NO TOBACCO!

Shame on HERO! Twice in HERO 10 you loaned a degree of legitimacy to cigar smoking. The photo on page 76 clearly sends the message that smoking is chic. The comment in the Bachelor Party article which suggests "smoke some cigars" suggests that occasional cigar smoking is OK. I did not think I needed to remind a magazine that runs a health and fitness column and that does not accept tobacco ads of the long term health risks associated with smoking. HERO needs to ensure that it does not send out conflicting messages on the subject of smoking. Not that AIDS is not a significant public health issue, but with more gay men smoking per capita than straight men, we as a community will suffer significant loss and disability, more so than we have with AIDS, if we do not take a militant stand against tobacco in all its forms. HERO needs to decide which side of the fence it is on.

WHEN MR. BIG BECOMES BIGOREXIC

In our image-conscious society it's no surprise that such a large percentage of us are trying to lose weight. The superlean images of Antonio Sabato, Jr. and Marky Mark on buses and billboards across the country are constant reminders of why we are collectively skipping dessert and sipping Diet Coke.

But on the other side of the spectrum are the guys who want to get bigger, not smaller. Packing on some extra muscles may fit into your fitness goals, but if you find yourself obsessing about becoming muscle-bound, you may have succumbed to a new phenomenon called bigorexia (muscle dysmorphia). Dr. Harrison Pope, a psychiatrist at McLean Hospital in Massachusetts, has helped define this disorder simply as an obsession with being muscular. It is the opposite of anorexia, and occurs mostly in men.

Bigorexic men are compelled to work out for long hours—often 6 to 7 days a week—while sometimes ignoring serious injuries to their ligaments and torn muscles. To them, bigger is better, and yet they can't be big enough. In the mirror, they see a skinny, gaunt body, of which they are continually ashamed. Some even skip social events or interaction with others because they're ashamed of how they think their bodies will be perceived. The "pathology" of bodybuilding (or any other activity) begins when the activity starts to interfere with other aspects of your life.

The only shame in any disorder is when nothing is done about it and people suffer. If you need a reality check, check out Dr. Pope's new book, *The Adonis Complex* (available at heromag.com).

APPLE G4 CUBE

While the Wintel manufacturers were scrambling to duplicate the design of Apple's insanely successful iBook and iMac, Apple was busy shrinking their basic desktop computer by 75%. The new Power Mac G4 Cube is a lightning fast supercomputer miraculously engineered into an eight-inch cube, suspended in a stunning crystal-clear enclosure. The Cube comes with built-in ethernet networking for broadband access, DVD player, and a built-in 56K modem. The \$1,799 price point was a bit risky, since you can now get a faster and more expandable dual-processor G4 for \$1,500. But if you wanted an "ordinary" computer, you wouldn't be reading this. With 20 gigs of hard disk space and a processor that beats the Pentium III, the Cube is perfect for an office that's short on space, or for the super-cool home office. If you've got the money to burn, throw in the exquisite \$4,000 21-inch Cinema Display and you'll be the envy of your techno-geekiest friends.



PANASONIC DVD PLAYER

Most new computers can already play DVDs, but if trying to sneak *The Next Best Thing* onto your work computer seems risky, the Panasonic LV75 portable DVD player may be the answer. Better yet, you can take it on the plane with you so you'll never have to sit through another Adam Sandler feature. If you need an even more sensible justification, the Panasonic LV75 has an S-video out, so you could connect it to your television and home stereo system, and use it as your primary DVD player. Although the screen is a comparatively whopping 7 diagonal inches, the size of the unit is diminutive, weighing under four pounds with a height of less than an inch. Additional features include built-in stereo speakers, a 35-key super slim remote control, auto power on/off, and up to four hours playback time.

S3 RIO 600 MP3 PLAYER

I'm just crazed about the MP3 phenomenon now, and if you aren't yet, it's time to wake up. Once you've turned your CDs into digital files or downloaded some songs from the Internet and dragged them into a portable player, you'll be hooked. Forget CDs, cassettes, minidisks, and all the other dated media—MP3 is here to stay. The new Rio 600 is the third generation of MP3 players by the people who brought you the revolutionary Rio 300. The design is sleek, the sound is near-CD quality, and the functionality is fast and simple. With the included USB cable, it only takes about a minute to fully load the player with songs from your computer, using the Rio Audio Manager (Windows) or SoundJam (Mac). The biggest difference in this new player is the "backpack" design, which enables you to trade out the battery/memory pack for easy upgrades. Unfortunately, the 600 ships with a paltry 32 megs of memory, which is only about 9 high-quality songs (a new adapter shipping soon from IBM will allow 10-20 hours of music using the backpack upgrade). Other drawbacks to the 600 include hard to attach earphones and an oddly-designed player button. But this is still the best player currently available. If you can possibly wait, the Rio 800 will be released soon, sporting an improved, sleeker design and 64 megs of storage standard, albeit at a higher price.

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How long had you been together before you began discussing the possibility of children?

Maben: I think within the first three months of the relationship Robert started telling me how much he had always dreamed of having kids. My first reaction was...gee, that's nice, but I'm sure you'll get over it. However, the seed was planted, and before long I began to think he was really vocalizing something I had never thought possible or feasible. I grew more and more comfortable with at least talking about it—knowing that talk wasn't as dangerous as actually doing it.

Was one of you more nervous about the idea of being a dad?

Maben: I was. I was concerned for the kids in school and what abuse they might receive because of me. I was worried that I might not know what to do for my kids in many common instances. I was concerned I might be too old. (I was 45 when we adopted the boys.) I didn't think it was in me to overcome the perceived obstacles that disappeared once we became serious.

Making a Family

After three and a half years together, Robert and Maben wanted a family. Through an adoption from Eastern Europe, Alexandru and Nicholas are now teaching them about the world of fatherhood.

Robert: I think there is always that element of being nervous and the question of, "Will I make a good parent?" I had tried to prepare myself over the years and to put myself in many situations that included children.

How did you decide on international adoption over domestic adoption or surrogacy?

Maben: I remember being more vocal about adoption, as I knew there were already a lot of wonderful kids with a need for a loving home. I knew Robert's first choice would have been to have his own kid, but in the end he understood both the opportunity to help an existing child and the simpler aspects of adoption over surrogacy.

What were your first steps towards finding a child?

Robert: The biggest challenge was the search for an agency. First, I searched the Internet, and

then San Diego's Family Matters, where we were given a list of gay-friendly agencies that provided assistance with domestic and international adoptions.

Maben: We wanted to work with an agency that knew all about us, though. We didn't want to be nine-tenths done to find out that deception didn't work. You have to be approved by an agency before they will make any presentations. That was the hardest part, because you're closely examined and feel quite vulnerable. It's a bit unnerving to have someone probe into your lifestyle to detect potential child-raising weaknesses.

Robert: We had an encouraging conversation with an agency in Pennsylvania that could handle all aspects of the adoption, from the home study to the placement of the child. We had decided on adopting from Eastern Europe, and it happened to be their specialty.

Why Eastern Europe?

Maben: It really was a question of where the

agency that would work with us found their children. We knew it was most likely going to be Eastern European—which was just fine.

Was the process complicated?

Maben: Complicated is not the right word. It is quite straightforward, if you have good agency people. I would say it was just time-consuming—filling out the paperwork, getting the needed government forms and waiting for the next steps.

Robert: I think the hardest part was the waiting period, and feeling "your destiny" is in the hands of someone else. You know you're ready for this life-long commitment, but do "they" feel you're ready? You feel as if your life is under a microscope.

How much did the adoption procedure cost?

Maben: It was about \$14,000 per child, not including travel expenses.

Once all the bureaucracy was completed, how did you actually get your boys?

Maben: There were two absolutely incredible moments. The first was receiving the bio and picture of a prospect child. You take a deep breath, and say, "Is this what we were expecting?" I don't think many parents turn down the first child presented. I'd be surprised if many said the kid matched their initial criteria, though.

The second was our first few moments together. Your heart is pounding because you want to be happy and you want the child to immediately love you, but in the end none of that matters. Your child causes you to melt and say, "How could I not take you home?"

Robert: Since we had traveled to see the boys four times before taking custody of them, our trip over was like just another trip to see them. We arrived at the attorney's office where some last minute paperwork needed to be signed. From there, they took us to the orphanage. While we waited in the car, she went in to dress the boys with the clothes that we brought. When you adopt, you get a naked child! They came out of the orphanage and we looked at each other with tears in our eyes and butterflies in our stomachs. We couldn't have been happier.

After Robert officially adopted the boys, how did you make the children legally yours together back in the United States?

Maben: Once home in California, we applied for co-parent adoption. Fortunately, California is a pro-gay adoption state. It means you have to redo a significant part of your original process; however, we wouldn't have it any other way. In our case, I am an equal parent—no different than Robert was from the beginning.

What's the best thing about being a dad?

Robert: Seeing a smile on your child's face and knowing that you were the one that put it there. It's music to your ears to hear that little voice call out "Daddy" as they look to you for reassurance.

Maben: There are so many things, but my favorite is being asked by the boys for help. I guess that is what convinced me in the end to become a dad. My life, as I knew it, was wonderful, but it was about satisfying my needs and pleasures. Becoming a

dad is about finding the pleasure you receive from giving something back.

How has having children affected your relationship?

Robert: If anything, it has strengthened our relationship. We have family meetings to discuss the week's events. We consult each other about redirecting behaviors. *Positive Discipline — A to Z: 1001 Solutions to Everyday Parenting Problems* by Nelsen, Lott and Glenn is a wonderful resource to help with those tough situations.

Maben: We do find it a lot more challenging to manage our communication. The new pressures of managing a family mean your ability to work out differences is that much harder. The first three months were tough because you're working out kid things, schedule things and personal things. We also had just started a new business together and were finishing a renovation! You really need to be good at talking through any concerns. But it has also added considerably to our relationship. We definitely have many more highs—especially now after 11 months when we see changes in the boys that we know we as a couple brought about.

What are your favorite things to do as a family?

Robert: Alexandru was 2-and-a-half and Nicholas was just 2 when they came home with us. Since they had gone without in many aspects of their life, everything was new. Our all-time favorite thing is to swim in the pool. They love to swim and are getting quite good at it. Each day, they grow more confident in their abilities. Our other favorite is going to the park to play baseball or soccer.

Maben: Sticky buns on Saturday morning, an afternoon at the zoo learning more about animals that I ever had in the past, shopping together, reading a bedtime story, and going out to dinner with our gay friends and giving them a peek at life on the father-side!

How do your families' feel about your being parents?

Robert: My parents are over the moon about our adoption. They couldn't be more delighted about us as a couple and as parents to two wonderful little boys. Two weeks after we returned home with the boys, my whole family came to San Diego to welcome the two new additions to the family.

Maben: My own family is very traditional, and we had a hard time at first. My parents felt awkward about what the boys should call them. Unfortunately, the solution was a compromise. My brother and his wife still haven't met them, but my sister and her husband have been very supportive and visited us earlier this year. I hope things continue to improve, as I would really like the boys to have two loving families behind them.

Will you adopt other children?

Maben: We'll wait two more years before trying to find them a sister. We would like the boys to want a sister and understand what's happening so they feel part of the process. We don't want them to think we will be dividing our love.

What advice would you give to a couple considering adoption?

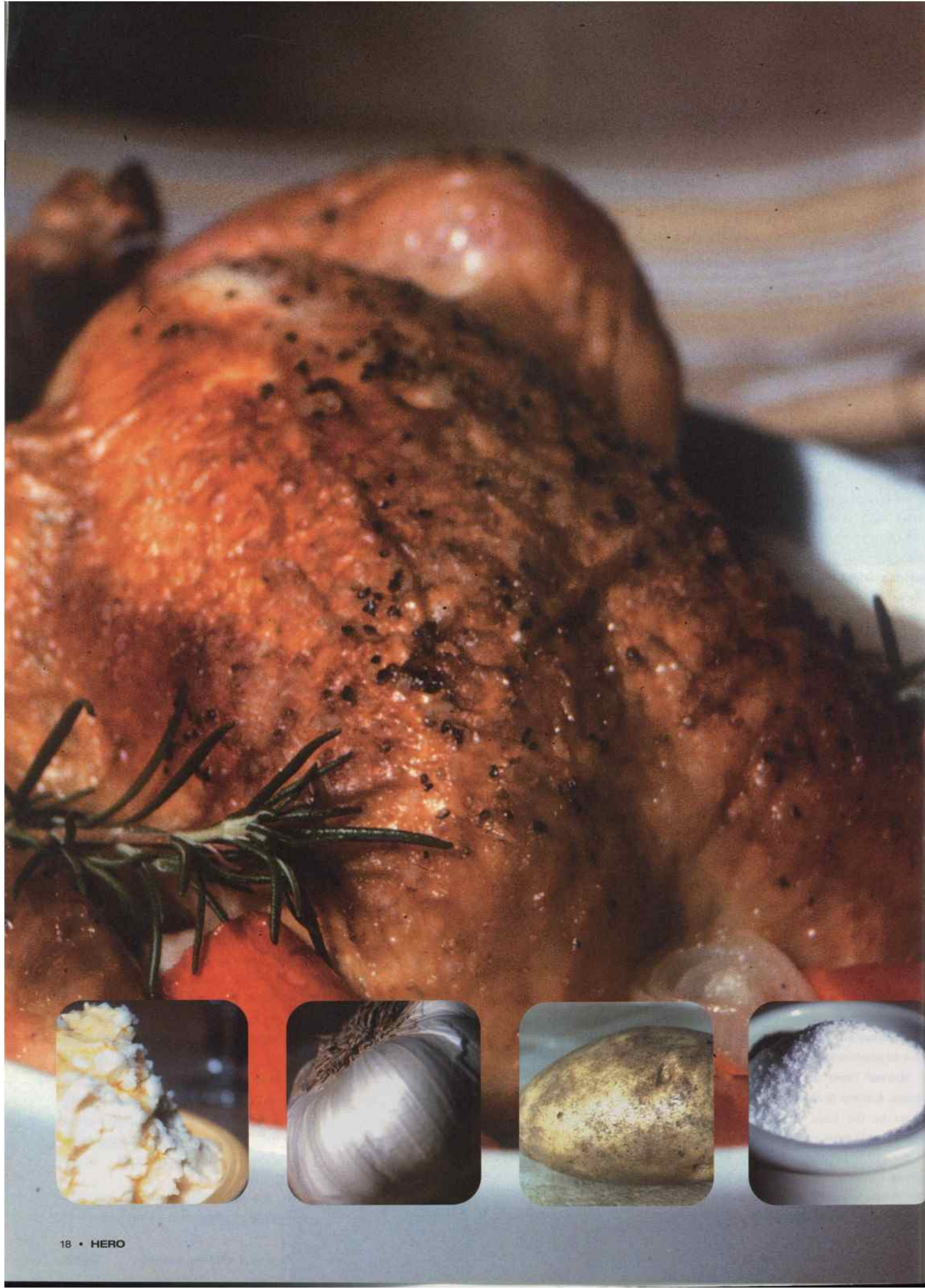
Robert: Talk with other couples that have successfully adopted. Compare international to domestic adoption. But most of all, don't settle with an agency that you can't trust.

Maben: Go for it. If you are even remotely thinking of it, you owe it to yourself to explore the avenues open to you. You can't really make an informed decision until you realize that it's relatively straightforward and something you can do if you choose to. You will be surprised how much you already know about bringing up kids. It's innate, and you were once your parents' guinea pig! Also, you can make a difference is someone's life. It would be a shame if you didn't do it. **H**

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Roast Chicken 101

As the leaves change and the temperature drops, be your own Mom and treat yourself to a homey meal of roast chicken and garlic mashed potatoes. Perfect for watching the Cowboys beat the Redskins (or the Miss America Pageant, depending on the kind of guy you are).

ROAST CHICKEN

- 2 medium onions, peeled
- 1 roasting chicken (3-4 lbs.)
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 1 lemon
- 4-5 sprigs rosemary
- 1 tablespoon butter, softened

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Slice onions crosswise (so you can see the rings) about 1/2-inch thick. Place them in two rows along the bottom of a roasting pan or 9x13-inch baking dish. Remove the giblets from inside the chicken (usually they're in a packet; use 'em later or toss 'em), and remove any excess fat from around the opening. Rinse

the chicken inside and out, and pat dry with paper towels. Rub the inside of the chicken with 1 teaspoon salt and one-half teaspoon pepper. Roll the lemon firmly back and forth on the counter a few times (to release the juices inside), then use a fork to poke holes all over it; insert whole lemon into cavity, along with sprigs of fresh rosemary. Place the chicken breast-side-up in the roasting pan on top of onions, then rub entire exposed surface of chicken with butter. Sprinkle remaining salt and pepper over chicken, and place in the center of oven. Roast chicken about an hour, until the skin is a deep golden brown and the juices run clear (not pink) when you pierce the thigh with a knife. Once chicken is done, remove it from the oven and let it rest for 10 to 15 minutes before carving so the juices can settle back into the meat. Serves 2-4.

Next time, try using an orange, an apple, smashed garlic, or different fresh herbs inside the chicken to infuse with flavor. You can also insert rosemary or bay leaves under the skin on top of the breast.

GARLIC MASHED POTATOES

- 1 head of garlic
- 1 tsp. olive oil
- 2 lbs. Russet or Yukon potatoes
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 5 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
- 1/2 to 1 cup half-and-half, room temperature
- Salt and pepper, to taste

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Cut the pointed end off the head of garlic (about one-half inch), place garlic cut-side-up

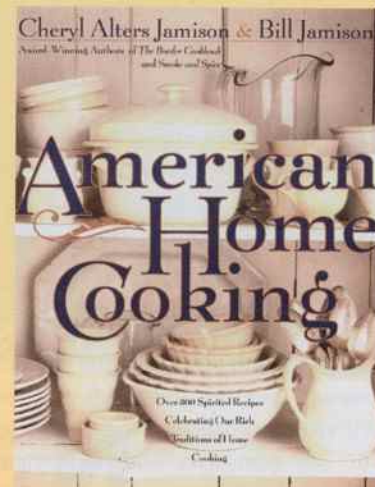

on a square of foil, and sprinkle about a teaspoon of olive oil over the top. Wrap foil around garlic and place in the oven. Roast for 30 to 40 minutes, until garlic is soft. Set aside until ready to use.

Meanwhile, peel potatoes, cut into quarters, and cover them with water in a large pot. Add salt to water and bring to a boil over high heat, then reduce heat and simmer until the potatoes are tender (you can easily stick a fork in them), about 20 minutes. Drain, then transfer to mixing bowl. Squeeze garlic from bulb and add to potatoes, then add butter and mash using potato masher or mixer. Add half-and-half and continue to mash until as smooth (or lumpy) as you like them. Salt and pepper to taste, and serve immediately.

Adding the butter before adding the half-and-half keeps the potatoes from interacting with the half-and-half, making for smoother, creamier mashers. **H**

To complete this new cookbook, Cheryl & Bill Jamison scoured America for its home cooking recipes, meeting people from Connecticut to California, catfish farmers to cheese crafters. HYBRIDS: The Next Step On A Long Road

Not long ago, when we looked to the future, we saw green. We envisioned a world full of slippery electric vehicles that moved swiftly, made no noise and left no emissions with which to pollute our reformulated world.

It turns out that electric cars were just the first step on the bridge that ultimately will take us to that vision. Other technologies, particularly that of hybrid powerplants, constitute the next step. They combine the efficiency of electric (and other) power sources with the range and infrastructure-compatibility of gasoline engines.

Honda's **INSIGHT** is a low-slung two-seater that uses gasoline all of the time and electric power part of the time to help the gasoline engine out. Looking like a CRX that was popped in the microwave for a while, the skirted

runabout's teeny gasoline engine requests the help of a small electric motor only under acceleration in order to make driving fun (well, sort of fun—see the accompanying review). The net benefit of this is a decent sense of power from an engine small and miserly enough to yield up to 70 miles per gallon! Also, you don't have to worry about a limited range, as the batteries are recharged by the engine itself during coasting and braking, with no need for a plug. The styling is smooth and clean, if unattractive. Best news, though, is its affordable purchase price of about \$20,000. That's right, in contrast to the first-generation, lease-only GM EV1 electric car, you can actually keep this one.

Over at the Toyota store, the long-awaited **PRIUS** is finally hitting the road as well. It is a four-door, five-passenger variation on the hybrid theme, and it's about as pretty as Toyota's own Echo (which is to say, butt-ugly). Like Honda's Insight, the Prius features two tiny engines, one gas and one electric, but both work in varying proportions at all times, not just in power-assist situations. It, too, charges itself, so it won't be competing with your blow-dryer for plug space. Advantage to the Prius: It carries four people, while Honda's Insight carries only two, and it yields an equally

impressive 66 miles per gallon. The down side is that it's even uglier than the Insight.

Thankfully, there are more on the way. Ford is readying a hybrid version of its fresh new Escape SUV for 2003. Furthermore, both GM ("Precept") and Ford ("Prodigy") are working on fuel cell technology that adds yet another fuel to the automotive spectrum: liquid hydrogen (remember the Hindenburg?). Don't be scared away, though, since the containment of such a fuel is at least as secure as that of gasoline. At first, we'll see fuel cell in 3-way hybrid sedans, likely alongside both gasoline and electric motors.

Eventually, we may be driving fuel cell-only vehicles, the next step in our quest for clean transportation. With no fossil fuels to combust, and hydrogen at least a bountiful resource, there's a lot to like about the concept of fuel cell cars. And as for the emissions from the tailpipe of a fuel cell vehicle? Water vapor. How's that for clean

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GM courts the gay market

 The seemingly lethargic and staid granddaddy of all car corporations, General Motors, surprised even me by acknowledging that the gay community is a worthwhile market to target in its diversity marketing efforts. **Pat Roberts**, in charge of such programs for the West Coast, **says that the time to establish a presence in the gay community has come.** Understanding now that double income + no kids = money to spend on cars, she said the GM ads will finally start appearing in gay publications. "It's not a question of should we be in them, but which ones should we be in, she says." But GM, which owns gay-friendly Saab and has a stake in Subaru, is not limiting its outreach to advertising; it is brainstorming some ideas for "events" that will take place in San Francisco's Castro district.

buying season, and/or manipulate sales figures for a given model year. So if you're buying a 2005 model year car, it had better be at least 2004.

