end of that cord for a very good reason.



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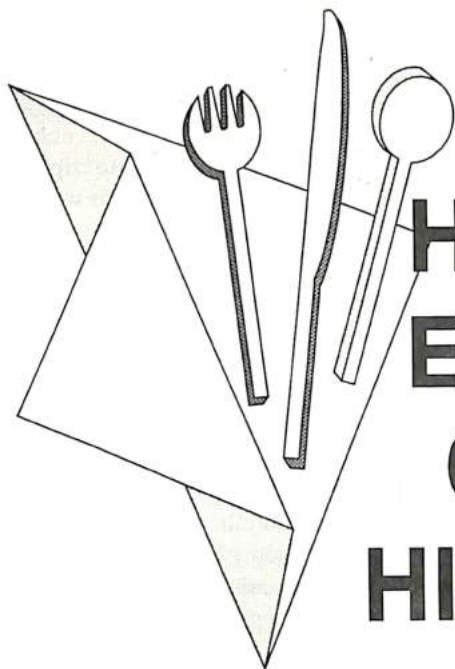


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HOLIDAY & EVERYDAY COOKING HINTS & TIPS

Thanksgiving is the start of “cooking season” — that time of the year when you are cooking for the holidays, taking food to work for lunchtime potlucks, or just cooking up a bowl of soup to keep the cold at bay. The following cooking and kitchen tips should help make your shopping, cooking, food storage and clean-up easier and less time consuming this holiday season.

GROCERY STORE RULES

- **Cardinal Rule Number One:** Don't shop when you are hungry. Of course, we all know this rule, but it's worth repeating. Experts estimate that if you eat *before* you go to the grocery store, your bill will be up to one-third less when you reach the checkout stand.
- **Cardinal Rule Number Two:** Shop from a list. Make a list of the things you need, then give yourself five blank spaces for impulse buys. Sticking to the list and only allowing yourself five optional items will really help when you

reach the checkout stand.

- Try to shop only once a week instead of stopping by the Supermarket everyday. When you stop in for just one or two items, you usually leave with four or five. Shopping all at once can help keep impulse buying at a minimum.

CLIPPING COUPONS

- Clip coupons only for those products that you normally buy anyway. Getting 50¢ off an item you wouldn't normally buy means you are adding to your grocery bill — not lowering it.
- Remember to check out the competitor's brand. Many times the sale price on a competing brand is cheaper than the brand with the coupon.
- Watch your sizes. Although most of the time larger size items are cheaper per ounce, the smaller size may be a better deal when you have a coupon.

DON'T BUY.....

- Frozen food that has frost on it. this is

a good sign that the product has been defrosted and refrozen.

- Dented or damaged canned goods. The contents could be spoiled.
- Fresh fish with cloudy eyes or fishy smelling gills.

STORAGE HINTS

Fruits & Vegetables:

- Store potatoes in the pantry — not in the refrigerator.
- Don't store apples with other fruits or vegetables. Apples give off a gas that speeds ripening in fruits and vegetables and can cause spoilage to happen faster.
- Do store unripe avocados in a paper sack with an apple. The avocados will ripen in about 24 hours.

Dairy Products:

- Cottage Cheese will stay fresh longer if refrigerated upside down in its original container.
- Most hard cheeses (cheddar, mozzarella, swiss, etc.) can be frozen for up to 6 months.
- To keep soft cheeses moist, wrap in a cloth moistened with a mild brine solution (1/2 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vinegar).
- To check the freshness of eggs, put them in a deep pan of cold water. If they float to the top they are too old to use.
- Don't store eggs in the refrigerator door egg compartment. Eggs absorb flavors and odors from other foods and will taste better if stored in their original carton.

Meats & Fish:

- Poultry and meat will freeze better if removed from its packaging and put in resealable freezer bags. Cut the label from the package and place in the bag

with the meat.

- Fresh fish will retain more flavor if frozen in water. Put the fish in either a clean, empty milk carton or zip lock freezer bag, fill with enough water to cover the fish and freeze.

Other:

- Coffee will taste better if you store it in the freezer (both beans and ground coffee).
- Keep ground ginger, chili powder and paprika in the refrigerator. Once opened, these spices will quickly lose their flavor if stored in the pantry.
- Fresh parsley, chives and basil can be frozen. Just wash them, shake dry, mince and freeze in plastic containers.