Review: Honda Insight

The Insight works like this: a small gasoline engine and a small electric engine (powered by batteries) collude to get and keep the vehicle moving with a minimum of gasoline consumption. Upon acceleration—when you need the most power—both engines are working. Upon coasting, though, the electric motor cuts out (invisibly), leaving the miserly, 1.0-liter gas engine to propel the car on its own, charging the batteries while it's at it. Heat

produced during braking also charges the batteries, so they never run out. Therefore, it never needs to be plugged in, and its EPA fuel economy registers at 61-mpg city, 70-mpg highway.

As for the car itself, the Insight is a mixed bag. It only seats two, although it has a relatively large cargo area. The dashboard is futuristic, with lots of fun-to-watch digital readouts displaying the constant flux of electric assist, batteries charge, and exact gas mileage (especially cool when you're averaging 60+ MPG or more on the freeway).

It is no speed demon: there is virtually no power under 4,000 rpm and the gears are so tall that it feels like it takes a week to rev that high.

Overall, the feel is very much like an economy car; the suspension soaks up bumps about as well as an '88 Sentra, and I would say that Honda's less expensive Civic is a much nicer ride.

But the Civic is the past, and the Insight is the future—it's the significance of this car that will be its selling point, not its comfort. So for your \$20,080, the Insight glows "green" with technological brilliance, if only that.

Mario Aranda: Family Man

The 59-year-old writer and therapist tells HERO why it's important to come out

Mario J. Aranda, 59, is a writer and therapist living in Northern California. He is director of clinical services for a large family services organization, where he counsels domestic violence offenders. He's been an educator, a human rights activist, an entrepreneur, and a newspaper publisher. He also serves as chairman of the board for Q-Spirit, a non-profit organization which helps the GLBT spiritual community.

How has coming out late in life colored your gay experience?

I am not certain, since the only life I have experienced is my own. What I do know is that my coming out in my sexual expression is part of a much larger construct of "coming out," if by coming out we mean living in truth in all our dimensions. For me to have come out sexually—exclusively—would have meant remaining in a state of disassociation, i.e., a state of fragmentation and pain. I knew that for me coming out would have to be total—sexual, emotional, spiritual and physical. It was not just my sexuality that was closeted but my capacity for joy. I came to a point in my life where I understood marrow-deep that I would have to "re-form" myself completely before I could feel the joy for which I longed. For me that meant shattering all illusions of who I was. This included my profession (I used to be a newspaper publisher), emotions, beliefs, many of my relationships, and, of course, my sexual expression. This was a painful, unescorted journey, one that from the outside probably looked a lot like madness. Mystics call it the "dark night of the soul." In the end, I found that the dark night of the soul was simply the chrysalis forming. I was birthing a new self. And the "re-formation" continues. These days, I live in a place of joy most of the time. I am coming to understand that those times when joy is not my companion it is because it has been replaced by one of my old illusions, often born of fear. For me it has become essential to hone my spiritual technologies, that is, those practices that give me life when I feel myself less than alive. That means, in my case, prayer, meditation, exercise, good nutrition, and good, nourishing human interaction, among other things.

As the father of seven children, what gifts does that experience add to who you are today?

My children are at the center of who I am. A gay father of seven? I have given up trying to second-guess the universe. My life is what it is. And being a father is one of those delicious privileges life has afforded me. My children are

extraordinary beings. In the beginning, my former wife and I were the architects of our own tribal culture, but recently I have recognized that I am less and less the architect and more simply a glad participant in a culture that my children are developing for our family. So often I just watch contented as a new, more creative, more inclusive, more loving society is being formed for our little tribe by all its participants. They like to be together. I like what is evolving. They seem wiser, more courageous, more loving and more authentic than I was at their age. So it is a gift to live in their society.

How supportive were your children during your coming out process?

My children have been extraordinarily generous and loving to me during this difficult passage. They assure me that in the end we have all been made richer by the experience. It is as if my coming out gives them pieces of the puzzle they must have to complete their own lives.

It moves us along in the business of being a family. The challenges of family life are still there, but I believe we have moved to a more authentic place. One of my daughters recently touched my body, which has changed substantially, and said delightedly, "I can't believe you are the same father I had in the 80s!" And I am not.

As a gay Mexican-Chinese-American with a bit of Jewish and Mormon thrown in, you are truly multicultural. How has the "outsider archetype" expanded your perspective on life?

I am a Sephardic Jew via Mexico and Spain with one Chinese grandfather. Additionally, the Jews on both sides had intermarried with the native tribes of northern Mexico. I was also raised a Mormon in a Catholic country. A person of color in a Caucasian outpost established by the Mormon church in Mexico. A gay man in a straight world. Never one of "them," whatever that might mean. Like most of us, I knew early on that I was gay and that this was a secret that I could never tell anyone. I lived in a "witness-protection" program without the protection part, knowing that at any time I could betray myself and something terrible would happen.

All this was very painful growing up, often harrowing. But I have always been blessed with a sense of humor and a capacity to see through the sham. So, like many gay persons, I became irreverent. I developed "gravitas" for

real things and learned in time to poke fun at the unreal. Not always a popular stance, but I was already on the outside with little to lose.

When the need to individuate came along, I discovered that even as an outsider, I had been socialized by the tribe in profound ways. Had learned to hate parts of me. Had internalized the shame. Coming out for me was coming out of shame—that sense that I was not good enough. Being gay was only one aspect of it.

The good news is that I have come to see myself now as a global citizen, as one with all my sisters and brothers. For me, there was divine design in my learning to hold in consciousness many energies and traditions.

You look amazingly young for your age. What "beauty secrets" have you uncovered?

The simple answer is, "Chose your parents wisely." It is from them that we get certain genetic predispositions. But then, what is beauty? I've long given up on one standard of beauty. I know that often in our community, despite our protestations about espousing liberation and diversity, we have moved towards promoting certain rigid and suffocating clichés. This has caused much pain to many. I am saddened by the way we do to ourselves what the larger society has done to us for so long. We ought to be careful that we don't trade one lie for another, one prison for another. Beauty for me is radiance that is born from an authentic sense of self. We all recognize it when we see it, I think.

But as far as aging, I find that, as with all living things, if you love it, it will love you back. A friend recently joked that as gay boomer men come of age and choose to stay in a place of fear, plastic surgery is becoming a cottage industry. I understood the joke, but found little resonance with it. Culturally, I was raised in a society that valued aging and the status of being one of the elders. So even as a young person, I took it as a compliment when someone thought I was older than I looked. Young was a place you looked forward to leaving. As I am learning to move away from a place of fear and shame, I love where I am. My hope is to walk in beauty and grace from exactly that place where I am into the journey.

What final message do you have for a generation of younger men?

The same advice I would give to myself. Choose that which is life-affirming, not what is merely life-style affirming. Always choose life. We have lived in a place of darkness and death for too long. **H**

Role Model

Two years ago, Greg Congdon attempted suicide. He landed in a local hospital, where a good friend's mother worked. When she learned why he tried to kill himself—he was gay—she told her son. Soon every person in the small town of Troy, PA, knew. In an instant Greg turned from a popular high school football player and wrestler into a pariah. His teammates' shunning was particularly cruel. Without their support, or those of his coaches, his dream of playing college football was shattered.

Just one year later, Corey Johnson felt similarly alone and depressed in Masconomet, MA. But instead of attempting suicide, he confided his secret in a few people he trusted: His mother. A teacher. His best friend. A football coach.

All realized that Corey was the same human being he was before he told them. And all helped pave the way for him to come out to the football team that had elected him co-captain for the upcoming fall. The players' response was spectacular. "Hey," they told Corey, "That's cool. You're our friend, and nothing has changed." They covered his back when opposing teams taunted him. (It didn't work; the Chieftains won far more than they lost.) And on the bus ride home after a victory, they serenaded Corey with the gay anthem "YMCA."

Anyone looking at the state of gay sports at the turn of the millennium need not look beyond Greg Congdon and Corey Johnson.

Both teenagers' experiences are instructive. Across America there are many places like Troy, where high school students—and parents, teachers and coaches—cannot conceive that a person can be both an athlete and gay. But, increasingly, there are also places like Masconomet High, where it is not only conceivable, but true.

Gay men across the nation identified

painfully with Greg Congdon's story when they read about it in magazines or saw it on television. The same men felt thrilled when they saw Corey's story on the front page of *the New York Times*, heard him speak at the Millennium March on Washington, or saw him on 20/20.

For years, gay men who were interested in sports felt even more isolated from the mainstream than other gays. Lacking the out role models popping up with increasing frequency in other areas of life—entertainment, politics, even religion and the police force—they believed they were the only men on earth who liked athletics as well as other men.

There was little reason to think otherwise. From an early age, society sent a clear message: The playing field and sports arena (especially locker room) is a "fag-free" zone. From the elementary school physical education teacher who instructed "Don't throw like a girl" to the high school football coach who taunted "Don't block like a pussy"; to the locker room banter about chicks, gay boys and men suffered in tortured silence.

The effects could be devastating. Countless athletically-minded boys turned away from sports at an early age. They loved physical activity and competition, but they hated spending time in an environment where, should their secret be discovered, whatever success and popularity they had achieved would instantly (or so they imagined) vanish. Gay boys are engaged in a constant struggle for self-esteem. One of the wonderful aspects of sports is that it gives boys confidence. How tragic that this vital avenue has been blocked for so many youngsters.

Of course, countless other gay boys were not driven out of athletics. Unfortunately, many adopted the swaggering, macho,

misogynous—and homophobic—attitudes of their teammates and coaches. In order to fit into the sports world, they derided anyone weaker than they. Often, that meant putting down "faggots" and "queers." The devastation such self-hatred must have done to young psyches is incalculable.

Today, such destructive messages are fading. A new generation of coaches—men who have grown up knowing gay people, who understand that a team is made up of diverse individuals, and who simply do not fear homosexuality—are replacing their less-open-minded elders. Gay issues are discussed everywhere: in the classroom, on TV and the movie screen, even the sports pages.

And Corey Johnson is not the only athlete to come out. While no Dallas Cowboy superstar has yet admitted he is gay, other sports figures have: Professional baseball player Billy Bean. Australian rugby idol Ian Roberts. Olympic gold medal diver Greg Louganis and swimmer Bruce Hayes. High school and college track coach Eric Anderson. Oberlin College athletic director Michael Muska.

Those recent names—most of whom came out on their own terms—stand in stark contrast to an earlier list. The first wave of gay male athletes were men who were outed, and whose stories were often sad or frightening. Baseball player Glenn Burke died of AIDS. Soccer player Justin Fashanu committed suicide. Professional football player Dave Kopay was never able to attain his dream: getting back into the game as a coach. University of Pittsburgh football player Ed Gallagher jumped off a dam 12 days after his first same-sex encounter (see story on p. 32). Major League Baseball umpire Dave Pallone lost his job after being accused of having sex with a minor, even though the charge was

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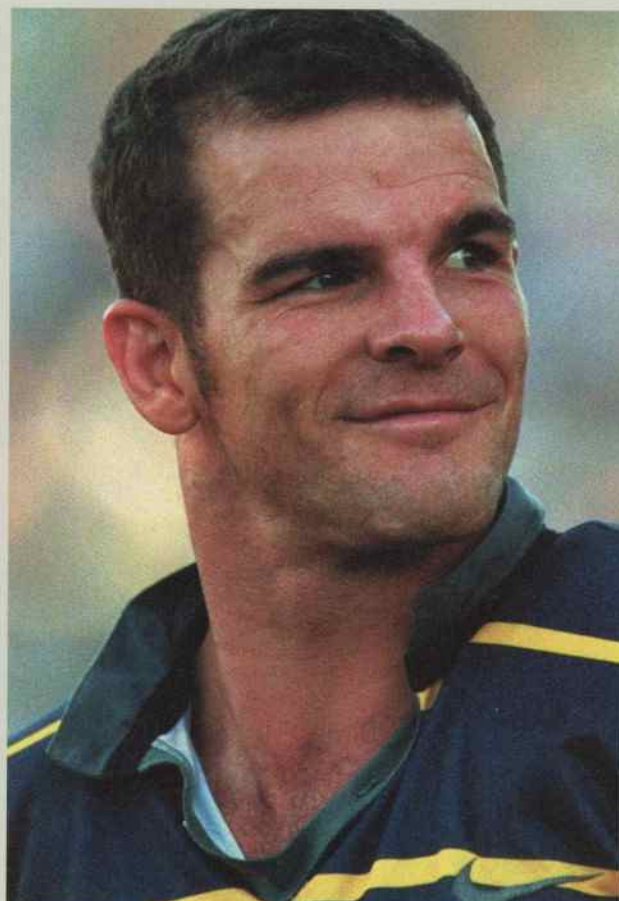
proven groundless and the district attorney dropped the case.

One of the major reasons for the change is the Internet. Young gay athletes and older weekend warriors—including many who are just now realizing in their 30s, 40s and beyond that they too have a place in the sports world—can now find web sites dedicated to gay sports organizations. They range from small and obscure (for example, "Crewheads" for gay rowers in Pittsburgh) to large and almost mainstream. The Gay Games VI, encompassing 31 sports ranging from badminton and judo to powerlifting and rugby are set for November 2002 in Sydney, Australia.

There are gay basketball tournaments in Boston this month, and San Diego next January. The International Gay and Lesbian Football (Soccer) Association sponsors a world championship in Germany this fall. There are enough Frontrunners (running), softball, volleyball, water polo and wrestling clubs and leagues to give Reggie White heart failure. And if you click on the golf link at outsports.com, you'll even find a way to purchase rainbow and "pride" golf balls, markers, gloves, umbrellas—and, yes, putters.

Progress in the sports world can be measured many ways, and visibility is only one. The Massachusetts Department of Education's Safe Schools Program (which deals with gay and lesbian issues) provides special workshops for coaches and athletic administrators. The impact can be subtle, but telling. After attending a workshop, one high school coach asked a player to stop

making homophobic comments. The boy refused. The coach threatened to call the colleges that were recruiting the athlete, and tell them they did not want someone of his questionable character on their campus.

The young man snickered. The coach picked up the phone. "Don't test me," he challenged.

What happens in Massachusetts is not always mirrored in the rest of the country,

however. Several thousand miles away, University of Hawaii football players recently objected to the nickname of the school sports teams—the Rainbow Warriors—and the 77-year-old rainbow logo. It reminded them of the gay pride symbol, they said. Bowing to pressure, administrators renamed the gridiron teams the Warriors, and designed a new, "more aggressive" logo.

The message that sends to gay sports-lovers, especially youngsters, is hardly positive. Neither was the recent flap over *Catholic Digest's* story on Dave Pallone. The largely positive story focused on the former umpire's outreach and education in the corporate and collegiate spheres, including his efforts to reach young Catholics who are struggling with their sexual identity. Dozens of angry letter-writers reacted instead to the magazine's choice of profiling a "practicing homosexual."

The negative sports stories are giving way to the positive. The fact that HERO is devoting an entire issue to the subject is one indication. The example of Corey Johnson is another.

And speaking of Corey: For the Massachusetts high school football captain, life after coming out has been nothing less than spectacular. With the help of a straight teammate, he found a boyfriend. He's received countless honors and awards, and become a nationally known inspirational speaker. And next fall—after a year off to catch his breath—he'll head to college. Right now, he's thinking Ivy League. **H**



The Gay Games

A HOME FOR HEROES IN 2002

Last month, the attention of the world focused on Sydney for the Olympic Games. Our television screens have been full of images of athletes pushing their bodies to the limit as they compete in premiere, state-of-the-art athletic facilities. By the time this magazine hits newsstands, the closing anthem will have played, the excitement will be finished, and the athletes will have gone home. For the moment, the facilities will be standing empty.

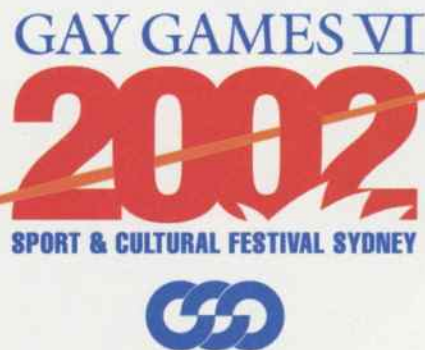
But in the fall of 2002, the Sydney Olympic Park will come alive with another group of extraordinary athletes and their fans when the city plays host to the 2002 Gay Games.

The Games were founded in 1981 by Dr. Tom Waddell, a 1968 U.S. Olympic decathlete. Conceived by Dr. Waddell to advance three principles—inclusion, participation and achievement of personal best—the Games originally appealed to the gay and lesbian community and answered a need for a sense of inclusion in all areas of life for a segment of the population that had been historically marginalized. Gays and lesbians have been portrayed as weak in both body and will. We've been depicted in literature and characterized in popular lore as anti-heroes, lacking in the heroic qualities of fortitude, resolve, perseverance, courage and

nobility of purpose. The Gay Games gave gay athletes a forum to experience their personal achievement in the context of being gay. It allowed them to feel their own heroism and demonstrate it to everyone watching.

Ken McDonald is an athlete who played volleyball for Team Vancouver at the 1998 Games in Amsterdam. In an internet posting, he

recalls his experience:



recalls his experience:

"Shudders kept running through my body. I had never really understood how proud you could feel before that. It's the kind of pride that makes you know all of that other stuff is their problem, not yours."

"I remember sitting at the closing ceremony," says theater director Charles Randolph-Wright, recalling the 1994 Gay Games in New York. "I wasn't expecting it to be such an emotional thing for me, but I was really moved. All of a sudden, when that fanfare played and all the athletes walked in, it just hit me—all these people are here, being themselves, being proud, being excellent. Sitting a little ways from me was this very old man and I looked over at him at one point when everyone came in and tears were streaming down his face and I knew that never in his lifetime did he expect to see something like this."

Over the 18 year history of the Games, the Federation has grown to include members from Australia, Canada, Germany, The Netherlands, Switzerland and the United States. The ranks of participants and audience have expanded to include a number of straight athletes and over 100,000 enthusiastic straight

fans. This should not be surprising, as the Federation of Gay Games makes a point to welcome anyone and everyone who wishes to participate in competition, spectatorship, and cultural festivals.

The Games encourage participation in sports regardless of the participant's ability. Nonetheless, the Games have developed a noteworthy level of competition. The two most recent Gay Games boasted world Master's records in swimming and track and field. Some sports, such as swimming, are sanctioned events, meaning their records are recognized internationally.

Held every four years, midway between meetings of their larger sibling, the Olympics, the Gay Games have been increasing in both popularity and financial significance since Dr. Waddell held his first event in San Francisco in 1982. At that first Gay Games, there were 1,350 athletes participating in eleven sports. The event had a

total budget of \$125,000. By the 1994 games in New York, the number of athletes had grown to 11,000, the budget to \$6.5 million, and the economic impact to the area over \$150 million. The 2002 Gay Games is expected to draw 35,000 visitors to New South Wales and may provide even larger revenues for the city were seen in Amsterdam.

It adds up to a tremendous success story. But the Gay Games has had its share of obstacles along the way, not the least of which have been lodged by the United States Olympic Committee (USOC). In the year of the Gay Games' inception, the USOC obtained a temporary restraining order barring the organization from using the name "Gay Olympic Games." Presumably the USOC feared the public would confuse the fledgling San Francisco event with their own high-stakes spectacle. The Gay Games sponsors complied with the court order and removed the word "Olympic," leaving the Games with their current name. The state court's opinion was rendered final in 1987, when the Supreme Court narrowly ruled to disallow the Gay Games use of the word "Olympic." Tragically, two weeks later, Dr. Waddell died of AIDS.

The USOC was not satisfied with the court's ruling. In 1991, their attorneys filed a petition to cancel the legal registration of the "Gay Games" name and logo. Only a personal appeal from the Federation of Gay Games to the USOC Executive Director persuaded him to drop the matter. In June of the following year, the USOC finally consented to discuss how the two organizations could work together, as opposed to working against one another.

The judicial system is not the only branch of U.S. Government with which the Federation has had to wrangle. In 1991, in line with the Gay Games' stated principles of inclusion and participation, the Federation contacted then President George Bush requesting that he over-

turn the U.S. immigration policies barring HIV-positive individuals from entering the country. Bush offered no concession on the policy. But two years later, with a new presidential administration in place, the Federation found a more sympathetic audience for their concerns. Federation Co-Presidents Susan Kennedy and Rick Peterson met with representatives Donna Shalala, Secretary of the U.S. Health and Human Services, to request Gay Games IV in New York be identified as a "designated event," a necessary step in obtaining a 10-day blanket waiver enabling HIV-positive athletes to enter the United States to participate. In response to their lobbying, Attorney General Janet Reno signed a blanket waiver allowing HIV infected individuals to enter the United States in the 1994 Gay Games without requiring special visas or special applications.

While official sanction of the Games has grown, so has the scope of the Gay Games themselves. Increasingly, the Games have turned their focus to include concerns outside of athletics. For example, the Federation has announced plans to partner with community organizations, universities, government and non-government organizations at the Sydney Games for a series of conferences and workshops on human rights and social justice issues. And outreach programs will attempt to take the message of the games to South America, South Africa and central Europe, as well as a focused effort to reach young gay men and women in Australia's rural communities.

Expanding on the theme of inclusion, the Federation says Gay Games VI will attempt to follow the example set in Amsterdam, where the Games were viewed by many as a celebration for the entire city, not just the gay community.

The athletic competition in Sydney will be accompanied by a cultural festival aimed at the wider populous. Music, theater, plays and multimedia works are scheduled on a daily basis at the arts venues and open-air performance spaces around Sydney. Plans are in the works for a choral festival with over 2000 singers. Gay and lesbian marching bands will parade through the streets.

And it is fortunate that Olympic Park is in Australia, whose slice of the gay and lesbian tourism pie has doubled each year since 1990. Pledges of not just tolerance but active partnership by Tourism New South Wales and the Australian Tourist Commission portend well for the 2002 Games. Moreover, Sydney and New South Wales have some of the strongest legislation in the world to protect the rights of gays, lesbians and transgendered people. It's hard to imagine these facts were overlooked by the Federation when various cities' bids for the 2002 games were considered. **H**

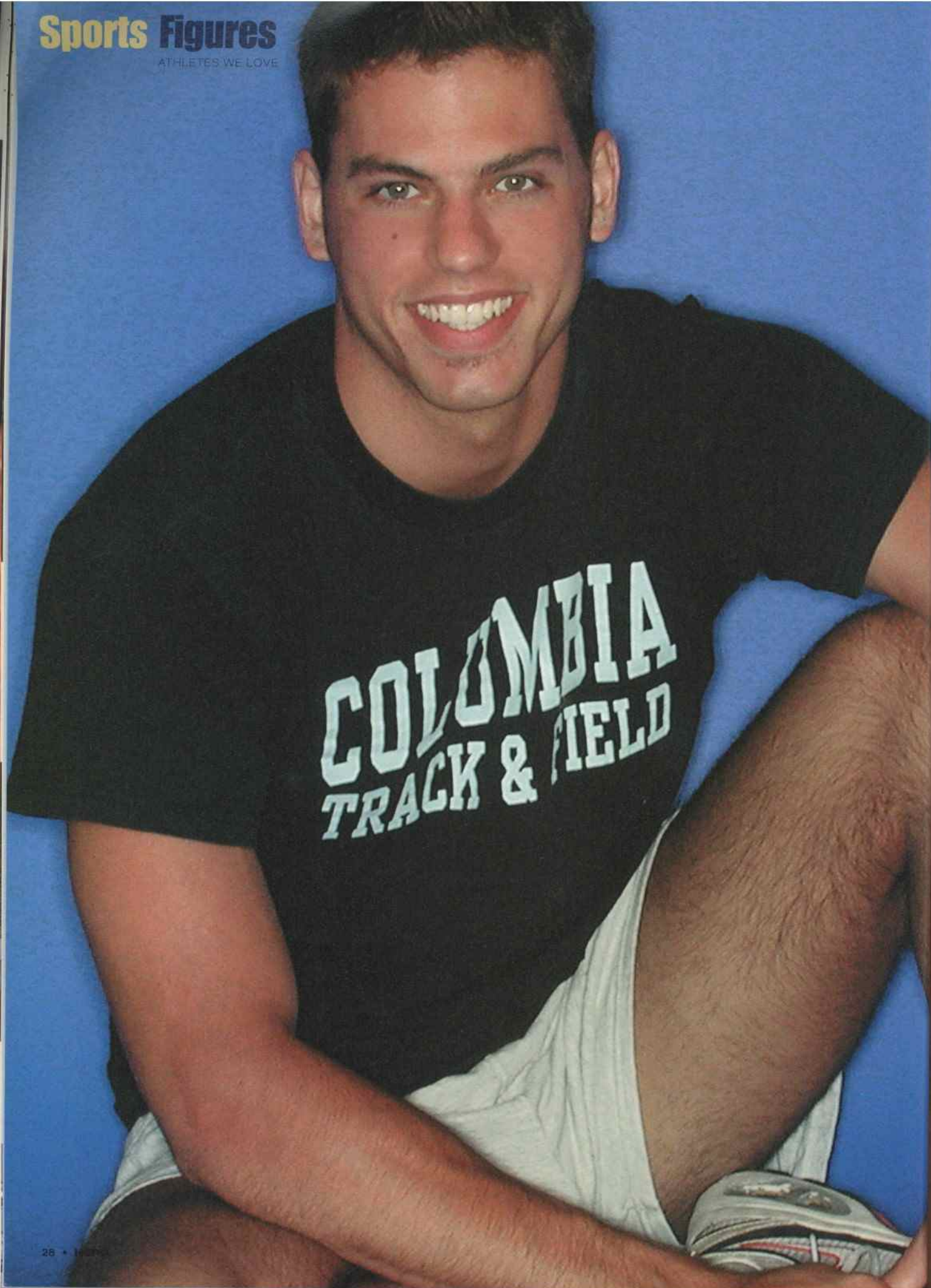

Discovering your gay identity has always been an awkward and nerve-racking time for young gay men. Would being a top-notch state track star make things harder? With fierce green eyes and an adorable smile, Brandon Sproat, 20 years old, shares his story of coming out, running at Columbia, and staying on the right track to success.

When did you first come to terms with your sexuality?

It wasn't until my junior year of high school that I finally accepted myself. I was so submerged in studying and running track that I didn't even realize how miserable I was. Finally, after trying to have a girlfriend, I knew I was only kidding myself.

I eventually got rid of all the self-hatred and started dealing with it.

How is your experience at Columbia University different from high school?

Well, I went to Columbia because it was literally the furthest school away from home. I was ready to be a gay man. [I've found most people in] in New York are very liberal and in touch with social issues. I realized that any discrimination here was just self-imposed. I had my own stereotypes, and I assumed I would

not be treated fairly. It turned out to be just totally the opposite. I have other gay friends and the people that need to know about me, know. We go to Chelsea and hang out, checking out the scene. It sure is a lot more comfortable and less demanding than when I was trying to hide being gay in high school. Sure, some people at school may have a problem with homosexuality, but in a city like New York and at a school like Columbia, if they choose to be bigots and discriminate, then they are the minority.

Are you out to your family?

Well, I told my twin sister Arianne first. We were never really that close in high school; she was into the social scene and I was into studying. But one day I called her and we were talking really frank about things. We talked for a long time and she told me some real personal things about her life. The whole conversation was really touching. Then she asked why I didn't have a girlfriend. I finally told her that I was gay. I've never been this close with her in all of my life.

Did her reaction make it easier to tell your parents?

Yeah, I realized that they're my family and they really do love me for who I am. I intended to tell my mom in person but it came out over the phone. She took it as well as I could have possibly hoped. My biggest fear was that I was going to let her down. I was always trying to be the perfect son. I thought that being gay would detract from that. She is very supportive and told me that in her eyes I've never let her down. My dad still doesn't know. We don't really have a good relationship, so I don't think it would be that imperative that I tell him right away. I'm pretty sure he may suspect after my mom told him that I would never have a girlfriend. I have the groundwork set up for telling him, it's just a matter of time.

You had an incredible high school track career.

Well, I started running my freshman year

of high school. I had a really great coach that was like a father to me. If it wasn't for his help and guidance, I would not have broken all these school records. By the time I was in my junior year, I was State Champion in Intermediate Hurdles. I was ranked seventh in the nation. It was so early and nobody was running that fast. In every race I was running, everyone expected me to win. It added a lot of pressure. Senior year, I had a bad injury; I tore my quadricep. The rest of the season was downhill from there. I don't know how far things would have gone.

And now you're running track at Columbia University?

Yeah. I had some trouble earlier on with stretching the scar tissue (I was still dealing with the injury), but I had some pretty good races last season. I'm very well on my way to recovery. I've been training all summer at school under strength-training coaches, and at home in Arizona I've been training with my high school coach. This month the season will actually start; we'll see what happens.

What are your plans after Columbia?

Well, since I'm majoring in computer science, I'd like to start a career in that field. I would like to live in New York, but the weather in Los Angeles is also very tempting.

Any plans for the Gay Games in Sydney 2002?

My injury will always be something I have to be conscious of, but I'll work around it. I would love to go, but it will depend on how the next couple of seasons go.

What advice would you give to a young guy who is dealing with coming out?

Things seem and may very well be difficult, but eventually the dust settles and you realize that the people in your life who you love and trust need to know who you really are. **H**

DAN VEATCH swimmer

Dan Veatch has been competing and winning as a swimmer since he was a kid. His aquatic accomplishments include competing around the globe on the U.S. National team, representing the United States at the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea, and winning four gold medals at the 1998 Gay Games in Amsterdam. Now 35, Dan is a financial management controller for a large investment bank in San Francisco. But when he's not working, he continues to excel in Masters swimming competitions, and this year he broke the Masters swimming world record in his age group by nearly four seconds in the 200-meter backstroke.

How long have you been swimming competitively?

I started swimming when I was 7 because I was an overweight and hyperactive kid. My parents thought it would be a great way to deal with both issues without a weight control program and Ritalin. By the time I was 10, I was ranked first in the nation for my age in the 50-yard backstroke. I've always enjoyed the sport. It's been part of my life and identity for as long as I can remember.

What is the biggest payoff for your dedication?

Swimming is the perfect stress release after a long day in the office. The endorphin release after a hard workout is a natural high. Swimming has given me so many unbelievable opportunities. I've traveled around the world with the U.S. National Team and have made so many great friends through the sport.

What's the most challenging thing about training?

The time commitment is probably the most difficult thing. Every week I try to swim at least 25,000 yards, lift weights three times, and take two ab classes! It's usually a juggling act to work my regimen around my personal and professional lives. Fortunately, I have an amazing boyfriend, Andres, who thoroughly respects my commitment to swimming. I also have an incredible coach, Valeriy Boreyko, who is a wonderful motivator and an exceptional person.

Has being gay ever been an issue with any coaches or fellow swimmers?

I wasn't open about my sexuality until I moved to California in 1992. Since then, I haven't experienced too many problems with coaches or fellow swimmers. I like breaking the stereotype that gays can't be tough, athletic and competitive. I recently won an open water swimming race in Sonoma and was awarded a large plaque that's engraved with the words "Overall Male." I love it! It still makes me laugh.

Who's your hero?

My boyfriend. He is the sweetest, most honest, generous guy I have ever met. We've been together for two and a half years, but it still feels like our honeymoon. He unconditionally supports everything I do and he really seems to enjoy watching me compete. He started swimming almost a year ago and he's doing really well. Our goal is to swim together in the Gay Games in Sydney.

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George Birimisa was one of the first openly gay playwrights in the United States. In the 60s, his off- and off-off-Broadway works in New York (Georgie Porgie, Mr. Jello, Daddy Violet) made him one of the pioneers of the gay theater canon. Now 76 and living in San Francisco, Mr. Birimisa can also list "bodybuilder" among his accomplishments. He began training at age 60, and since then has competed in the Gay Games four times, winning a gold medal in his age group in Vancouver in 1990 and winning a bronze in Amsterdam in 1998, competing against guys 14 years younger. He's looking forward to competing in Australia at Gay Games 2002.

When did you start bodybuilding?

When I turned 60 is when I really got into it, and for years I would go to the gym four or five times a week and work out very heavily.

What do you enjoy about the sport?

The most important thing for me is that it makes me look good and feel good and powerful about myself. When you get old,

you slow down. There's no way to avoid it. But with bodybuilding and aerobics, you can slow down the slowing down. I see so many old people who end up with their lives just a nightmare.

Last September I had a heart attack and had quadruple open-heart surgery. Then about five months ago I had cancer of the bladder. But I've recovered from both, and I've been back at the gym. I was able to recover so quickly because I was in shape. I don't look like I did before, but I'm working on it.

What does it take to achieve success in bodybuilding?

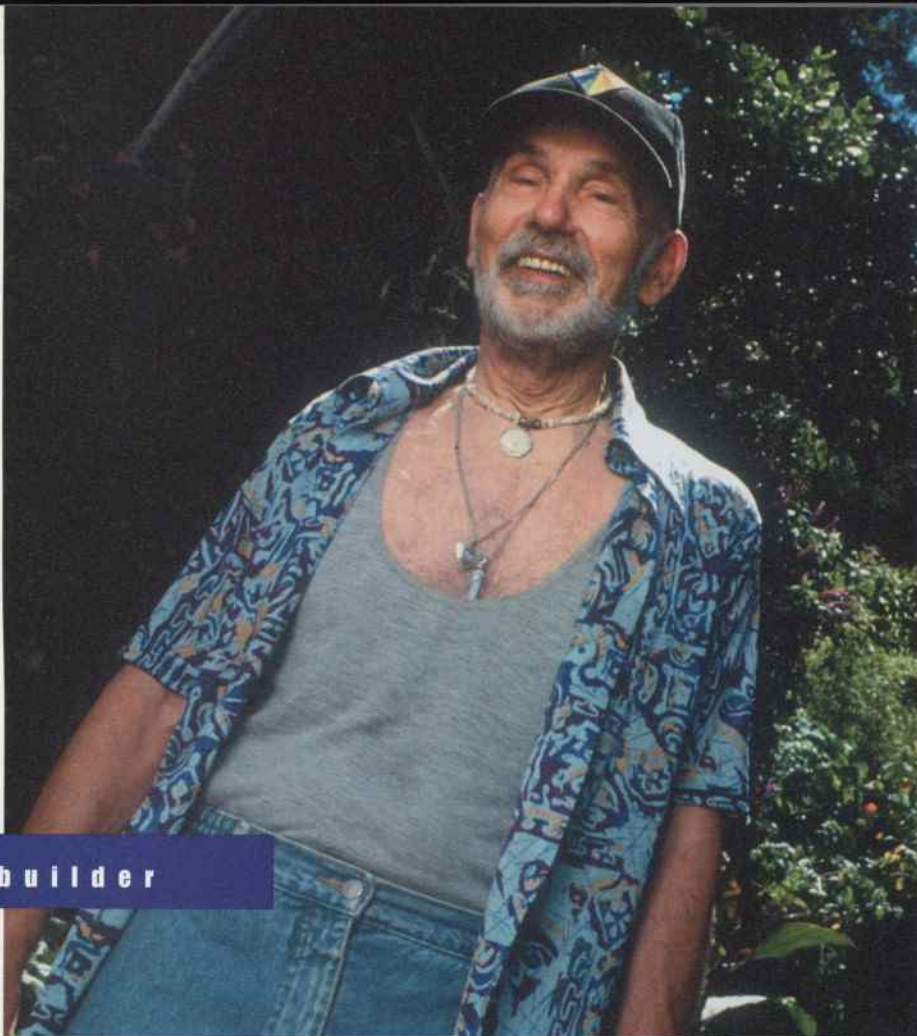
Your diet and working out are the most important things. You can workout forever without the proper diet and supplements and you won't get anywhere. You really have to be disciplined.

Who's your hero?

Tom Ammiano. He's a Supervisor here in San Francisco who ran for mayor against Willie Brown. He's a real shitkicker and comedian. Tom works so hard and is so up front about being a gay man. He's really quite a guy.

Are you happy with where you are in life?

Most of my life was spent before Stonewall. Before Stonewall, you'd go to a bar to be with gay people. There were no other places to congregate, no community centers, no churches. Everything was done surreptitiously and everyone was ashamed of being gay. I've been able to go through all of that and come out the other side, which is a glorious trip. New things open up to me all

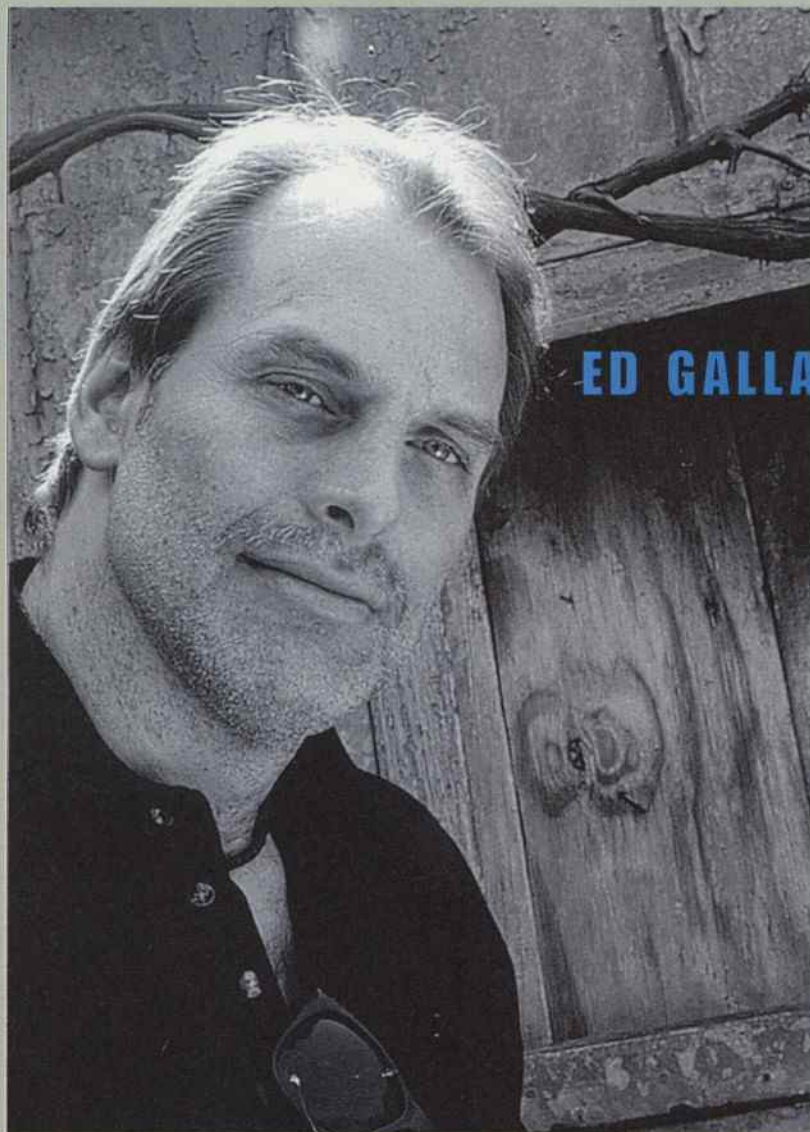

the time in terms of growing as a human being. I'm 76 years old and I'm still going through this stuff. I have to say, though, thank God I was born a gay man. That has been my salvation, in that it got me thinking and exploring myself creatively. I like where I've gotten and wouldn't have it any other way.

ED GALLAGHER former footballer

A suicide attempt left football star Ed Gallagher in a wheelchair for life.

Now he spends his time preventing others from doing the same thing.

Ed Gallagher began playing football in high school.

Soon he had a football scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh, and he eventually tried out for the New York Jets. With all his success, though, he wasn't able to reconcile the sportsman people saw him for with the gay man he was inside, and in 1985, at the age of 27, Ed tried to commit suicide by diving off the Kensico Dam in Valhalla, NY. The 90-foot fall didn't kill him, but it left him a quadriplegic with no feeling below his chest and limited use of his hands. Eventually, Ed found the courage to turn his life around and formed *Alive to Thrive*, an organization devoted to suicide prevention, emotional and sexual health, creativity and potential, and the free expression and rights of all individuals. He also has his own public-access cable TV talk-

show, *Mister Ed's Corral*, recently appeared on Howard Stern, landed a guest appearance on *As the World Turns*, and just finished his first novel. He insists he's done nothing heroic, but Ed illustrates the power of opening up and speaking out.

Did your sports success come from a love of the game?

Football is a great way to tackle gorgeous running backs and get away with it. [Laughs.] But I didn't love football. I started playing in 1972 because I wanted to find an identity. I started getting a crush on one of my friends and I didn't understand it. I had a lot of internalized homophobia, and I wanted to be a jock to attach a different label to myself. I was terrible in my first year, but the second year I made the varsity

team and my coach was really good. Then I was All-State and All-County the next year and got a full ride to the University of Pittsburgh.

Was there hostility towards gay guys in school?

Coaches were always saying stuff like "Don't block like a faggot." When I'd get called that in high school, it would really get to me inside. I didn't really know what was going on with me, and I was battling my own condemnation. This was in the early 70s, and what I knew about being gay was what Archie Bunker thought about it on *All in the Family*. I saw effeminence and I thought that was homosexuality. I always felt, "How am I going to be gay?"

What was college like?

College was scary. With all that was going on in my head I thought, "Are they ever going to crack through my shell? Am I going to be able to do this in the middle of the biggest homophobic sport of all?" I dated women and played John Wayne, got liquored up and had flings with girls. If anyone presumed that I might be gay I got really angry. I should have said, "Why? Are you interested?" [Laughs] I had fantasies in college, though. Had a little fascination with the frat guys. I had the physical but not the psychological balls to pursue it. I internalized it for years.

What made you want to end your life?

In 1985, I'd had girlfriends, but hungered to experiment with guys and to explore my creative side. I was taking songwriting classes in New York City, but I was keeping it all secret. I didn't want people to know. I started going more and more to New York, hanging around Washington Square, and getting more and more curious about gay culture. I got tanked up one night and went and hung out at a club, and it felt so good to be around all these guys. This guy was checking me out and one thing led to another. I wanted to go with him but also wasn't ready to go—I wasn't prepared psychologically yet, just physically. Anyway, we went back to his place. I had never even kissed a guy, so that was pretty amazing, and we fooled around. The next morning I left really early. I had to regroup and I got desperately lonely. "What have I done?" I thought. It was just when HIV was beginning to be tested and people didn't really know much for sure. I got really upset about what had happened and convinced myself that I doomed to die of AIDS. I thought "How am I going to go back to a girlfriend?" and "You're a carrier. Even if you breathe on your mother, you're killing her." That was the trigger incident. It was ignorance on my part, but I was out of my mind with guilt and fear. And though it was hurtful, I kept it all silent.

I woke up on March 1, 1985, and saw my

Thunderbird sitting out in the driveway. I drove out to the dam, laid down at the edge, and just rolled over. I fell 90 feet, and I hit about twice before I came to a stop. A medical student saw me come down. He ran over to where I stopped. I must have been conscious, because I asked him "Did I do it?" I had a broken wrist, ankle, and neck.

How did you turn your life around?

After the accident when I was in the hospital, I had a doctor with a particularly horrible bedside manner tell me "We may have to amputate your legs." That really startled me. I had wanted them to leave me to die. The hardest thing was looking at my family and friends and not wanting to hurt them but not wanting to be there either. I had been telling everyone to fuck off. But when the doctor said that I was like, "Hey, I know I fucked up badly, but please don't let them take my legs." I felt that my survival, maybe all the things I was flipping out about didn't mean a rat's ass when it came to the bigger picture. Maybe there's something I'm supposed to do. I started to write poetry and ended up publishing my first book *Will I Live Another Day Before I Die?*

I don't look at any of this as heroic. I was confronted with what I thought at the time was an impossible situation. I thought it was better to die by suicide than to have your family know you were a "faggot" who died of AIDS. It took a long time for me to get over that. I got very spiritual.

You speak to a lot of kids around the country. What do you tell them?

When I was a kid I didn't have anyone to talk to about my feelings. I struggled with it all the time. I always tell kids one of the most destructive drugs you can swallow is silence. It'll blow up in your face in some deranged way. You've got to open up and talk to people about your problems. The first day of weightlifting hurts like hell, but the next day you do it, it gets better; the next day, even better. Same thing with opening up.

What do you think the climate is for gay kids who like to play sports today?