COOKING TIPS

- To get more juice from a lemon, place it in hot water for 15 minutes or microwave for 30 seconds before squeezing.
- Crying over your onions? Chill them thoroughly in the refrigerator before chopping.
- To get the onion smell off your hands, run them over the chrome of the kitchen faucet (it works, I swear).
- Slice tomatoes vertically instead of horizontally for a salad. The slices stay firmer and your dressing won't get watery.
- Sprinkle lemon juice over sliced apples and bananas to keep them from turning dark.
- Nuts are easier to chop if they have been heated for 5 minutes in a 350°F oven.
- Meats are easier to slice (for stir-frying, etc.) if still slightly frozen.
- To keep steaks from curling up, slash the fat on the edge of the steak at about one-inch intervals.

- For a more flavorful holiday turkey, put dry seasonings (salt, pepper, tarragon, rosemary, etc.) on the turkey the day before roasting.
- To keep the bottom of your pies from getting soggy, brush the bottom crust with egg white before baking. Brush the top crust with ice water for a flakier crust.
- To soften brown sugar, place the open bag or box in the microwave beside a cup of hot water and microwave one minute at a time until soft.
- Bread will rise higher if you warm the mixing bowl and all the ingredients (including the flour) in a warm oven before mixing together.
- Baked goods will taste much more professional if you use unsalted butter.
- To keep nuts and raisins from sinking to the bottom of cakes, brownies and puddings, shake them in a bag with flour before adding them to the batter.

CLEAN UP

- Pour baking soda on burned saucepans and sprinkle with just enough water to moisten. Let the pan sit for 10 minutes and it should clean right up.
- To get stains out of plastic dishes and utensils, combine 3/4 cup chlorine bleach with 3/4 cup baking soda — brush on the dish and let it sit for five minutes before washing and rinsing thoroughly.
- You can wash fine china in the dishwasher with a mild dishwashing detergent — just don't let it go through the drying cycle. (Don't use this method if your china has gold or silver trim, handwash instead).
- Out of silver polish? Use a non-gel toothpaste instead.
- Vinegar will remove hard water de-

posits on glass and crystal vases. Fill the vase halfway with vinegar then fill up with hot water. Let it sit for an hour or so, then rinse and dry.

- Vinegar will also make glasses shine and clean hard water deposits from your dishwasher. Just load the dishwasher with clean (but water-spotted) glasses, pour one cup of vinegar in the bottom of the dishwasher and run it through its entire cycle.

Following these few simple tips can help you save money and make clean up a little easier during the holidays and all year round. So, ready, set — start your ovens . . . Happy Holiday Cooking!

It is customary for many of the graduates of the total-immersion school of thought to pitch camp on the fairgrounds gypsy-style, erect a make-shift subdivision, and live together as a community for the entire run of the show.

I tried. I really tried. I gathered tent and tarp and sleeping bag and Igloo cooler and Deep-woods OFF! and fold out couch and wardrobe and makeup mirror and the biographies of Isadora Duncan and Lucille Ball and relaxation tapes and Benadryl and moisturizer and all the barest of necessities one cannot possibly abandon, even when roughing it. But during the course of the seven-weekend run, I spent two miserable nights as a citizen of Coleman Lantern City, and swore I would never return.

Did you know that ants — big, hungry, possessed ants — will come into your tent if there's food in it, even if you've

zippered the door? Well, mostly zippered the door. It was only open a crack. I swear. Did you know that when you try discouraging them with insecticide and then try sleeping in a canvas-encased cloud

of 2-dimethylcyclopropanecarboxylate, you will die? At the very least, you will have unpleasant dreams and a massive headache when you wake.

Since that time, my concept of sleeping under the stars has absolutely nothing to do with the Milky Way.

Recently all this has changed. I am now a proud graduate of the Lone Star Women's Music Festival. Each year for the past six, hundreds of women spurned their patriarchal shackles to gather in the woods on the banks of the beautiful Guadalupe River, coming together in the joy of the goddess that burns brightly inside each one of them, until their collective spark united to create a gigantic, glowing Amazonian blaze of estrogenic power and purity.

And this year, for the first time, I took my place, sans back-up hotel reservations in that instant canvas community dependent on Academy and Oshman's for its very existence. That's right — no hotel reservations. Working without a net. Next thing you know, I'll be running with the wolves.

And how did I fare, you ask? Well, let's just say womonspirit was not the only thing glowing in a gigantic Amazonian blaze at the Lone Star Women's Music Festival.