When I was younger and trying to play and live up to football, I didn't think anything gay meshed with the sports image. It's still that way in a lot of places. Not to take away from anyone's success—because it's really great to see the possibilities—but with Barney Frank and gay issues being discussed in school in Massachusetts, it's a hell of a lot easier for a Corey Johnson in Massachusetts to say he's gay than Joe Jones in Tennessee or Texas. I don't think many guys can be openly gay and be a full-chip athlete and get the full ride to college.

What was it like being a guest on Howard Stern?

Howard Stern and Robin treated me great. We rammed Dr. Laura. She's supposed to be so supportive of children, but think of how many kids might hear what she says and be devastated.

Who's your hero?

John Lennon is the reason I started song writing. I started writing songs after he died. It stimulated my need to write and get more public about my writing. A Kennedy...anyone who can inspire people emotionally and reach them through words in a non-violent way is a hero to me.

Everyone's in a wheelchair. Some chairs are just more visible than others. Cancer, heart disease, obesity, AIDS, blindness, depression. Everybody's climbing their version of the mountain. One of the reasons we're here is to be there for each other and help each other with that climb up the mountain. If you want to get up and have a reason to live, you need to tap into your unique talents and visions. If you do only what others say, you're only going to go through the motions of living.

Gabriel Caldwell basketball

Gabriel Caldwell has been playing basketball since he was 7 years old. Originally from Austin, Texas, he dribbled his way across the court in high school and college, ultimately playing for Liberty University in Virginia as shooting guard and sometimes point guard. Now 24, Gabriel lives in Los Angeles and is a graduate student in Clinical Psychology, but he hasn't left B-ball behind. On Wednesday nights he shoots hoops and hones his game with the Lambda Basketball Association as they prepare for Sydney 2002.

What makes a good basketball player?

You have to be very devoted to working out and conditioning yourself, because what shows on the court is what you do off the court. If you put a lot of time and effort into training and shooting, it shows. I think first you have to be in shape, so conditioning is a huge part. If you're a shooting guard, you're called to score, so you have to practice shooting on a daily basis. Ball-handling and strength training are also important. You have to be pretty physical in basketball.

What's the challenge in improving your game?

Basketball is a roller-coaster ride. One day you have the best game of your life, then the next night you're horrible. When there's no consistency, you can easily get down on yourself, so it's important to not always just look at the results. Just keep your head up and play as well as you know how. Once you get to the point as a player where you get on top of things, you have to work at maintaining it.

Has being gay ever been an issue on the court?

I wasn't out until I came to California, but it wasn't really an issue in college. When you play on a team of 11 in college and get to know each other pretty well, travelling and practicing all the time, it's like having 10 or 11 family members. It's more about who's OK and can play than about each other's personal lives.

What are the benefits of playing with the Lambda team?

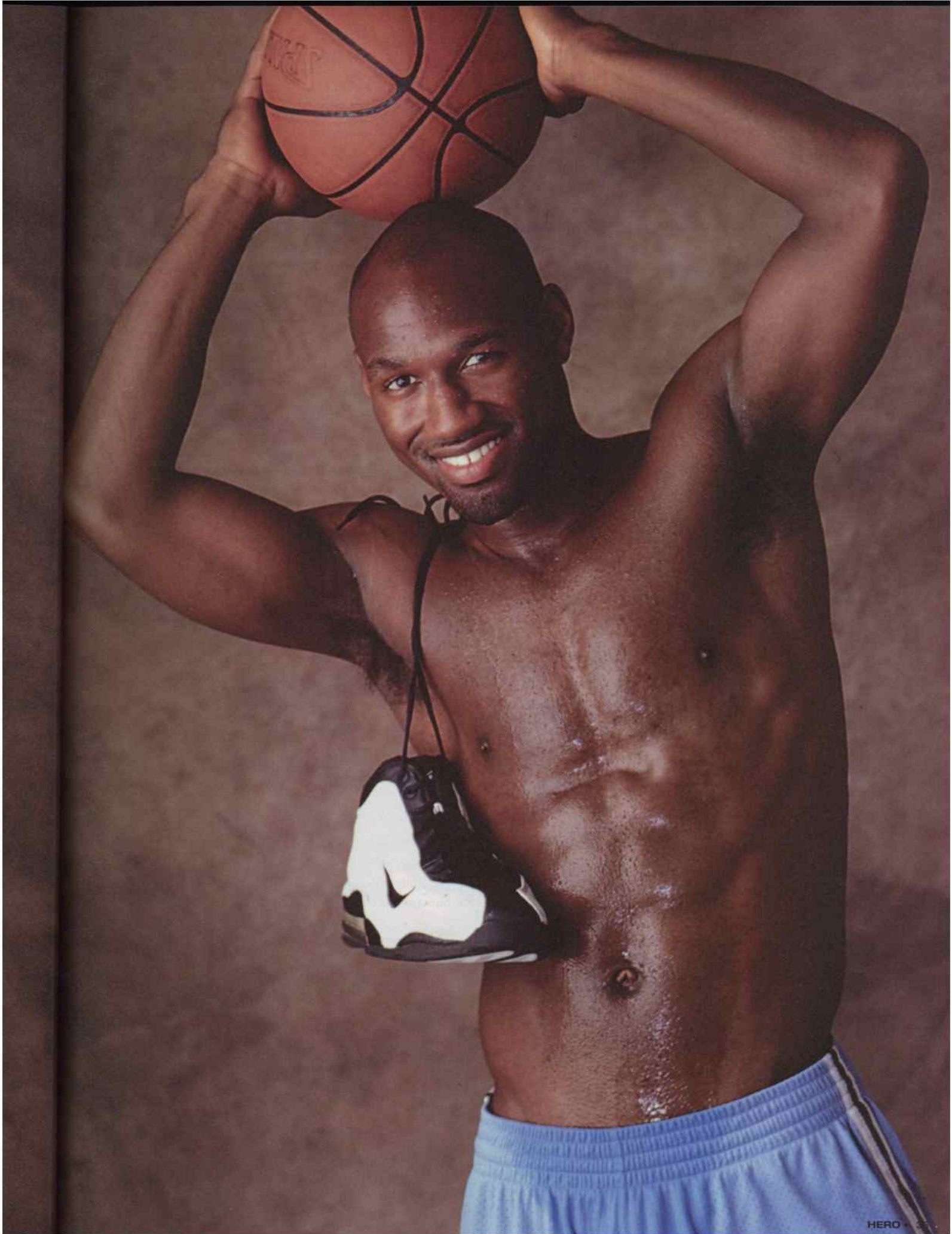
It's cool to meet people who like sports and that you can talk to about other things besides the types of things you'd talk about at a club or bar. I've met some pretty good friends.

Who's your hero?

Athletically, like every other kid in America, my hero is Michael Jordan. I admire the things he's done, not just because he can score, but I feel like his game all-around was just amazing. He faces down challenges and pushes himself to do the things he does. If you play basketball and know how hard it is and how tiring a season can be, to be able to push through all that and win—it's pretty amazing.

just don't call it Soccer

The International Gay & Lesbian Football Association (IGLFA) plays true football, which looks a lot like soccer to the casual observer in America.

"Soccer is used in the USA, Ireland, Australia and a couple of other former British colonies," says JC Cummings, Co-President of the IGLFA. "When Ireland played both Gaelic Football and Association Football, a person who played Association Football was called a 'soccer.' The rest is history." Cummings says the sport most Americans call football is known as "American Football" in the rest of the world.

Regardless of which name you prefer, inter-

The idea for the IGLFA began growing almost 14 years ago, when a group of four men's teams who were participating in the 1986 Gay Games decided to continue meeting each year to play football. In 1991, at what was now their annual tournament, the IGLFA was made official.

Today, the IGLFA has established the resources and credibility to not only play on premium turf, but to attract some of the best volunteer talent around.

"People are interested in us because we have good fields, good refs, good tournament structure and lots of playing time," says Cummings. He also cites the more intangible qualities of the IGLFA, "Most of all we are good friends, we love good food, we visit tourist destinations together. There is a real sense of welcome and a daringness to reach out. And, of course, there are always those attractive men!"

The IGLFA also welcomes straight members. Cummings says that many teams have two or three straight players, some of whom are blood relations to a gay member and have found the sport a wonderful way to share their support.

How has the mainstream world of football reacted to the IGLFA? Cummings says that is never been an issue.

"I have never experienced a negative reaction and have never heard a story about one. Most of the well-established, fully active teams that play in the IGLFA tournaments are also registered in local mainstream leagues. All of our referees work or volunteer in the mainstream leagues as well," he says.

The biggest event this year for the IGLFA is the 2000 Gay & Lesbian World Football Championships being held in Cologne, Germany this month.

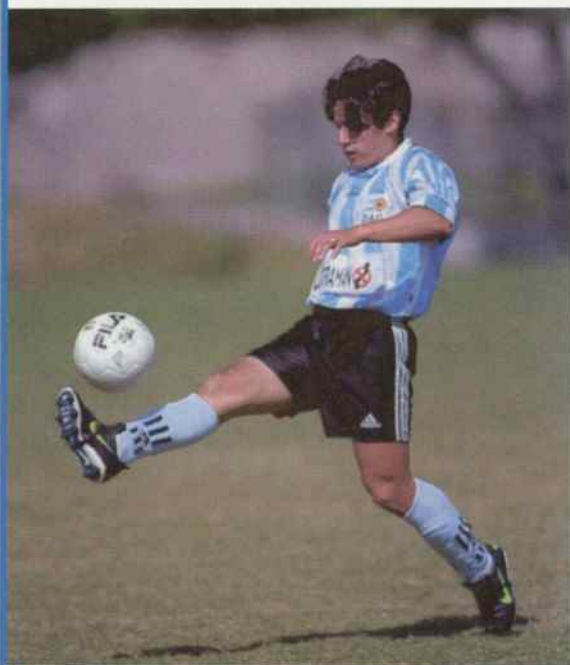
By the time you read this, the events will be well underway, but Cummings described his expectations before we went to press.

"This event is going to be a big deal in Cologne and is well supported by the mainstream. The Lord Mayor, who is a member of a conservative political party, is an official sponsor of the tournament and will even host a reception for the IGLFA Board Members at the Historic City Hall."

Cummings says that the Cologne week-long gay pride celebration will be held in conjunction with the anniversary celebration of the sport of football and the hosting of the world football championships in the city.

"There will also be entertainment, parties and much to celebrate even if the players end up too tired to experience everything!" says Cummings. He adds that regardless of which teams win, the real joy, as far as IGLFA members are concerned, is coming together and having fun.

"When the day is done, we celebrate our players and our volunteers. The IGLFA is a family made up of great athletes, referees, volunteers, spouses, artists and at least one great photographer!" Cummings pauses and laughs, "Have I covered everybody?" **H**

national football has become one of the most popular, and some say glamorous, sports played today. And as is happening in many other sports leagues, the presence of a gay group of athletes is quickly eroding away stereotypes.

I believe I owe a lot to organizations like the IGLFA."

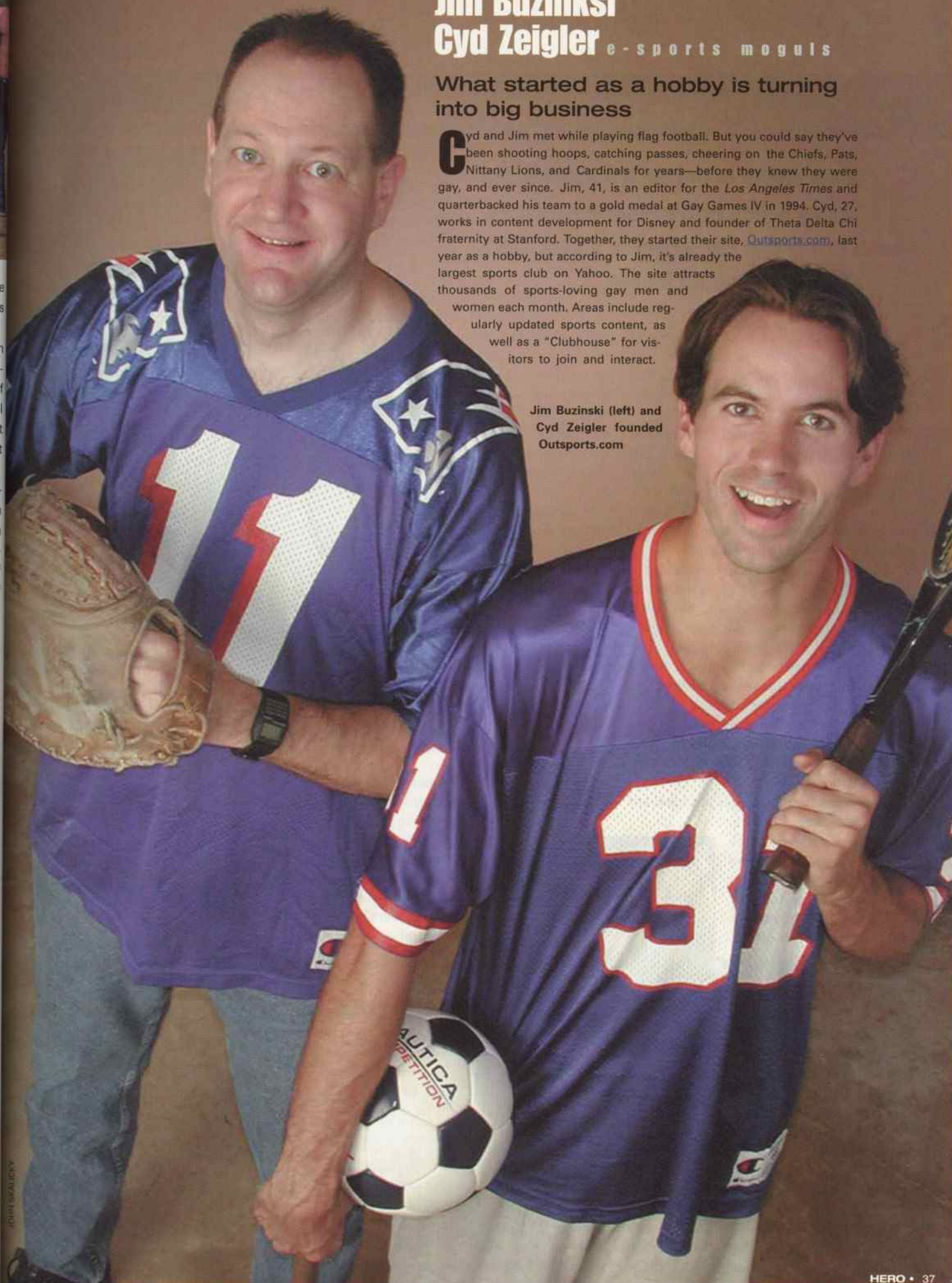

big expectations: The National Gay & Lesbian Pilots Association

"When you're in the air, it's about being a human being, testing your boundaries and respecting the forces of nature. It's a wonderful feeling."

In the very straight and machismo world of flying, no group is doing more to change perceptions while having fun than the National Gay Pilots Association (NGPA).

"There's something about flying that transcends issues of gender or sexual orientation," says Robert Moore, executive director for the NGPA. "When you're in the air, it's about being a human being, testing your boundaries and respecting the forces of nature. It's a wonderful feeling."

That feeling of wonder is helped by the NGPA's choice of destinations. The group descends upon Provincetown, MA, each year for their annual summit. Other gathering locations throughout the year can include San Francisco, Key West, South Padre Island, New Orleans and Seattle, and even Paris has made the wish list.

While the NGPA currently has over 760 members from all 50 states and 10 other countries, the organization began on a decidedly smaller scale.

"It all started with five guys at a backyard barbecue," says Moore, laughing. "They each worked in aviation and talked about how great it would be to get together with other gay pilots to talk shop, show off their planes, discuss flying and do some career networking."

Moore says networking opportunities for members employed in aviation careers have been one of the greatest values of the group. "Straight pilots in the flying industry certainly have this sort of career advantage; the NGPA was a way to help leverage similar opportunities for gay pilots," he says.

Today, NGPA membership is made up of 40% professional pilots, 40% private pilots and hobbyists, and 20% "other aviation related" (mechanics, air traffic controllers,

flight attendants and general aviation enthusiasts). The group is also proud to have many lesbian members who participate, further defying the male pilot stereotype.

In addition to flying and networking, the NGPA is committed to expanding social boundaries through a variety of educational initiatives, outreach events and social programs. The NGPA Education Fund was established in 1995 to assist candidates from the gay and lesbian community who are pursuing careers as professional pilots.

Last year, the program awarded four separate scholarships, including one to Paul "Randy" Hill. He recently completed a Bachelor of Science degree in Aviation at San Jose State University and is now enrolled in the commercial flight-training program at Sierra Academy in Oakland.

"Receiving such an honor from my fellow community of gay pilots was a source of inspiration," says Hill. "I'm very proud to be a part of the NGPA."

Moore says membership is growing. "I still get emails and letters from people who have seen an NGPA ad and tell me they've never met another gay pilot and can't wait to come to the next event."

Flying can build a bridge between straight fathers who are now or former

pilots, and their gay sons, says Moore. "I've heard this story so many times, that a mutual love and respect for aviation made it easier for a father and son to connect and ultimately aided the coming out process for both sides."

Baker (who's straight) was honored with the first "Rainbow" for the role he played in American Airline's decision to extend domestic partner benefits to the company's gay employees.

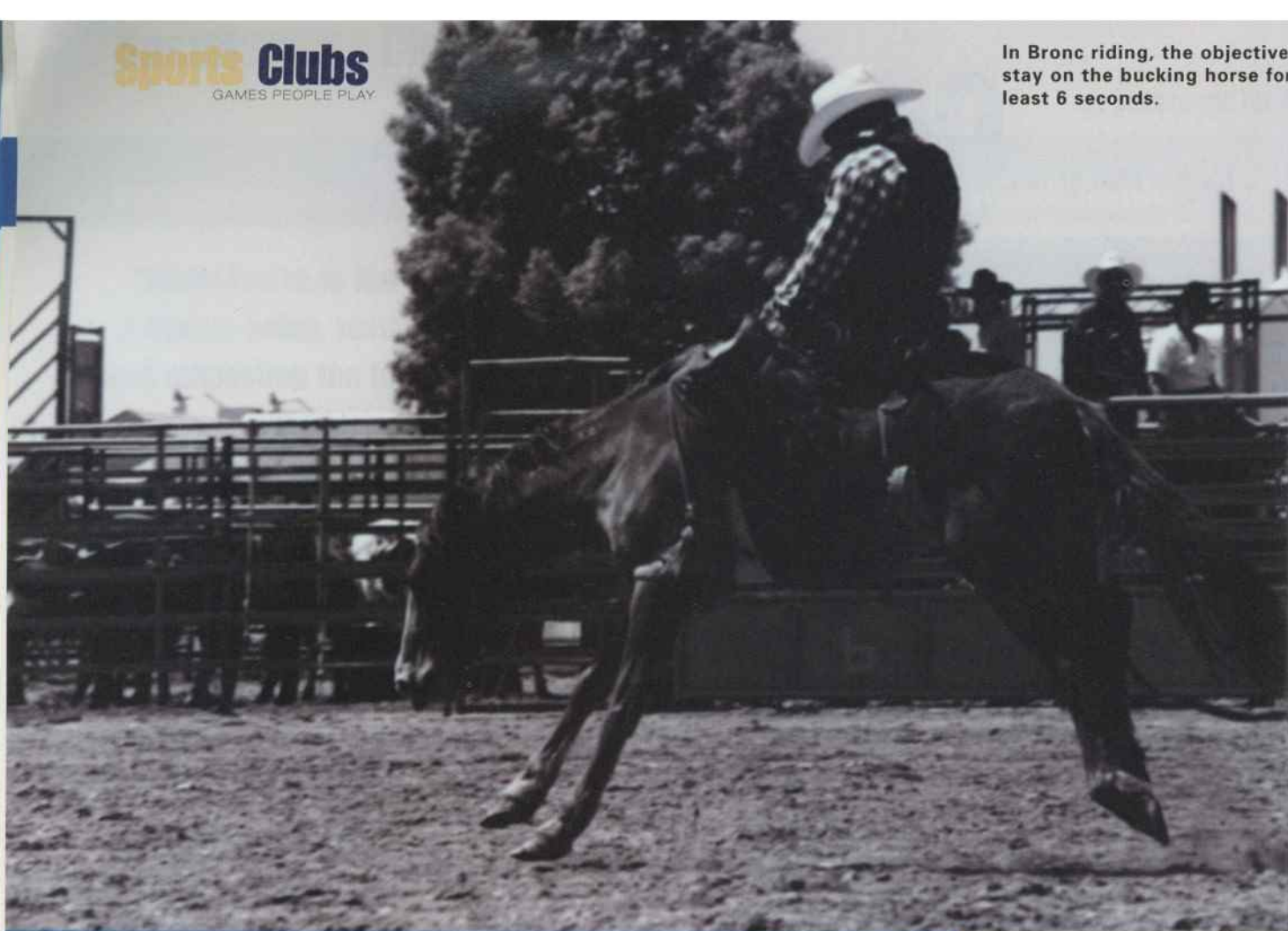

While you may have no idea what "chute dogging" means, if you can stand up in a pair of western boots and order a beer with confidence, then you're ready for an outing with the International Gay Rodeo Association.

The IGRA oversees 20 regional Gay Rodeo Associations that span the United States and includes Canada. The organization and its member associations are not only focused on supporting rodeo and the country western lifestyle, they also donate thousands of dollars to charity each year.

So, how exactly did a gay rodeo get started in the first place? Surprisingly, it didn't begin in Texas or even California. Understanding this organization's humble beginnings requires a quick trip back in time to Reno, Nevada.

In 1975, Phil Ragsdale, a local gay man and "Court Emperor" for that city's "Imperial Court," a well-known charitable system existing in large cities around the country, needed an innovative fund-raising event. He found it with his idea for an amateur gay rodeo. Ragsdale felt that a gay rodeo would garnish much attention (and therefore contributions) while also erasing a few negative stereotypes. What's more,

the event would be just plain fun to put on.

By 1976, Ragsdale had managed to lock in the Washoe County Fairgrounds for the event location, but could not persuade local ranchers to loan out their animals for the rodeo. Fortunately, the persistent Ragsdale eventually snagged five wild range cows, ten wild range calves, one pig and a charming Shetland pony. Not your traditional rodeo livestock, but then, this was no traditional rodeo.

Over 125 people participated in this first gay rodeo fund-raiser, and awards were handed out for the "King of the Cowboys," "Queen of the Cowgirls" and "Miss Dusty Spurs" (use your imagination).

The event was a modest success and raised a respectable chunk of change for charity. Ragsdale was encouraged to continue the program annually, adding a bit more hoopla each year. By 1984, what had quickly grown to become the National Reno Gay Rodeo was bringing in over 10,000 people each year, attracting the likes of Joan Rivers and Rose Maddox.

Unfortunately, the National Reno Gay Rodeo was unexpectedly shut down after an almost mob-style land conflict between

the Washoe County Fairgrounds and the Sands Hotel (this was still casino country).

Things might have ended right there if not for the gay rodeo concept, but then something else happened. The sleeper hit *Urban Cowboy*, with John Travolta and Debra Winger as the unforgettable "Bud and Sissy," erupted onto the national scene, becoming an instant cult classic.

Suddenly, discos everywhere were stepping all over each other in a frenzy to get country western and cash in on the new craze. Two-step dancing, mechanical bull riding and finally rodeo itself all became part of a mainstream revival.

The movie was just the shot in the arm that rodeo needed. New and former cowboys and cowgirls in gay and lesbian country bars across the nation were interested in stepping into an arena and getting dusty.

Fortunately for everyone, prior to the National Gay Reno Association shutting down, visiting participants had gone home to form smaller rodeo groups in states like Colorado, Texas and California.

These multi-state groups began meeting and competing with each other again with renewed vigor. Soon, these diverse partic-

pants realized they needed a more uniform set of rules and expectations. In September of 1985, at a group convention held in Denver, the International Gay Rodeo Association was officially declared under founding President, Wayne Jakino.

Today, the IGRA experience has expanded to include not only traditional arena events you would expect, such as calf roping or steer riding, but also more entertainment-oriented events. Popular half time shows might match rodeo clowns and even the occasional steer in a futile contest with quick-witted drag queens, armed with microphones instead of lassos.

Often, country western dance competitions will be sponsored by the IGRA in local clubs to coincide with rodeos in different cities.

The IGRA Royalty Awards not only entertain, but also raise funds for selected charities. Each fall at the IGRA Finals Rodeo, the titles of Mr., Ms. and Miss IGRA are awarded after a fierce mock "pageant" that includes scoring for Interview, Western Wear, Horsemanship, Public Presentation, and Entertainment.

This year's IGRA Finals Rodeo 2000 occurs October 19-22 at the New Mexico State Fairgrounds Horse Arena in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Perhaps the best asset of today's IGRA is that there's truly something for everyone. Whether you're at home in the arena or only on the sidelines, gay rodeo has truly become a "family" affair.

Gay Rodeo Vocab Test



Attention city slickers: Before you attend your first gay rodeo, you'll want to brush up on your insider lingo to understand what's going on and avoid any awkward moments.

Bull Riding If this isn't self explanatory enough, we suggest renting *Urban Cowboy*.

Bareback Bronc Riding Bareback here refers to the animal, not the rider. Similar to Bull Riding, the cowboy clings for dear life to "bareback rigger" that is tied to a bronc (horse), and attempts to ride for at least six seconds.

Steer Riding Basically, see Bareback Bronc Riding and wear an athletic cup.

Chute Dogging It only sounds like something Puff Daddy would be doing. "Chute" refers to the chute gate that opens, allowing a contestant to bring a steer out to a 10-foot line in front of the chute before attempting to wrestle or "dog" the steer to the ground.

Calf Roping on Foot Once you've lassoed a few fence posts, you're ready to toss rope onto an actual calf as it's released from the chute gate. And no, you can't invite your friends in to hold the animal down while you tie it up Martha Stewart-style.

Mounted Break-Away Roping See Calf Roping on Foot, except this time you can pretend to be Xena, Warrior Princess as you lasso the calf from horseback.

Team Roping Two participants on horseback now get to lasso and tie down one exhausted calf. This event is even considered more dangerous for some reason. Of course, once you've driven on an LA freeway that logic makes sense.

Barrel Race Participants compete for the fastest time in running a cloverleaf pattern around three barrels. A 5-second penalty is assessed for knocking a barrel over. Similar to looking for parking at the shopping mall.

Pole Bending See Barrel Race, then trade out poles for barrels and add three more.

Flag Race A clever combination of barrels and poles, only this time you are dodging poles and attempting to grab flags out of one barrel and plant them in another one. Trivia: the barrels here are full of rabbit pellets (which I'm hoping means food).

Steer Decorating Contrary to popular belief, this is not where two cowboys hold down a steer and give it a makeover. Rather, one participant pulls a lasso off the steer's neck while the other one ties a ribbon on its tail.

Wild Drag Race - You toss one cowboy, one cowgirl and one "drag personality" in formal wear and heels into a muddy arena, and watch them try and coax a wild steer across the finish line.

Goat Dressing - Not to be confused with goat cheese or anything served over lettuce, this event is a gay rodeo original. A team of participants attempts to wrestle a pair of jockey-style underwear onto a goat's hind end. Sure, like we haven't seen that one in the bars before.

"REAL" OR "URBAN" COWBOY? Little bit of both. Grew up as a kid in the city, but have since moved to the country where I currently live on a 25-acre horse farm. I have never worked on a working ranch or farm before, so I could not honestly say that I'm a "Real" cowboy in the true sense. But I do enjoy the rodeo events and have been fortunate enough to have some success at it.

WHAT'S YOUR RODEO SPECIALTY? I participate in all the Camp Events, as well as Chute Dogging, Steer Riding, Bull Riding, Barrel Racing, Pole Bending and Flag Race. I used to also ride Bareback Broncs, but gave that up due to an arm injury. I can still ride steers and bulls, just not able to handle the jarring action of the broncs.

WHAT IMPACT HAS THE IGRA HAD ON YOU? I have developed friendships all over the country and been fortunate enough to participate in 132 IGRA sanctioned rodeos, either as a contestant, volunteer, or as an official. I am also proud to now be a certified Chute Coordinator as well as Arena Director for IGRA.

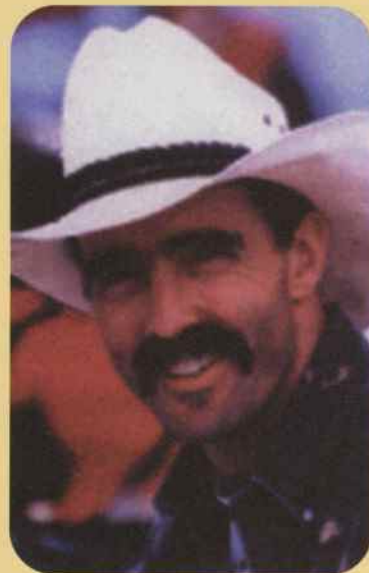
WHAT HAS THE RESPONSE BEEN FROM MAINSTREAM RODEO PEERS? In most ways positive, although the mainstream rodeos still don't really know about the gay rodeo circuit. IGRA and the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) have worked together on some issues, especially things such as animal welfare. Both are strong believers in the welfare of animals and that they are *not* mistreated or abused, and any animals that are injured are taken care of in the most humane way possible.

IN YOUR HISTORY WITH IGRA, WHAT HAS BEEN YOUR

GREATEST PERSONAL ACHIEVEMENT? Winning the '98 International Finals Bull Riding Title.

MOST FRIGHTENING MOMENT? Getting caught in "the well" of a spinning bull; the well is the inside part of the spin of a bull. If you are unfortunate to get bucked off the bull inside that spin, he will usually come right after you and can trample over you. Fortunately, the bull fighting clowns were able to "save my neck."

MOST EMBARRASSING EPISODE? Kansas City rodeo in '93; I was VP-elect for IGRA and was talked into some unusual participation in a fund-raiser for the rodeo. I had to ride in just my briefs and boots on horseback at the end of the rodeo. A buddy of mine, J.D. Norton, also rode; giving the crowd two different "types" I'd guess you could say. He's smooth-chested and I'm fairly hairy! Next we were pinned in and about 20 contestants and officials for the rodeo came into the arena with Read-Whip cans and totally covered us in whipped cream! Very embarrassing, but we raised some money!

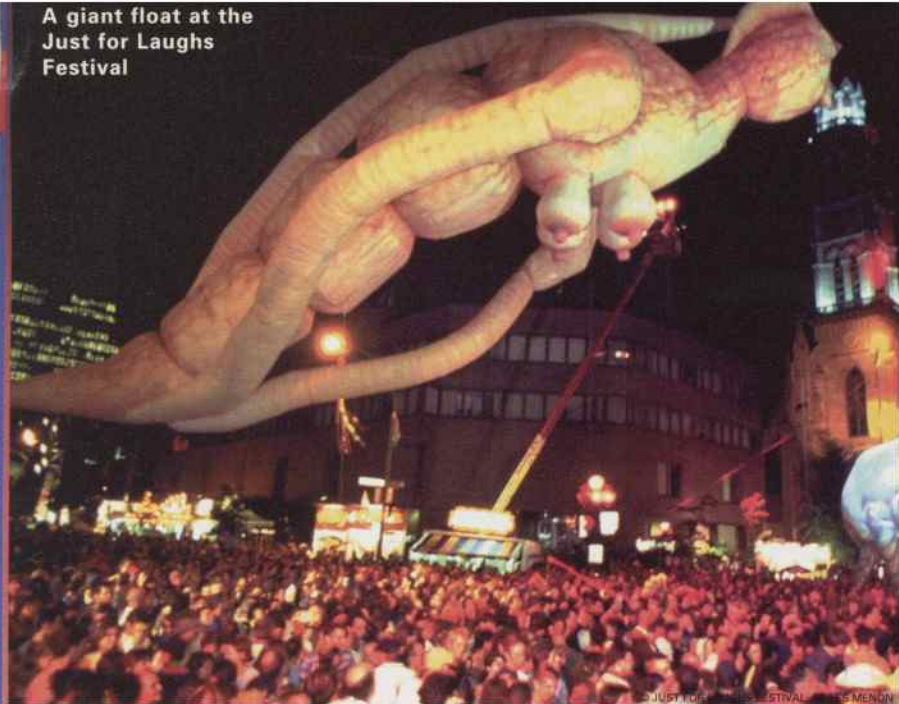
Distinctly European with a unique mix of the new and old,

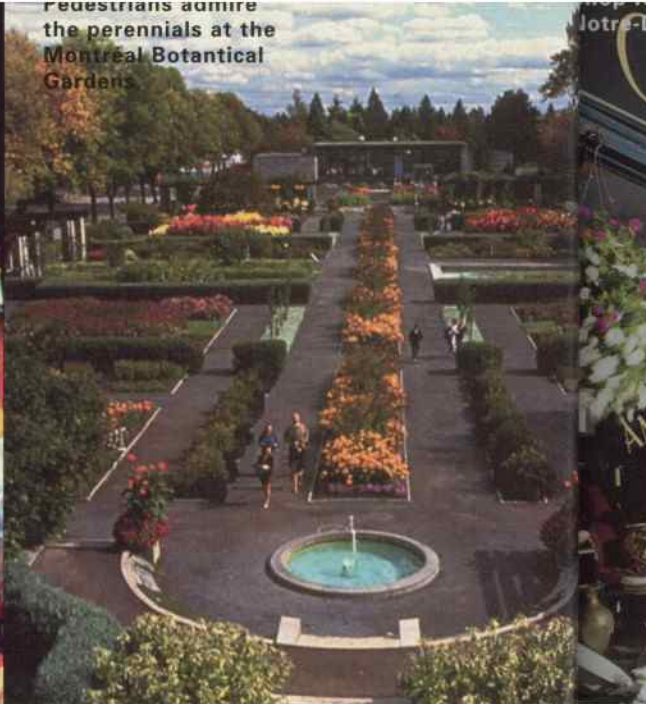
My friend Paul recently told me:
“Canadians are like Americans, only without
guns and with really good health care...” Well,
Canadians may be somewhat like Americans in
Ontario and Manitoba, but *Québecers* are a
completely different breed.

Montréal, an almost croissant-shaped island, is on the St. Lawrence river, and lies on plateau. But because there are no great symbols to conjure an instant image of the city in your mind—no Statue of Liberty, Eiffel Tower or Hollywood sign—a deeper look is required to catch the essence of the city.

The secret to knowing Montréal seems to be in getting to know its neighborhoods and people. Without any distinct tourist traps, the city exists much more for living in than for touring around. That said, the natives tend to do their living like people on vacation. Although they have a share of the pragmatism that comes with their North American location—the unaffectedness of wearing shorts in the summer, boots in the winter for example—they also have a certain *laissez-faire* attitude associated more with their French/European roots. I was told by a Montréaler that if an employee were to take a 1 1/2-hour lunch, his boss, instead of being angry as we might expect here in the southern part of the continent (and in Toronto), would ask only if he enjoyed his meal. Their Latin roots also mean that they speak French. But English is understood by almost everyone too, and maybe it's this bilingualism that predisposes their brains to think naturally along alternative lines. For the gay traveler this means that besides finding a truly accepting atmosphere, you'll also find a surprising number of straight people at the Black & Blue circuit party, because it is *the* party in town and *the* place to go dancing no matter what your sexuality. Straight couples bring their rainbow-flag waving children to the Divers/Cité gay pride parade simply because it is their 'outing' for the day too. I spotted seniors in their folding chairs at the outdoor drag show during gay pride because it was taking place in their neigh-

borhood park and they were being...neighbors. It helps that Montréalers are not likely to stay in if there's some kind of festival or parade to attend (and there always is), no matter what the cause or celebration.

But this inclusion—or, *diversité* as they say—doesn't exist just so everyone can have more parties to go to. The province of Québec is serious about building a society that takes everyone into account. They are the first (we'll hope for more) government in North America to have abolished all distinctions in its laws concerning sexual orientation. Same-sex and heterosexual common-law spouses enjoy the same advantages and assume the same obligations. Besides the obvious statement of equality this law now insists upon, the general population is cool with it. As I cleared customs at the airport I told the agent that I was in Montréal to write about the city, to which he replied, "Well, there's plenty to write about, especially this weekend. We have gay pride and the Fêtes Gourmandes." The two events were absolutely equal to this man; a gay parade and a food fair. I couldn't imagine the customs agents in New York even knowing when and where gay pride is, let alone recommending it to out-of-towners. The fact that there was live, complete coverage of the pride parade on TV and that the radio reported, "At times like this Montréal is alive and at its best," speaks volumes. And Montréalers prove their social consciousness in more day-to-day ways as well, a case in point being the

flower give-away. Each spring, organized through community associations, the city gives away a half million flowers to its citizens—and they go like hotcakes.

So while there may be no leaning tower of Pisa to climb or Empire State Building to marvel at, Montréal is a city to be experienced through its people, *lots* of world renowned festivals (The International Jazz Festival, The World Film Festival, The Just for Laughs Comedy Festival) and . . . of yeah . . . the shopping. With the exchange rate so good (assuming you have U.S. dollars) you can practically justify a trip to Montréal simply to shop (well, I can, anyway!)

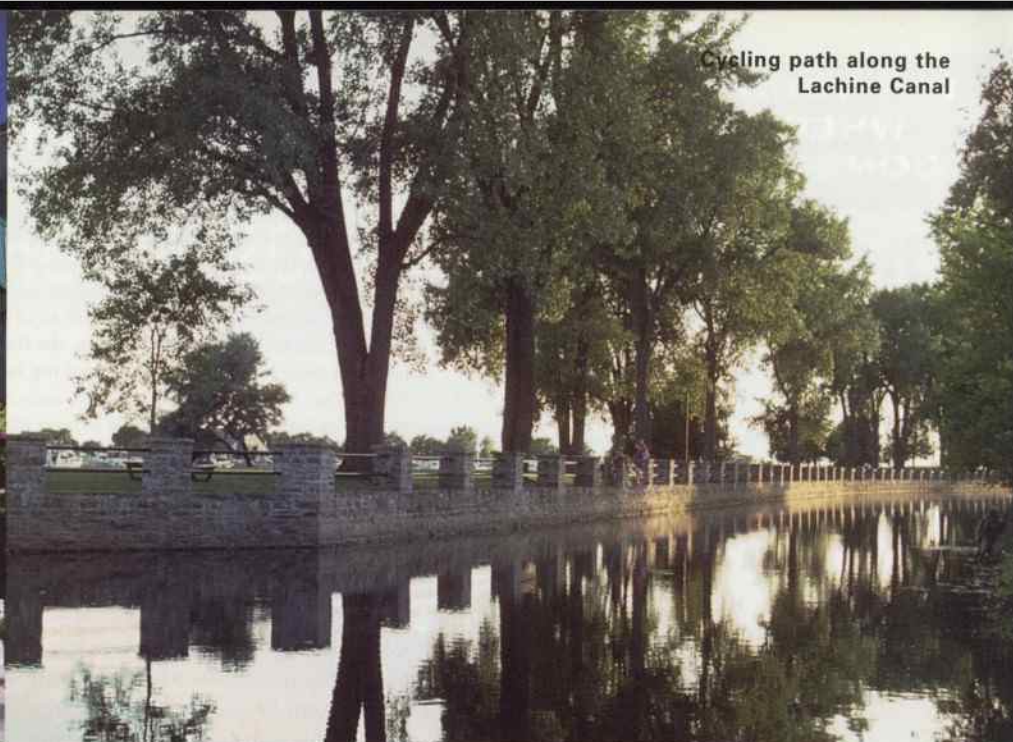
Here's a brief introduction to Montréal's major neighborhoods:

Old Montréal is a good starting place since that's where the city was founded and grew for the first two hundred years. Centered around the Place d'Armes, this warren of narrow streets and stone buildings is historic and romantic. Take in the street performers at Place Jacques-Cartier before heading to the Bonsecour Market (350 Saint-Paul Street East) where you'll get a quick cultural tour of Canada through the art, fashion and design exhibitions and shops. Wander through the streets, stop at a café and visit the Notre-Dame Basilica (110 Notre-Dame Street West), a masterpiece of Gothic Revival architecture. Next stop, The Village, named after Greenwich Village in New York. This predominantly gay neighborhood, located on Sainte-Catherine Street

where you'll find a lively crowd along with the usual collection of gay bars, shops of rainbow and paraphernalia and men strolling hand in hand. The Saint-Pierre-Apôtre church at the corner of René-Lévesque and de la Visitation hosts the Chapel of Hope dedicated to AIDS.

A short subway ride from The Village will take you to the mix of office buildings and Victorian homes that make up

Downtown. Here's where you'll find plenty of museums and good shopping. Walk along Sainte-Catherine Ouest, Peel and Sherbrooke, and something is bound to catch your eye and your wallet. Two great Canadian stores to check out are Simons (Sainte-Catherine Ouest and Mansfield) for its Euro styles and great prices and the more upscale and expensive Holt Renfrew (Sherbrooke Ouest and de la Montagne). With shopping out of the way, soak up a

little culture. Three good picks are: **The Canadian Centre for Architecture** (1920 Baile; 514-939-7026) a post-modern building integrated with a Victorian mansion devoted to architecture; **Cinémathèque Québécoise** (335 de Maisonneuve Boul. Est; 514-842-9763) an avant-garde museum of moving images; and the **McCord Museum of Canadian History** (690 Sherbrooke Ouest; 514-398-7100) which houses photos, textiles, fine and decora-

For a Romantic Weekend...

Stay at the **Hôtel Le Germain** (2050, rue Mansfield; tel. 514-849-2050; hotelgermain.com; C\$210-C\$425). Dark wood and earth tones ranging from beige to a deep flat green, overstuffed furniture and fluffy masculine bedS spell simple elegance. Best are the baths: silver and wood towel racks, floor to ceiling, wall to wall showers, Asian-inspired sink set in a wood table and recessed lighting throughout. All this and an excellent stereo in each room. And the music in the elevators is *not* elevator music. For a more intimate (17 rooms), affordable and gay place, **La Conciergerie** (1019 rue Saint-Hubert; 514-289-9297, C\$77-C\$92; laconciergerie.ca) is an 1885 Victorian townhouse turned B&B. Located in The Village, it's within walking distance of all that's pink in Montréal. The price includes a continental breakfast and use of the jacuzzi.

Eat at **Area** (1429 rue Amherst; 514-890-6691; 3-course menu C\$30-C\$40) where funky jazz plays, candles provide the lighting, you share a huge central off-white leather banquette and enjoy the succulent duck breast and polenta. In **Old Montréal Restaurant Bonaparte** (443 rue Saint-François-Xavier; 514-844-4368; avg. entrée C\$24) is both romantic and adventurous—its specialty being game. And, while not romantic in any traditional sense, **Bens** (990 blvd. de Maisonneuve ouest; 514-844-1000; beer and a sandwich C\$8), a no-frills, cavernous place with quick-witted waiters, serves up the mysterious, intriguingly famous "smoked meat" of Montréal. No one would or could tell me what exactly this sort of smooth, flavorful corned beef-like "meat" was, but it makes a delicious late night snack.

Shop at **Priape** (1311, rue Ste-Catherine Est; 514-521-8451; priape.com), Canada's leading gay store. Heavy on all things sexual (leather and 'accessories' say romance to some), they are also the "unofficial" queer info center in town.

Attend any show at the performing arts center, **Place des Arts** (175, rue Sainte-Catherine Ouest; tel. 514-842-2112). Opera, the symphony, theatre or a perhaps a performance by Itzhak Perlman, November 28-29.

Last, but not least, take a sleigh ride around Old Montréal or through Mount Royal Park (weather permitting). Call **Les Services de Calèches et Traîneaux Lucky Luc** (514-934-6105).