As emcee for Saturday evening's concert I decided to perform a parody to Billy Joel's *We Didn't Start the Fire*, a wacky review of lesbian and gay history. - Long strips of duct tape remove ants from the tent in a safe, effective and non-toxic, though deafening manner.



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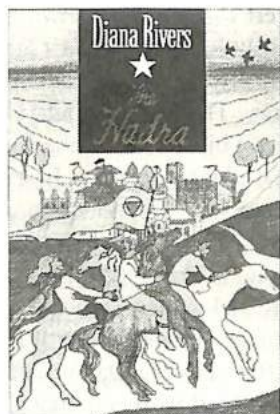
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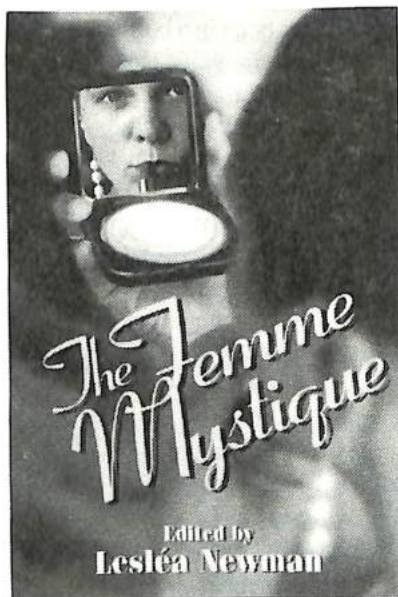

First this month, we'll look at **Fair Play** by Rose Beecham. *Fair Play* is the third in the Amanda Valentine Mystery Series (the others are **Introducing Amanda Valentine** and **Second Guess**).

Detective Inspector Amanda Valentine is the top detective in Wellington, New Zealand. When Bryce Petty, the gay son of a Baptist preacher is found dead in his apartment, it is up to Amanda to sort out the facts. Bryce is the former president of an Australian gay and lesbian broadcast firm that has recently been beset by scandal. Bryce had disappeared from Australia several months

prior to his murder in order to avoid paying on a libel suit. This left him with a fair number of sworn enemies. His mother had tracked him to New Zealand with the help of a private detective and his parents were in Wellington on the day of the murder. Bryce's boyfriend, a New Zealand football (as in soccer) star found the body but is reluctant to help the investigation because of the possibility of bad publicity.

In a second case, one of her detective's roommates has been raped by two women. One is a simple bully — the other the daughter of one of the wealthiest families in New Zealand. It's not an

easy case to prove or to prosecute. Complicating matters further, Amanda and her girlfriend have decided to try an "open" relationship since their jobs keep them away from each other most of the time.

The Amanda Valentine mystery series is one of my favorites — and **Fair Play** is the best of the series. The characters are believably flawed and very endearing. Add to that the exotic locale and some very creative plot twists and *viola!* a great mystery. This a great read, I recommend it highly.

Next, we'll look at **The Hadra** by Diana Rivers (author of **Journey to Zelindar** and **Daughters of the Great Star**). This is the third in the fantasy series chronicling the adventures of the Khal Hadera Lossien, a proud tribe of lesbian warriors.

The Hadra is the "in-between" book — picking up the story where **Daughters of the Great Star** ends and where **Journey to Zelindar** begins. Tazzil, and her tribe are on the move. Running from the Zarn's soldiers and trying to find a place where they can build a city of their own, they run into many adventures.

First they must help local villagers fight off the Shokarn. Tazzil and the witch Alyeeta find a very strange, but ultimately successful, method of ridding the peaceful valley of the men who have come to take the village.

As they move along toward an unknown destination, they pick up "strays" along the way. A former prostitute joins their band, the wife of an abusive man

decides to come along and they even hook up with a former commander from the Zarn's army.

This is a quite satisfying book. The land and women Rivers's has created in this trilogy are very realistic — you can truly imagine this place and these women existing somewhere in another dimension. I highly recommend **The Hadra** and all the rest of Rivers's books.

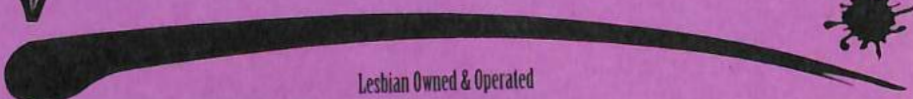