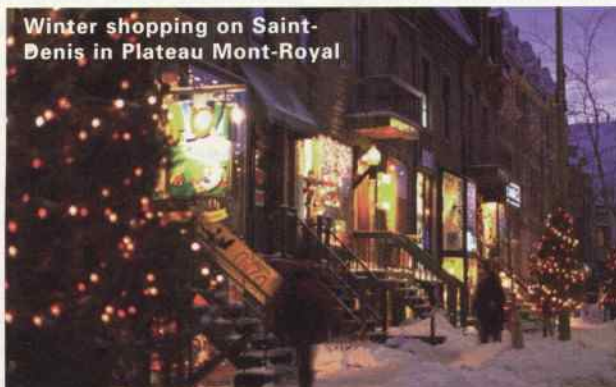
Most important about shopping in Montréal is getting the sales tax back. This is a good thing because, depending on where you are in Canada (and maybe what you buy and how long you stay—it was a bit complicated), you might be paying some or all of the following taxes: the Goods and Services Tax, the Harmonized Sales Tax (how lovely that sounds) and the Province of Québec Tax. To be eligible for a refund, each receipt must be at least \$50 and you need at least \$200 worth of total purchases (remember this includes the hotel bill). Ask at any store or at the hotel for the forms needed, or contact **Revenue Canada** (902-432-5608; ccra-adrc.gc.ca). Good luck.

tive arts reflecting the history of Canada. If you have more time, and 'just for a laugh,' visit the unique **Musée Juste Pour Rire** (2111 Saint-Laurent; 514-845-4000). But beware, this museum celebrating the "evolution of humor" sometimes calls for 'visitor participation.' And even if you have a good fine arts museum at home, you are not likely to see much Inuit art there. The permanent collection at the **Musée des Beaux-Arts de Montréal** (1379-1380 Sherbrooke Ouest; 514-285-2000) will give you a good introduction. And beyond the excellent like the "From Renoir to Picasso" show, a display of works from the Musée l'Orangerie in Paris which is on until October 15th, Alfred Hitchcock fans can ogle film clips, production

Mount Royal, the . . . eh-hem . . . *mountain* (do not tell Montréalers this is only a large-ish hill—they seem to be very touchy about it) in the center of the city is a magnificent park only steps from the downtown shopping district. Designed by Frederick Law Olmsted (who also did Central Park in New York), this is an ideal spot to get a bird's-eye view of the city and/or some exercise; bike here in the summer and cross-country ski or skate in the winter. The fall is particularly stunning

due to the abundance of maple trees which turn the most spectacular colors. Take Peel to the end and look for the stairs to start your climb to the top.

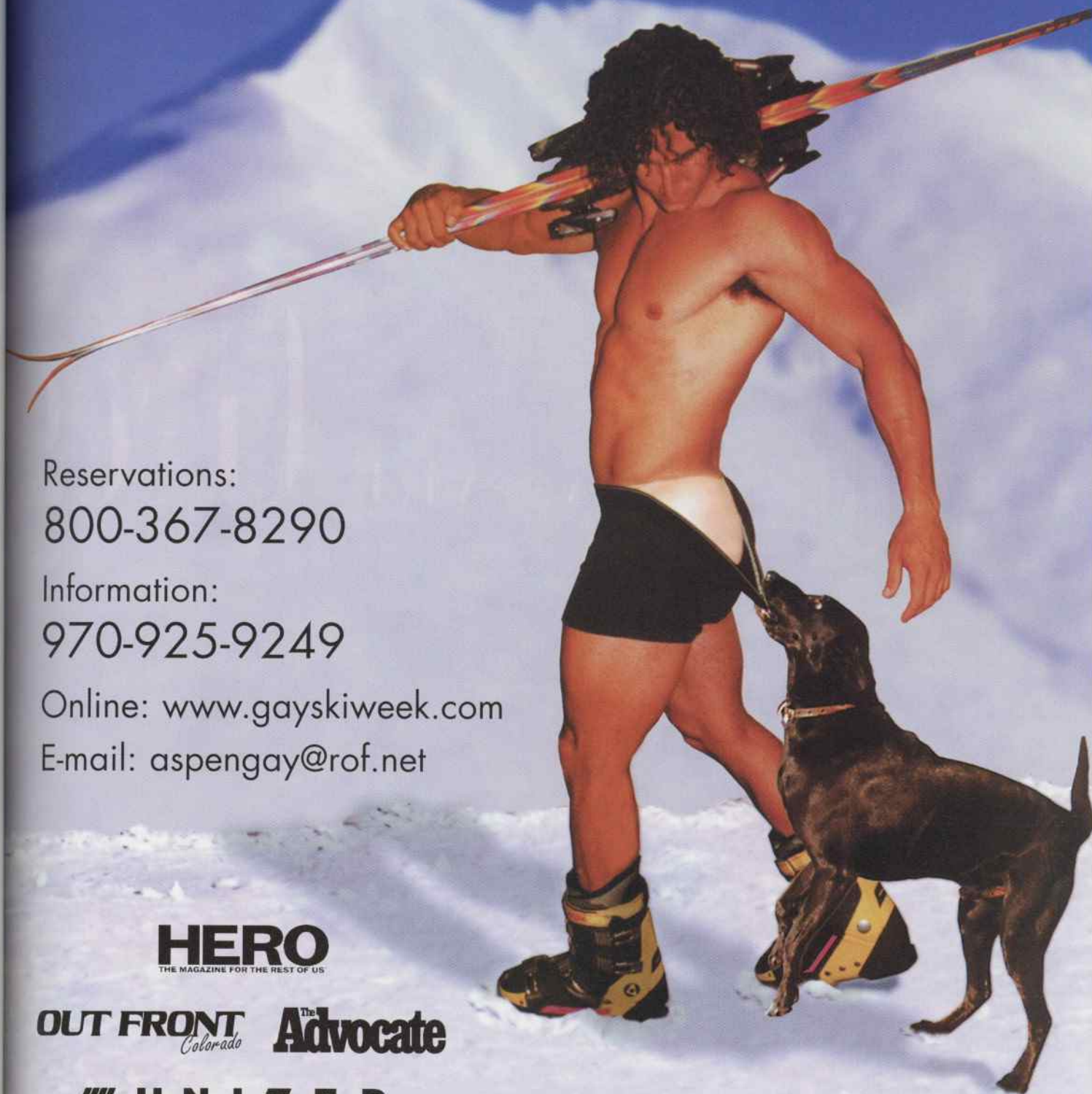
The **Maisonneuve** neighborhood gets its name from the immense park containing the Olympic Stadium and the Jardin Botanique. Built for the 1976 Olympics, the stadium, which Montréalers complain they are still paying for (it was supposed to cost \$55 million, but...oops...the bill came in at \$1 billion) looks like a giant space ship and provides great views along with enough space to hold the 65,000 dancers expected for the thump

thump mega-interactive AIDS fundraiser/circus party called the Black and Blue Festival on October 8th. Oh yeah, they also play sports

there. Meanwhile, across the street at the **Jardin Botanique** (514-872-1400), the Magic of Lanterns exhibit runs through November 5th. Located in the Chinese Gardens, go at sunset when the more than 600 whimsical lanterns are lit and enchant garden visitors every night until 9pm. Keeping the ecology as theme, the **Montréal Biodôme** (477 Pierre de Coubertin; 514-868-3000), an environmental museum in the park, lets you wander through four different ecosystems from tropical rainforest to the polar world. **H**

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Baseball & Boys with

Greg

an interview with the writer/director of *"The Broken Hearts Club"*

Greg Berlanti came to Hollywood in 1995 to follow his dreams, and 5 years later, he's right on schedule. At only 28, Greg is a writer and executive producer on *Dawson's Creek*, and he has written and directed his first film, *The Broken Hearts Club*. Greg recently talked to HERO about following your heart and dealing with "shitty men."

Joe: "*The Broken Hearts Club*" portrays a pretty "regular" group of gay guys. Were you consciously trying to make a "non-gay" gay movie?

It was more of a response to my feeling vastly under-represented. I felt like, "Why aren't I having the same kind of experience when I go to films that my straight friends are having? Why do I have to look to so many films that represent straight people to find my identity in the movies?" For me there was no gay date movie. When I came to Los Angeles, I met a group of friends that were a lot of things I didn't realize gay men were. Simple things, like mountain climbers. [laughs] I should have been more aware, I guess, but I wasn't. I was scared and felt alone, and then I discovered a group of people who seemed to be like me. I think the movie has a lot of characters that are guys who are just trying to have a good day. Life heaps what some would call "not important" problems on the characters, but you have a whole group of guys who are sort of suffering from the regularities of life, and people are realizing that the movie could be about anybody. We have more miseries in common sometimes than we do other stuff.

So you wrote about your friends?

I started to draft some of the stuff from friendships, but also from "What would be a really romantic way to meet someone?" I showed it to two friends who helped with the development of the script, and it was interesting to get both a gay man's and a female's perspective throughout the process. They would respond the same way emotionally to the scenes, and I realized there's a potentially large audience of straight women out there that understand what gay men are going through in the dating scene.

The universality of the human experience...

And the universality of shitty men! [laughs]

How did your writing career start?

I wrote maybe 9 or 10 scripts before I was actually hired to write anything. I came out to LA to write, but I had to take a series of bad, ugly temp jobs. I finally landed this one job in development and I was either going to head down the film development route and be a film executive, which really frightened me, or I was going to revisit my dream of being a writer. So I quit my job. I had about three months worth of money, and I had two ideas. One of them was a big romantic com-

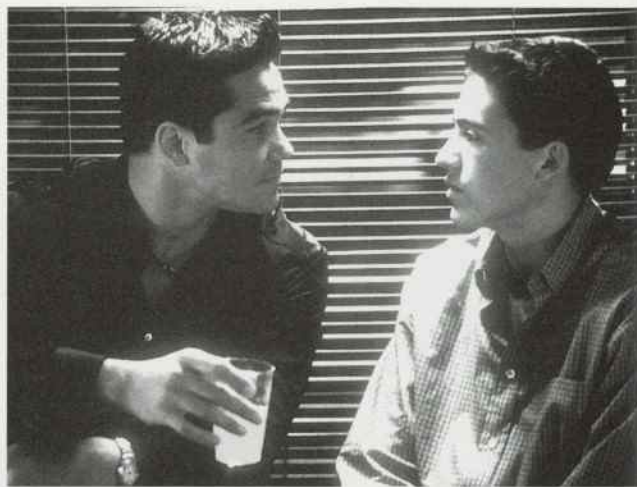
edy idea, and the other was the "*Broken Hearts Club*". Everyone said, "Write the big romantic comedy because you can sell it for a lot of money," but I had just broken up with someone—or he had just broken up with me. He said I was "too complex." It hit him as he talked to me on his portable phone from his bubble bath—I was too complex. That night I said, "I need some music I can either wallow in or that will make me celebrate and go out." I put on Karen Carpenter. [laughs] I sat down and wrote the first fifteen minutes of the film, which introduces all the characters. That part of the script never changed from the time I wrote it. I showed it to my friend Julie, who said, "Don't listen to what anyone tells you about the big movie. Write this movie." I finished the script in about a month.

Which is not exactly a typical development period...

It was one of those things that just poured out. Then Julie got it to Kevin Williamson [*Scream*], who said that it was great, but "What else does he have?" I said, "I also have this big romantic comedy idea." And he said, "I want to produce it." So the first thing I sold, after 11 scripts, was an idea. [Laughs.] In the meantime, Kevin gave it to Paul Stupen of "*Dawson's Creek*" who said, "Hey, would you like to come on and write a few episodes of the show?" So I took the job, which became 8 or 9 episodes by the end of the year, and I stayed on the show.

How did directing the film come about?

Well, in the midst of all that, Mickey Lidell read the script. He was producing *Go* at the time. We were in an elevator and I was going up to work with Kevin and someone introduced Mickey and he said, [*The Broken*

Hearts Club's working title] was my favorite script last year." I said, "Why don't you produce it?" A few weeks later we sat down and at the end of the meeting, Mickey said, "I really think the package is you. I think you should direct the movie." I was scared to do anything other than *Dawson's*, because I was really working for the first time, but my experience in television

was starting to accumulate enough that I also knew what it felt like to do a short film. Television is like you're making a movie every week. It's intense, and I'd learned enough that I thought, "It may not be the craziest thing..."

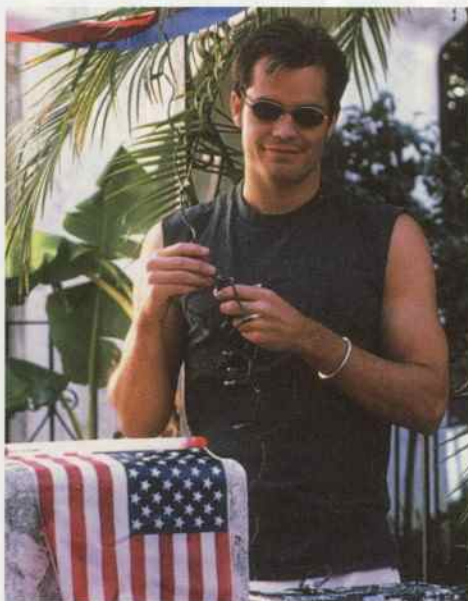
Had you ever directed before?

I had never directed film, but I had directed plays. I

knew my strength

was that I could direct actors—the thing I was least likely to suck at. [laughs] I read every book I could read on directing, and I knew I needed a veteran Director of Photography. I found Paul Elliot, who had done "*And the Band Played On*" and "*Soul Food*." I sat down with him two weeks prior to starting the movie and said, "I know nothing about what we're about to do. You have to teach me everything." We would work about 12 to 14 hours a day. It was like he put me through film school in two weeks.

Were you nervous the first day of shooting?

We got to the set the first day and I found Paul and I pulled him over to the corner. I said, "Okay, we've gone over everything. I know what light is over there and I know what that guy's doing. But at what point do I yell, 'Action!'" I was totally serious. He said, "Well, everyone will get in place and I'll look at you, which means I'm ready, and you yell 'Action!'" I said, "Well you can't look at me before that because I'll yell 'Action!' and look like an idiot."

You must have caught on quickly.

I began to realize that as a director the best thing you can do is just pick. You pick actors, you pick scenes, you make decisions. They should call it "picking." But you have to be able to pick things quickly and figure out what will be the best. You can't be married to anything. As the director who was also the writer, I really couldn't be married to anything.

Did you have two hats that you changed back and forth?

No, I really left the writer at the door. In rehearsal with the actors I said, "You know, guys, I wrote this thing a year ago." When I wrote it, it was such a response to what I was going through as a person that when I directed it that much later it didn't even feel like I'd written it. I said, "What I do want to do is honor what my intentions originally were, because it got enough people interested."

Was it strange to have Superman [Dean Cain] in a gay movie?

It really wasn't, because I hadn't really watched the show that much. I think he would say he doesn't watch *Dawson's* that much, so I don't feel like I'm offending him. I knew other people would know him, because he has a huge fan base from *Superman*.

What's he like?

He's very charming, and seems unaware of how charming he is.

It works for his character, too. His character is an ass in the way he deals with prospective boyfriends, but you end up liking him.

Hasn't there been a time when each of us hasn't returned someone's phone call and

sort of pretended that they would go away? Then you see them out and smile and inside you say, "Oh, my God!"

And how did John Mahoney [*Frasier*] come aboard?

His people got the script and said, "He's not doing films during '*Frasier*' right now," but Joseph Middleton, the casting director, said, "Write him that letter that you've

always wanted to write him." So I wrote it, saying, "This is why I thought of you for the part." We got a call saying, "John wants to meet with Greg," so I sat down with him for

lunch. At the end of lunch he told me a story about directing an actress that he sort of worshiped and how he was timid about directing her and that it affected the production. He looked at me and smiled and said, "Don't be afraid to direct me." I was looking at a man who had worked with Cameron Crowe and Barry Levinson, and I thought to myself, "Well, if he's saying that to me, then that's going to be my take with everyone."

Looking back on that Karen Carpenter night, it must be surreal to realize that your movie is actually opening. What have you learned from the experience?

There are a couple things. One is that if you really let things go and let people be a part of your dream and trust those people that are going to help you, you can inflate your dream into reality. I've also learned, "Pursue an unknown end." A teacher used to tell me that in high school. It was a quote by Francis Bacon. If you really look at the directions you can go in life, usually it boils down to "Things I know" and "Things I don't know." If you go in the direction of "Things I don't know" it's much more exciting.

I know many people were thrilled about "The Kiss" between the two guys on *Dawson's Creek* last season. Now that a

few months have passed, how do you feel about how it all panned out?

We tell a lot of stories about Jack and it doesn't get any attention, then we do "the kiss" and it gets all this attention. People start bringing up words like "a gen-



da." The "agenda" is that I've got six kids on the show going through a given set of circumstances and experiences that are reflective of who they are. Jack is gay, so he has experiences that reflect that, but that's not all he is. It just felt to me that Jack had been called gay for thirty-five episodes, and it seemed silly that we had thousands of other kisses on the show between people and he had never had a kiss.

Did viewers respond positively?

I had someone come up to me after a screening the other day who said, "I really enjoyed the movie, but thank you so much for the part you played in the Jack Kiss." He started to cry and said, "If I had just seen that five years ago!"

I felt that way about "Longtime Companion," which was a devastating film, but an important one for me.

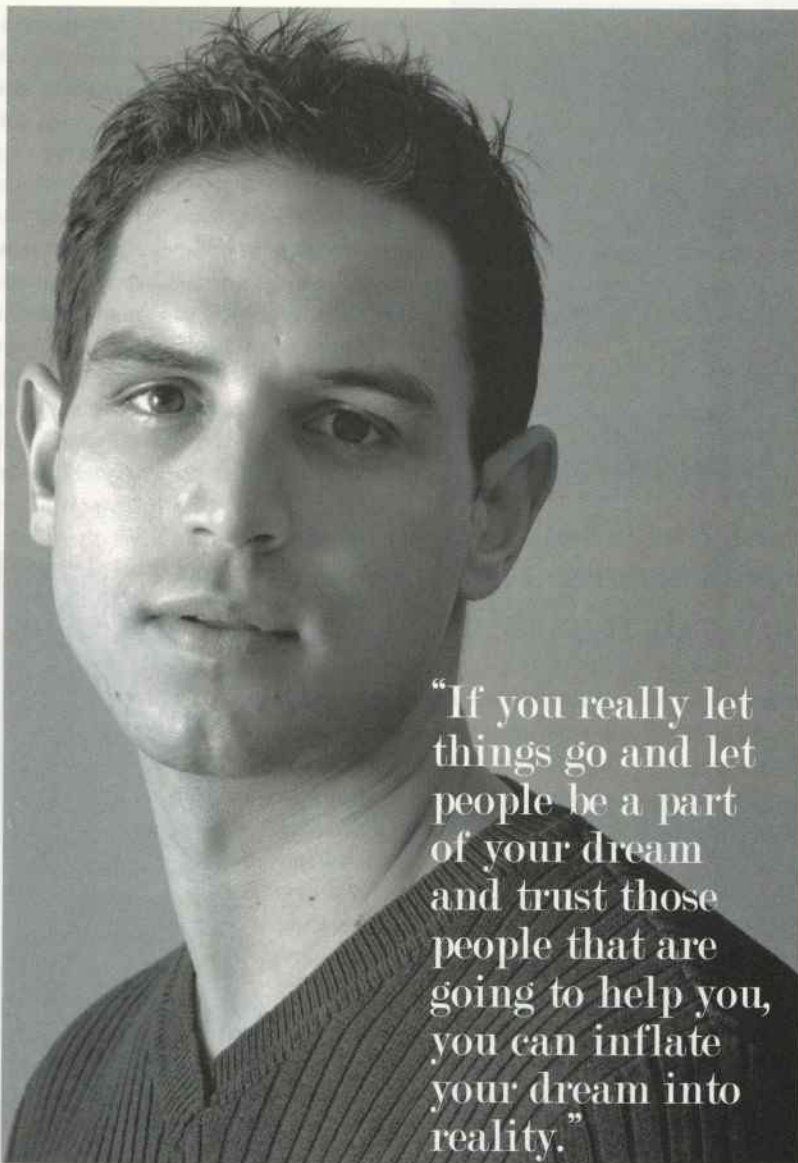
Totally. I was in college when I saw it. My roommate and his girlfriend were watching it. They went to bed and the tape was there, so I go into my room and put it on my VCR and I watched it three times that night. I was bawling, and so grateful to the people who had told that story and portrayed that group of friends. I saw a piece of myself in some of those people and felt that much more normal and okay.

I think if young gay men see a gay movie without the tragedy, it'll be all the more empowering.

I didn't aspire to write a political movie, but if it's political in any way, it's political in how not political it is. Finally, thank God we can make a movie about gay people that, as important as those other films are, just reflect our everyday lives.

With Dawson's and Ellen and Will & Grace, it seems like an exciting time to be gay in Hollywood.

Well, here's the thing. I'm ecstatic, but I

think now is also the scariest time. Now is a time where people can point and say, "See, we have gay images on TV and in film. Don't we have enough?" The answer is that there are never enough stories about anybody. Hopefully everyone will work that much harder to say, "We've got these doors open. Let's not let them shut." And the key lies in audiences supporting these gay films and television shows. The audience has the power.

How did your parents feel about the movie?

There was a screening in New York and my parents brought 25 of their friends. I only told them I was gay three or four years ago. I can make no better case for how far your parents can grow and come with you if you're honest with them about what you're going through and who you are.

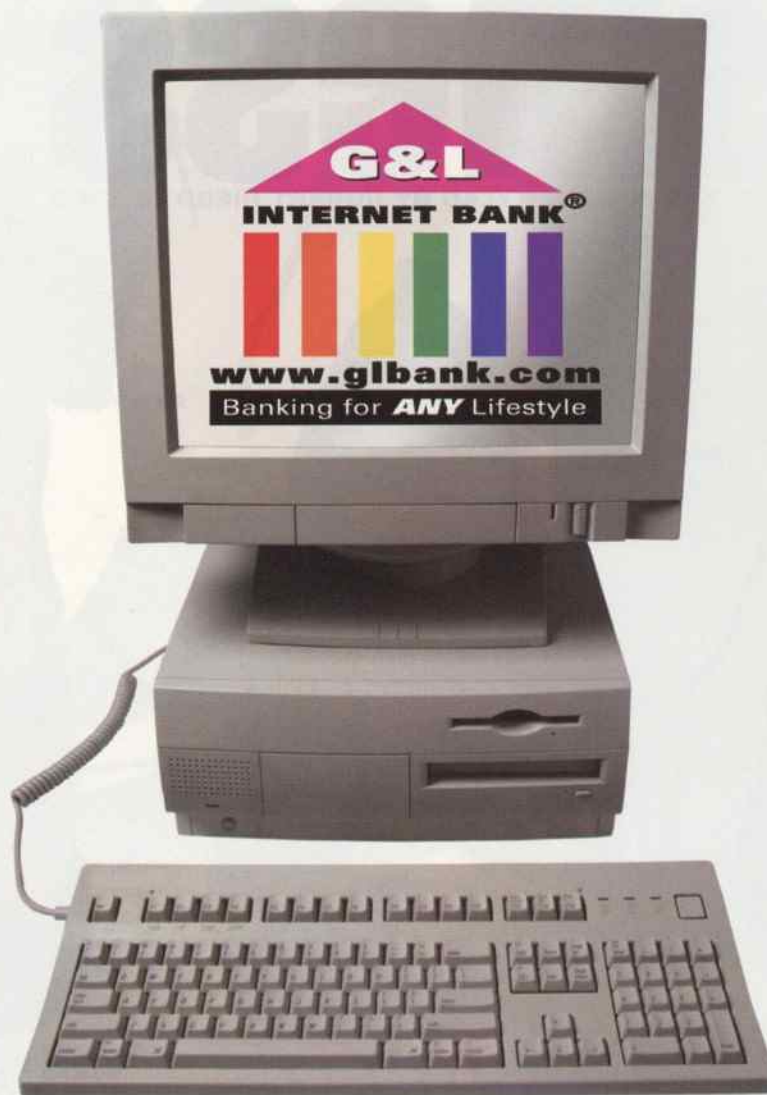
What meaning would you like people to take from your film?

I think that what it really boils down to is how important your friendships are to you after you come out. For all the hardships that gay men and women have, the one thing we really have down is the notion of "build your own family." They're there for you through thick and thin, and you feel protected by them, and also sometimes completely exposed by them. At the end of it, you sort of come through the other side as the person you're meant to be. You can't be more grateful to them for that.

Who are your personal heroes?

A few weeks ago I got a call that James L. Brooks [Terms of Endearment, Broadcast News] had seen the film and wanted to meet. I was trembling. We talked about the film, and I hate to paraphrase him, but he said, "Your film's a seminal film. I've never seen a true romantic comedy about gay people that didn't sacrifice anything to make it more mainstream or more for gay people." And in that moment I really felt like a filmmaker. My other hero is my father. I was in college and I called him up and said, "I can go comparative studies or I can go with all this other creative stuff." And he said, "No, I want you to study theater. I want you to be a writer because it's what you love." For him to be this Italian business man with the upbringing he had, and to have this son who wants to be in theater and television and then comes out of the closet—I hope I'm able to support my children if they're that different from me. **H**

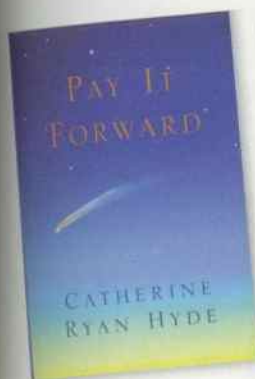
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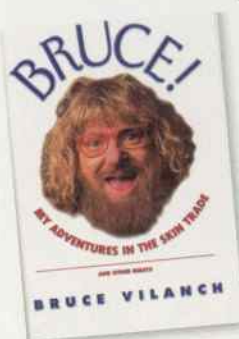
PAY IT FORWARD is that rare kind of novel, a sentimental tale of goodness that doesn't make you want to gag. Like the best tear-jerkers (*Terms of Endearment* or *Steel Magnolias*, take your pick), it's deftly written, honest, and full of characters you can't help but care about; the

characters are the reason you're willing to come along for the ride, and ultimately why you're using Kleenex at the end. Reuben, a teacher, gives his 7th-grade class an assignment: "Change the world." Trevor, one of his students, comes up with "paying it forward." You do an amazingly great thing for three people, and instead of paying you back, they pay it forward—they do an amazingly great thing for three more people, and so on and so on. To the jaded, it sounds implausible, but the novel has fun with what could happen if such a movement caught on. By the end you can't help but be moved by the possibilities. Obviously Hollywood thought the story was a winner—the movie (to be released this month) went into production last March, the same month it was published as a book. It makes you believe in the possibility of unabashed kindness, if only while you're sitting in your favorite easy chair.

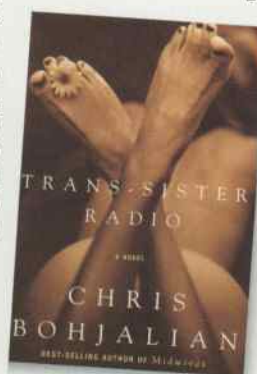
wittiest men in Hollywood, this out-of-the-closet writer has recently come out of the writer's closet, parading his frizzy-bear-self in his Off-Broadway show, a much-lauded documentary (*Get Bruce*), and numerous television appearances, including a permanent spot on Whoopi's *Hollywood Squares*. With his new book, he becomes portable, so you don't have to ever be without one of his smart, dead-on observations, broken up into small chapters for you MTV-addled readers. It's no secret that he's a master of scripted humor (ask Bette Midler and Billy Crystal), but *Bruce!* contains often surprisingly poignant and sober musings on everything from Mel Gibson and Gay Pride to



Elizabeth Montgomery and Provincetown. His multi-talent continues to shine, and we're lucky to have him!

Imagine you're a man who's always felt more like a woman, but you're also a man who loves women. Put simply, you're a lesbian trapped in a man's body. In Chris Bohjalian's **TRANS-SISTER RADIO**, Dana is that kind of guy. He's made a life for himself as a well-liked college professor, but he's always felt like there was something missing—or not missing, so to speak. Just when he's finally ready to go through with a sex change, he falls deeply in love with Allison. Though he's afraid of losing her, Dana tells her what he'll be losing in January, and what happens as Dana, Allison, Allison's daughter Carly, her ex-

husband Will and the entire community gets drawn into the drama makes for a very satisfying and thought-provoking read.



Bohjalian is an astute writer, and he moves deftly between characters' points of view to tell all sides of the story. A much warmer tale than the one Oprah picked for her book club (his *Midwives*), *Transister Radio* is an interesting meditation on the nature of what makes a man, what

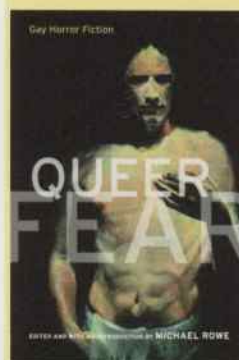
makes a woman, and how the lines between genders can sometimes be blurred. —JW

Just in time for Halloween, **QUEER FEAR** is a collection of gay-themed horror stories featuring work by some of the hottest horror writers around, and

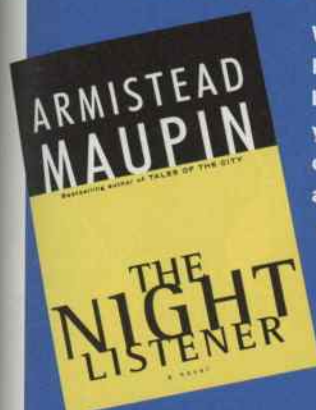
edited by award-winning novelist Michael Rowe (*Looking for Brothers*).

From Marky Mark's backwards ball cap to Madonna's Mary J. Blige "Music" persona to Janet Jackson's bumps and grinds, a large segment of the present generation's gay pop iconography has been tied to that of urban and hip-hop music. We wear the clothes. We crank up hip-hop radio stations and flock to their deejays when they show up at Pride events. In big cities and small towns, gay-speak has adopted a variety of expressions directly from hip-hop lingo.

But what are we buying into, literally and figuratively? The world of hip-hop music is presently dominated by such rap performers as Eminem, L'il Kim and Dr. Dre, the content of whose lyrics is often violent, misogynistic and stridently anti-gay.

Given the irony of this, it could only be a matter of time before a gay hip-hop movement began. And begin it did, in Oakland, California, with the self-proclaimed 'queer hip-hop' group Rainbow Flava, who rapidly became local favorites. The central member of that group, 25-year-old singer and rapper Tori Fixx, is now trying to take Rainbow Flava's inclusive groove to a wider audience with a debut solo CD titled *The Mochasutra*.

The music on the album has hip-hop's familiar Jeep-thumping bass lines, but the lyrics chart new territory for the genre. In the place of his rap music peers' boasts about gang violence, man-stealing and acts of spite, Fixx lays down his humanist views on religion, sex, and the complexities of gay male relationships:

I'm looking for you/a straight-up dude to take his and give my life to/we used to kick it. Remember that?/it was just you and me/non-committed but we were kinda dating seriously/remmember all the things you said to me?/like "you should move in." do you say that to a friend, or were you just joking?

The album, and its first single "One More Night," are riding high on several Internet radio charts. On the eve of the song's release to commercial pop and hip-hop stations, I asked Fixx about his expectations for the record, and whether his choice of material album constitutes a personal manifesto.

TF: I wanted something sexy, gay-friendly, but not something that was really political and in-your-face. It's a reflection of my life. I am who I am, but I'm not running around flaunting it.

You say you're not running around flaunting it, but some of the lyrics on the album are pretty explicit, pretty forward.

What I mean by flaunting it is like, "I'm gay, nyah-nyah-nyah". For me, part of sexiness is being very blunt, very forward.

What prompted you to make a hip-hop rap

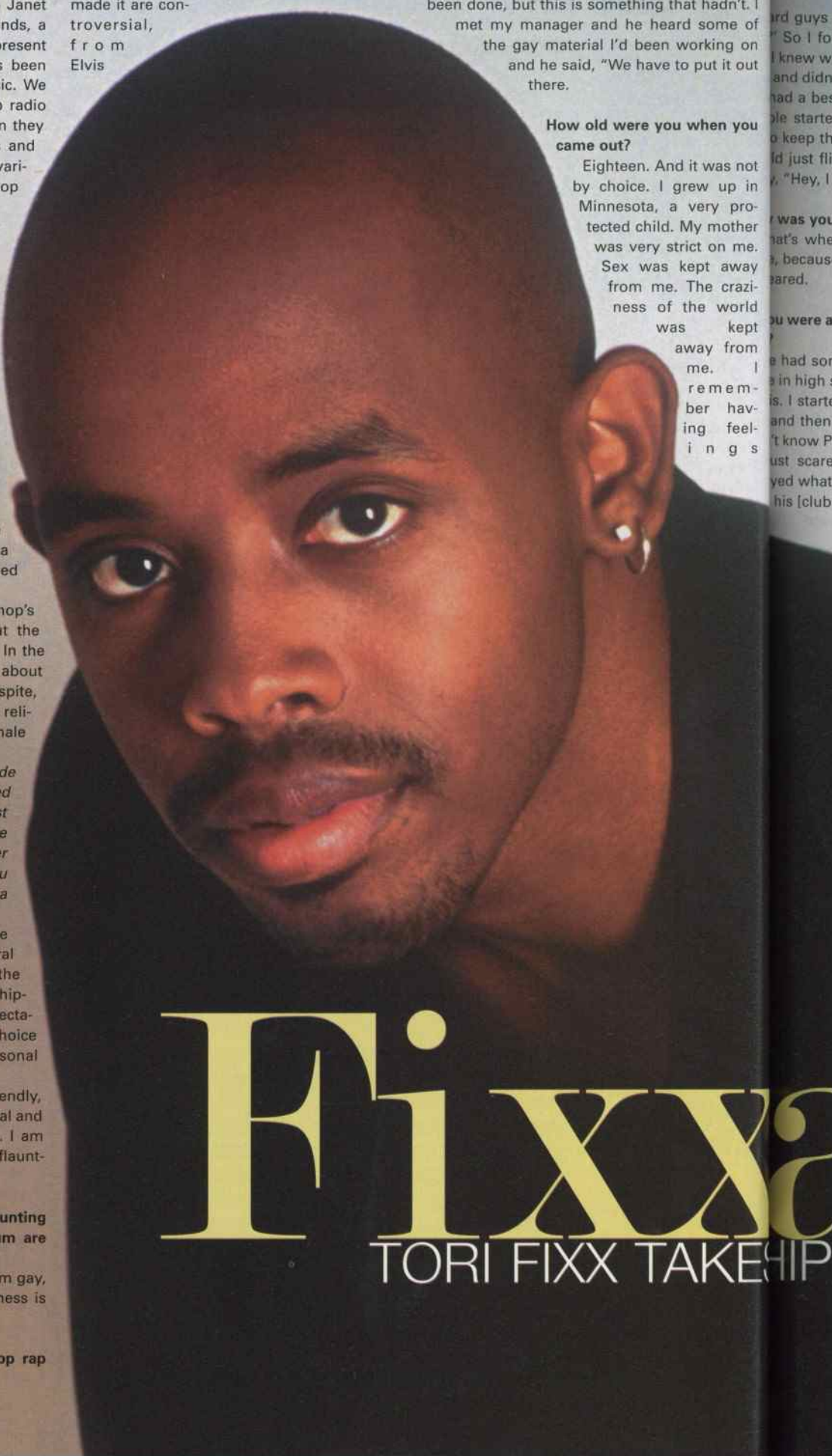
album that has such strongly gay content?

In the music industry, the things that have made it are controversial, from Elvis

Presley on up to Prince and Madonna. Everyone was claiming that everything had been done, but this is something that hadn't. I met my manager and he heard some of the gay material I'd been working on and he said, "We have to put it out there."

How old were you when you came out?

Eighteen. And it was not by choice. I grew up in Minnesota, a very protected child. My mother was very strict on me. Sex was kept away from me. The craziness of the world was kept away from me. I remember having feelings

ward guys and thinking, "This is crazy! What is it?" So I fought with it all through high school and I knew when I was eighteen, full-on that I was gay, and didn't know what I was going to do about it. I had a best friend all through high school and he started assuming that we were together. I had to keep things from getting to his family, who would just flip, I had to come out and tell everybody, "Hey, I am, but he's not."

How was your announcement received?

"That's when I found out who my real friends were, because about half of them just kind of disappeared."

You were a deejay for Prince. How did that happen?

"I had some models that were best friends of mine in high school. I got to be an extra in a video with them. I started getting invited to his private parties and then one day I got a chance to deejay. I didn't know Prince was there, so when he came in, I was just scared the hell out of me. He said he enjoyed what I did and wanted me to be a part of his [club and party] team."

Was there any point where you felt that?

being gay would put you at odds with a music career?

"Yes. I didn't want to end up like those guys in 'N Sync where the public is watching every little thing you do and you start taking drugs because you're hiding all these facts. The one thing I wanted to do is an album of this sort, something to put it all on the table so that no-one could come back later and say, 'Guess what we found out?' Of course, that was before George Michael and Ellen and now we've had so many people come out that it really isn't that big of a deal any more."

Even in the world of hip-hop?

"In hip-hop it is a big deal and always will be. Hip-hop is not accepting of very many things at all. It's really just very dark. I know a lot of people dance and party to it, but when you really listen to it, it's very gloomy. Whether I admitted I was gay or not, that's probably how I'd be perceived. Hip-hop doesn't really talk about love or other positive things. I don't know if [The Mochasutra] will really be accepted by

them, but I don't know how long hip-hop is going to last."

Even in light of the current success of artists like Eminem and Lil' Kim?

"I think it'll be kind of like the punk movement of the late 70s and 80s. Hip-hop had its heyday in the 90s and now people aren't showing enough originality to make it last, so it'll go back under-

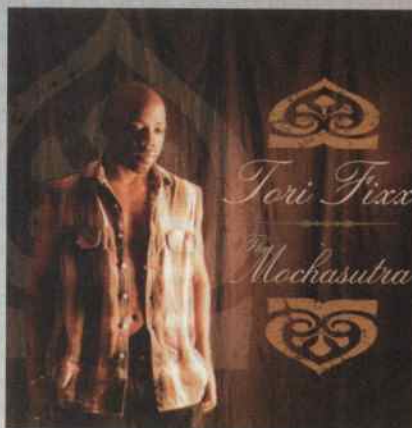
ground in the same way punk did."

What music do you listen to at home?

"I'm an alternative junkie. As a DJ, I have zillion records. But none of the Britney Spears remixes get played when I'm at home. I put Kate Bush and Sarah McLachlan on shuffle and just let 'em go all day."

How do you think radio is going to respond to The Mochasutra?

"They'll have to edit the swearing. But there's a station up here that's playing the song I Do Both Jay and Jane [by singer LaRissa]. A lot of the rappers now, especially the females, are starting to play with a little bisexual thing. So who knows? I didn't think straight people would like my record at all, but I've had seventeen-year-old girls come up who have bought the CD and want my autograph. At first I had to ask them, 'Did you listen to the words?' They said they had and thought it was cool. That's mind-blowing for me."



What's your favorite track on The Mochasutra?

"I like The Papi's Layer. It's got a jazzy feel to it. Plus the song is really personal."

You have a fascination with Latino men?

"I did for a really long time. For the people I hung out with, they were considered really exotic."

I don't suppose you encountered a lot of Latino papi chulos growing up in Minneapolis.

"No, exactly. But now I live in California, and they're all around me. So my curious fascination has been satisfied. (laughs)"

Well, partially. **H**

SARA LEE—*Make It Beautiful*

Sara Lee's name will undoubtedly be familiar to you if you read liner notes like me. Lee has played bass on albums by

Ani DiFranco, the B52's, Indigo Girls and Gang of Four. On her solo debut disc, Lee enlisted the songwriting skills of several of her musical collaborators to co-write songs with her, which she sings in a confident, (if not all that powerful, voice). The title track and "Hood Over Hood," both co-written by DiFranco (who supplies background vocals on the first song), are funky and rhythmic little numbers that highlight Lee's bass guitar playing. "Grace," co-written by Emily Saliers, is a toe-tapping love song as graceful as its title suggests. Jules Shear's pal Pal Shazar co-wrote four of the album's songs, the highlights of which includes "My Way," with its soulful horn section, and the upbeat "Come Round" (which features BETTY on backing vocals). "Thin Ice," co-written by Kristen Hall, is the album's most enchanting ballad.

Simply Love



HOLLY NEAR—*Simply Love*

"Definitive North American cultural worker" Near's living legacy is spread out for our ears and our eyes on this two disc "women's

music collection" spanning more than fifteen years. One of the most recognizable names and voices in the arena of women's music, Near's significant contributions are still as vital today as they were when she released her first album in 1973. Her vocals, reminiscent of both Joni Mitchell and Joan Baez, and the songs she sang of personal and political empowerment still resonate today. This compilation includes Near originals (staples such as "Something About The Women," "Golden Thread," and "Imagine My Surprise!") as well as compositions by other women (such as Ferron, Meg Christian, Margie Adam, and Linda Tillery) who were, and still are, active in the women's music community. Near's cover of Cris Williamson's "Waterfall" (recorded live at the 1985 anniversary of the Michigan Womyn's Music Festival), featuring guest vocal performances by Rhiannon and Adrienne B. Torf, reminds us, as this compilation does, that sisterhood is indeed powerful.

BRENDA RUSSELL—*Paris Rain*

Brenda Russell's songs have been covered by Donna Summer ("Dinner With Gershwin"), Luther Vandross ("If Only For One Night"), and Oleta Adams ("Get Here").

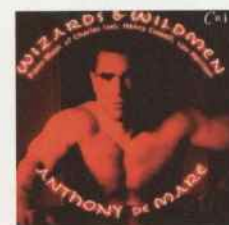
Beloved and respected as a songwriter, Russell herself had hits with the songs "So Good, So Right" and "Piano In The

Dark." Russell has returned after a number of years with a mature and varied new album. Her timing is great, considering that more traditional sounding R&B is making a comeback thanks to artists such as Angie Stone and Mary J. Blige. Russell wrote or co-wrote 10 of the album's 11 tracks. The Perry Sisters (Sharon, Carol, and Lori), who backed up performers at the Equality Rocks concert in Washington DC contribute backing vocals, as do out and proud backing vocalists David Lasley and Arnold McCuller. Russell sounds a bit like Dionne Warwick on "Something About Your Love," and she expands her style by including Latin rhythms on the songs "Walkin' in New York" and "Please Felipe." Russell also shows that she hasn't lost her ability to craft beautiful ballads ("Love And Paris Rain") and catchy pop songs ("Move The Moon," co-written by Carole King).



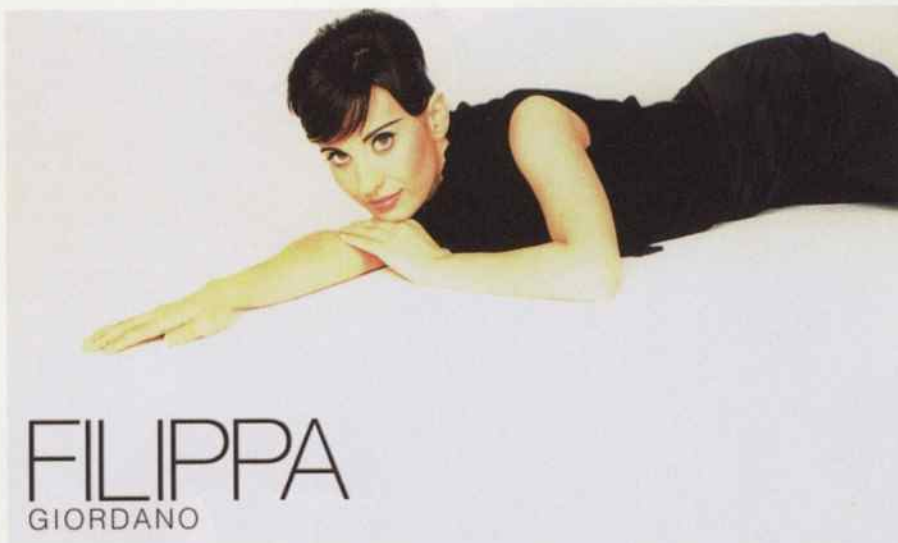
ter a classical pianist, and her brother a cello teacher. Giordano's first CD brings together elements of opera, traditional Italian music, and musical theatre with a rich combination of Italian, French, and English language vocal performances. ANTHONY DE MARE—*Wizards & Wild Men*



One look at GLAMA-nominated pianist Anthony De Mare's impressive biceps and pectoral muscles and you'll be saying, "I'm your piano. Play me." The compositions

DeMare plays on this CD are by Charles Ives (1874-1954), Henry Cowell (1897-1965) and Lou Harrison



FILIPPA GIORDANO—*Filippa Giordano*

Sarah Brightman is pulling her hair out over the arrival of Filippa Giordano. Giordano is younger, sexier, and has a spectacular voice that is going to give her the career Brightman has been trying to have for years. Imagine the combined voices of Kathleen Battle, Mariah Carey, and Celine Dion with a dash of Kate Bush and you begin to have a sense of this woman's vocal abilities. Her classical training and roots run deep: her grandfather was one of the last Sicilian cantores, her father a baritone in the Sistine Chapel choir, her mother a mezzo soprano, her uncle an opera singer, her sis-

(1917-), three "wizards & wild men" known for their important but complex contributions to American music. The music, composed during the early part of the 20th century, is not easily accessible and requires a patient and focused ear. To his credit, DeMare breathes humanity and feeling into the occasionally foreboding scores. Another part of what makes the work and careers of Cowell and Harrison of interest is that both men are gay.

EMILIANA TORRINI—*Love in the Time of Science*

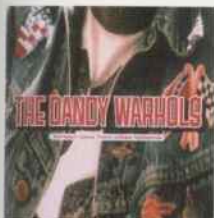
A self-described drama queen, Icelandic/Italian singer Torrini will first and



foremost call Bjork to mind, and that's not a bad place to start. Her debut disc, produced by Roland Orzabal (of Tears For Fears fame) is an audacious melange of Euro-pop circa 2000

that also recalls the hippy-hoppy strains of Morcheeba (particularly Morcheeba vocalist Skye Edwards) and Dido. Since the trend seems to be moving in that direction, Torrini seems to have arrived just in time. Spooky and sexy songs such as "To Be Free," and "Dead Things" (with its recurring sorry-wrong-number phone tone) are the perfect soundtrack for that haunted house you wanted to erect this Halloween. Techno-torch tunes such as "Wednesday's Child," "Fingertips," and "Summerbreeze," allow Torrini the opportunity to emote without getting all choked up. The first day of summer is only eight months away, so it's not too early to make the guardedly giddy "Unemployed In Summertime" your theme song for that treasured season.

DANDY WARHOLS—Thirteen Tales From Urban Bohemia



Punk psychedelia is the order of the day on this unexpectedly lush album that features Eric Matthews playing trumpet on two songs ("Godless"

and "Cool Scene"). This is an album by a band (featuring lead singer Courtney Taylor-Taylor and his inviting lips) that sounds too cool to be on a major label, and they do it all from their home base of Portland, Oregon. Even if you don't take mind enhancing drugs, put this record on and prepare to trip out. The aforementioned "Godless" and "Mohammed" are aural religious experi-

ences that will have you swimming in your own holy water.

THE 6THS—Hyacinths and Thistles



Singer/writer Stephin Merritt's music publishing company is called Gay and Loud, but the buzz around this new CD proves he's much more than that. Merritt is

the mastermind behind The 6ths, as well as the bands Future Bible Heroes, The Gothic Archies, and The Magnetic Fields (whose 1999 three disc masterwork 69 LOVE SONGS made several "best of" lists, including my own). For The 6ths, Merritt produces and writes all of the songs. However, unlike his other musical projects, all of the songs on the 6ths' albums are performed by other artists. On WASPS' NEST, the 6ths' bouncy and electronic 1995 debut disc, Lou Barlow (Sebadoh), Georgia Hubley (Yo La Tengo), and Dean Wareham (Luna), brought Merritt's songs to giddy life. For the latest 6ths album, Merritt has somehow assembled an even cooler line-up, including Momus, Miho Hatori (of Cibo Matto), and Miss Lily Banquette (of Combustible Edison. Imagine if Stephen Sondheim had been a contemporary of Kurt Weill's, and you have scratched the surface of Merritt's gifts. His 21st century cabaret tunes are both futuristic and anachronistic. On "I've Got New York," grown up flower child Melanie sounds like Marianne Faithfull's sister, accompanied by Margaret Leng Tan on a toy piano. Blues legend Odetta finds the chanteuse within on "Waltzing Me All The Way Home." Insurgent country diva (and Mekons' punk rock legend) Sally Timms sounds perfectly natural cooing over the synthesized melody and percus-

sion on "Give Me Back My Dreams." I got choked up when I heard Clare Grogan (of Altered Images fame) sing "Night Falls Like A Grand Piano" (where has she been!), and Sarah Cracknell (of Saint Etienne) has the honor of singing the lines "with all my new lovers/and there've been twenty-two/I've been kissing the mirror/wishing it was you." My favorite song is the tearjerker "He Didn't," with Bob Mould (sounding surprisingly like Merritt) accompanied on piano by Kenny Mellman. The only missing artists that would have made this a more complete cabaret experience are Ute Lemper, Tom Waits, Nick Cave, and Faithfull.

DIVAS SIMPLY SINGING—Various Artists



For 10 years, actress/singer Sheryl Lee Ralph has produced an LA evening performance of vocalists to benefit Project Angel Food and the

Safe Place for Pediatric AIDS. Make no mistake, this is the ORIGINAL Divas Live. Even without a wide release, the CD has become a bestseller at Virgin records. Ralph joins the likes of Melissa Manchester, Peggy Lee, Anita Johnson, Oleta Adams, Deborah Gibson, Erin Hamilton, and Toni Tennille each singing their favorite songs. Surprise performances in the "ones to watch" category include E.G. Daily's "Breath of Heaven" and Tisha Campbell's "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face." 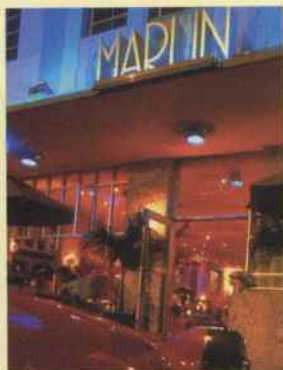
The **11TH STREET DINER** is an original 1948 art deco diner schlepped all the way from Wilkes Barre, PA, and plopped down in the center of the South Beach nightlife scene.

Restored in '92 to its original Deco form, it continues to serve traditional American food after 44 years of service. Open 24-hours, it is definitely a locals' hangout, and the crowd becomes quite colorful in the wee hours of the morning (post club closing). Great down-home cooking specials include "Mom's Pot Roast,"

If you're getting a power tan on SOBE's infamous 12th Street Beach and feel lunchtime yearnings kick in, pack up and walk over to the **PALACE BAR AND GRILLE**, conveniently located on Ocean Drive. You'll find a bevy of (mostly shirtless) beautiful people dining on the sidewalk café outside. Later, they have a packed and pumping happy hour with men fresh off the beach and literally spilling out of the open-air bar. There are affordable sunset prix-fixe dinner specials daily. Tucked within the Miami Design District is **PICCADILLY GARDENS**, a comfortable family-run restaurant featuring an eclectic menu known mostly to the locals. During lobster season, the owners catch their own fresh Florida Lobster and serve it up the same day. THE MARLIN HOTEL is an Island Outpost property owned by music mogul Chris Blackwell. It is an icon of South Beach Renaissance and considered a pioneer in the historic Art Deco District. It has been heralded as "the Rock and Roll Hotel" and houses South Beach Studios, where the likes of Aerosmith, U2, Grace Jones and Nine Inch Nails come to mix portions of their albums. This mostly suite "boutique" hotel attracts celebs and is richly appointed in the true art deco manner. Each room features Web TV with

**Inside the Marlin Hotel**

If you want to be far enough away to enjoy resort-like solitude but still close to the bustling activity of South Beach, the **INDIAN CREEK HOTEL** is probably your best bet.

SLEEP

Built in 1936, this beautifully restored 61-room hotel is the recipient of the Miami Design Preservation League's award for Outstanding Restoration. The property is situated amidst lush tropical gardens and has a sparkling pool. The friendly, efficient staff knows what's happening and where—just ask. (Boardwalk and beach are a quick bike-hike away; 2727 Indian Creek Dr.; 305-531-2727; \$90-\$240)

LEVEL NIGHT CLUB's "Studio 54" party happens on October 5th. If you've never been to the club, it is a must on any night, particularly the "Federation Friday" nights for men. Level is the latest leaseholder for the space known previously as "Paragon." It is a club constructed within the confines of a converted old Deco theater and is the mother of all SOBE nightclubs. The "Studio 54" party commands the closing of Washington Avenue with its own parade: multiple floats, a cast of over 170 performers, set changes and a special appearance by the disco diva herself, Thelma Houston. If a bit of modern day culture is your ambition, check out the "Splendor in the Glass" art glass exhibit at the **LOWE ART MUSEUM**. From the exquisite weekday sandwich selection, which includes a croque truffe (a grilled truffle, mushroom and cheese sandwich), to the perfect desserts, Chef Elizabeth Faulkner knows how to capture your imagination and sweet tooth. My favorite item on the menu is the make-your-own ice cream sandwich: choose from the wide selection of cookies and the daily changing ice creams and sorbets. Chef Faulkner made a name for herself at her previous venue in the Mission with her architecturally challenging cakes. Three of her favorites are sold at the counter: After Midnight Chocolate Cake (the best), Tropical Shag (genoise cake, passionfruit mousse, buttercream and coconut)

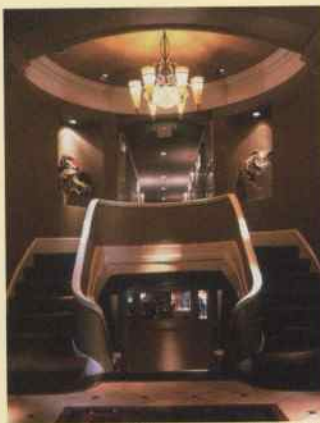

The modern décor is romantic and not too noisy—a great date restaurant. When you walk up to the front door you might think the space is small, but inside the arrangement is cozy without being cramped. The changing monthly menu always features fresh fish, poultry, red meat and a vegetarian course, but don't miss the twice-baked goat cheese soufflé appetiz-

The FERRY PLAZA FARMER'S MARKET

runs Saturdays (8am-1:30pm) and Tuesdays during the summer (10:30am-2:30pm). Free admission gets you into a culinary Eden: buy some of California's freshest fruits and vegetables, as well as fresh bakery breads, pastries and handmade arts and crafts. Some of the city's best restaurants set up booths and serve brunch all morning, so just come for a bite

and the view along the wharf. You may not be able to find these jams, jellies, honey, fresh almonds, spouts, artisan cheeses or chilies anywhere else. Make sure to try the pluots (plum-apricots), or grab a salad tossed with edible flowers. You may have been to a farmer's market before, but this one tops them all.

Dress warmly and head out to **FORT POINT NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE**, directly underneath the Golden Gate Bridge. Built in the 19th century to house huge cannons and protect the bay from attack by a hostile fleet during the civil war, Fort Point became obsolete only a year after it was completed. It was used as storage for years, then eventually became Joseph Strauss' base of operations for construction of the Golden Gate Bridge from 1933 to 1937. Soldiers occupied it during the Second World War in order to monitor the submarine net strung across the entrance of the bay. However, Fort Point probably played its most prominent role in history when Alfred Hitchcock featured it in *Vertigo*—it's where Madeleine (Kim Novak) attempts to kill herself by jumping into the bay. It makes a great walk, especially when combined with a tour of the Golden Gate Bridge.

Best of all, you can shop according to your energy level with choices ranging from hot, ready-to-eat entrees to microwaveable

dishes to raw goods. Prices vary according to the level of preparation. Choose from American to Italian to everything in between. Desserts from the on-site

bakery are heavenly. A good selection of wines and fresh-cut flowers make this truly a one-stop-shop for romantics. TIP: Stop by near closing time to enjoy some delicious price markdowns as well.

There is perhaps no better place to celebrate the harvest season than the charming **BREADWINNERS CAFE & BAKERY** (3301 McKinney Ave. at Hall St., Dallas, 214-754-4940, \$8-\$15). Located in Dallas' eclectic Uptown neighborhood, the food is as scrumptious as the decor, with upscale breakfast "comfort-food" like poached eggs in creamy Hollandaise sauce. Mid-day offerings consist of ultra-fresh sandwiches, salads and pastas. Dinner includes entrées like crusted pork tenderloin served over seared potato rounds and crisscrossed with mustard. The signature bakery also produces exquisite desserts, sweet rolls, muffins and homemade breads, so save room for dessert!

THE SAMBA ROOM (4514 Travis St., Suite 132) is an ultra-hip Cuban bar and Latin-American eatery tucked inside the trendy Knox-Henderson area. Amid the Prada and Gucci, you'll discover a retro-fantasy

interior that includes a serpentine bar, sheer white curtains that offer teasing views of the cigar lounge (don't worry, it comes equipped with a smoke exhaust system to preserve everyone's hair) and white linen table settings, complete with whimsical coconut sugar bowls. Frenzied live Brazilian music completes the high-energy atmosphere. After drinks and plenty of seeing and being seen, you'll be starving, and **SAMBA ROOM** does not disappoint. Try the Rum-Raisin Plantain Crusted Mahi-Mahi served on coconut rice, or Recado Rubbed Roast Chicken with rum-vanilla mashed boniatos.

Vegetarians and those seeking a more spiritually-significant dining experience should look no further than the **COSMIC CAFE** (2912 Oak Lawn Ave. at Cedar Springs Rd., Dallas, TX 75219, 214-521-6157, \$5-\$9). This quirky Indian restaurant, meditation space and coffee/tea parlor resides in a colorful old house overflowing with Eastern religious decorations and flowers. Exotic music and intimate seating on the neighborly front porch and in the living room by the fireplace bring together an eclectic group of regulars, from hippies to yuppies to Zen masters. If you're not in the mood for something Indian, try the delicious Spinach Enchiladas (\$7.95) served with black beans, natural rice and fresh mixed greens with vinaigrette. For dessert, share a bowl of nirvana, otherwise known as the tasty mango ice cream (\$2.95). The coffee is self-serve and free-flowing. Feel free to take a book from the library to read with your meal.

If you're tired of chain hotels and ready for something more personal and unique, try **SLEEP THE SOUTHERN HOUSE** (2625 Thomas Avenue, 214-720-0845, southernhouse.com, starts at \$100 per night, including breakfast and afternoon tea or apéritifs). Pam Southern and her husband custom-

built this three-story prairie-style home in Uptown, putting you five minutes away from the Dallas Museum of Art and Cultural District, Oak Lawn/Cedar Springs, upscale shopping in Highland Park and more. Enjoy the sweeping views of the downtown Dallas Skyline at night. All of the amenities you would expect to find in a bed and breakfast of this caliber are here.

From Sept. 29-Oct. 22, head over to the **2000 STATE FAIR OF TEXAS** (Fair Park, 214-565-9931, bigtex.com, \$10 adult admission). The 2000 State Fair is "Celebrating the 21st Century" with much fanfare. In addition to fun amusement rides (the World's Largest Ferris Wheel!), you will also find a vast array of exhibits and events to choose from, and most are

free. Some of the most popular include the 2001 Auto Show, Robot Zoo, Future Visions, the Aqua Blast dive team (need I say more?) and "Sacred Space," a breathtaking photography exhibit featuring over 150 mural-sized color photos of sacred landscapes and architecture in Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras and the Southern US. Be sure to also check out, BIG TEX, the official ambassador of the State Fair of Texas, a 52-ft. tall talking-and-waving cowboy.

Located just south of WeHo, **THE IVY** (113 N. Robertson Blvd., 310-274-8303) provides the kind of experience you feel tickled to have had. Situated in a quaint cottage and surrounded by a white picket fence, this restaurant is one of the most popular eateries for the LA privileged set, and with good reason. Delicious dishes served on signature hand-painted Ivy plates include their famous crab cakes; a warm, crisp grilled vegetable salad; and some of the best key lime pie outside of Florida. Opt for the outdoor patio seating—tucked under floral fabric umbrellas by day and candlelit at night, it's the perfect vantage point

EAT to sit on their amply cushioned chairs and watch chi-chi celeb diners come and go. At a recent HERO staff lunch, Jennifer Lopez sat next to us (looking radiant and wearing no make-up), and David Geffen walked by with a handsome lunchmate in tow. Start with one of the famous Ivy gimlets or Mint Juleps and you'll be content for hours. Come to think of it we got very little done at that meeting...

On the very opposite end of the spectrum is **THE PIG** (612 N. La Brea at Melrose, 323-935-1116), a new Memphis-style barbecue joint that is THE new place to go (as long as you're not on a diet). Try the grill-

pigged out, don't miss the Apple Rumble Crumble or the best Pecan Pie in LA (both are served drizzled with hot caramel sauce). Fresh lemonade is another specialty. The entire staff is very friendly, but there's not much seating here (a few tables inside and a few more on the sidewalk), so you may have to take it home. The Pig is comfort food at its most comfortable.

JOAN'S ON THIRD (8350 West Third Street, 323-655-2285) is a great place for lunch when you feel like you deserve something special. A small deli/gourmet food shop on ever-more-hip Third Street near the Beverly Center, Joan's is like Dean & DeLuca's teeny West Coast sister. The clean white and stainless steel shop features refrigerated cases full

of decadent blocks of macaroni and cheese, couscous, and yummy turkey meatloaf, all begging you to have a little of this and a little of that. The maple rosemary roasted chicken breast and grilled vegetable and goat cheese sandwiches are delicious, and the homemade chocolate chip and oatmeal cookies will change your life (or at least your waistline). If you're headed to the Hollywood Bowl or the beach for a romantic picnic for two, try their "Moveable Feasts"—gourmet picnic packs featuring specialties like pesto-

crusted salmon with basil cream or crisp Blue Lake beans with heirloom tomatoes.

SLEEP disco beat. The rooms are spartan but cozy, and the lush gardens and courtyard are charming and homey, almost like a B&B. The center of activity is definitely the swimming

pool, and depending on what's happening that weekend, it can be tranquil or quite a party scene. Whether you lose the suit or not, the Inn is close to everything and a comfortable, convenient place to stay in WeHo (845 N. San Vicente, West Hollywood, \$59-179, 310-854-6915).

Escape to Vegas Oct. 6-8 for an **ATLANTIS** weekend of events, beginning on Friday (9pm-4am), with a cocktail, performance, and dance event featuring local Vegas entertainers. On Sat. (11am-5pm), enjoy live entertainment and a day at Wet 'n Wild water park, open exclusively to Atlantis guests. From 9pm—dawn the party continues both indoors and under the stars at an all-night dance party at MGM Grand Adventures. Unfortunately, Laura has consistently refused to take accountability for the impact of her words. She has chosen to hide behind a narrow notion of free-speech rights, one long on license but utterly devoid of responsibility.

One of the ironies of Midwestern Chicago is the abundance of great Thai restaurants. Among these, **THE BANGKOK** (3542 N. Halsted St.) shines like a jewel in the crown. Although Wrigley Field is only a few streets away, you'd never know it once inside the

soothing traditional setting, complete with Jade elephants and potted palms. Popular for its Sunday brunch buffet, the Bangkok also offers affordable entrees in the \$6-10 range. Delight in the perfectly-named "Goody! Goody!" appetizer, a blend of crabmeat and shrimp rolled in tofu skin. Try a generous portion of traditional Pad Thai, or venture farther afield with Catfish Dynamite, deep-fried in a wok with

curry paste. Parking is difficult during baseball season, but the Addison el stop is only two blocks west. (773-327-2870)

For lazy weekend mornings when the thought of cooking gives you hives, stroll to one of five **ANN SATHER** locations (Andersonville, Lincoln Park, and three in Lakeview). Each offers steaming hot cinnamon rolls as gooey as they come. Or better yet, get a dozen to go from the glass case at the entrance. Savor the Swedish pancakes served with lingonberries, also available with meatballs. Now owned by gay community activist Tom Tunney (who bought the restaurants from the real Ann Sather), the original Belmont location features Scandinavian diner décor and very efficient service. If the hand-painted pastoral scenes on the walls don't divert your eye, the clientele certainly will. Early Sunday morning crowds include a mix of seniors getting ready for church, fast-track yuppies with their children, and bleary eyed club kids still up

from the night before. (929 W. Belmont, 773-348-2378)

Need a dose of 1940's elegance to complement your new Prada

shoes? Try the panache of **CLUB LUCKY** (1824 W. Wabansia). Don't let its location in trendy Bucktown turn you off. This throwback to supper clubs of the past has flair to spare.

Sample one of their Killer Martinis with hand stuffed bleu cheese olives in the cocktail lounge, then proceed to the dining area, where generous portions of Italian food are served family style. Specialties include pork chops, chicken Vesuvio, and eggplant parmigiana (\$8-24). Set the mood by popping a Sinatra CD in your car stereo on the way there, hand your keys over to the valet, and note the club's original tin ceiling and shadow box windows as you enter. In its storied past, the building has been a speakeasy, hardware store, and American Legion dance hall. (773-227-2300)

If a peerless view of the Chicago River and access to world class shopping on Michigan Avenue is a priority, visit the elegant **HOTEL MONACO** (225 N. Wabash). Admire yourself in the full-length dressing mirrors, allow garments wrinkled in

transit to unfurl in the armoire, or sit at the mahogany writing desk and compose a letter to an old friend—all feel appropriate amidst the 1920's French Deco design, including the hotel's trademark pistachio green and buttercream wallpaper. Themed guest packages cater to unique needs, ranging from the shopper's delight "Charge!" (which includes a gift certificate to nearby Marshall Field's) to the "Insomniac's Delight" (three in-room movies, bedtime snacks, and an eyemask for when slumber eventually overcomes you). The Monaco is even pet-friendly, offering a complimentary goldfish for your room, tended to during the

If something nearer to Boys' Town is more your taste, you can't

get much closer than bed and breakfast **VILLA TOSCANA** (3447 N. Halsted). In the midst of the hustle and bustle of Halsted Street, this 1890's Victorian-style coach house is

set back far enough from the street that the noise barely penetrates the outdoor breakfast terrace. If visiting during the frigid Chicago winter, you'll appreciate the cozy front room fireplace and fluffy down comforters and pillows in the 7 bedrooms. Sleep late and enjoy a continental breakfast in bed or on the sundeck, then stroll east to the lake, only a few blocks away. (\$99-159 in season, lower rates in winter, villatoscana.com)

Part piano bar, part cabaret, part family room, **DAVENPORT'S** (1383

N. Milwaukee) is the latest and classiest addition to Chicago's music scene. With co-owner Bill Davenport frequently working the room to ensure a smile on everyone's face, the Wicker Park establishment offers a warm, inclusive atmosphere, with its blue velvet curtains and deep banquettes. Enjoy a relaxing cocktail and sing along to

showtunes in the front room piano bar. A cover charge of \$10-15 and a two drink minimum gets you into the acoustically-ideal back room cabaret, where you and an intimate audience of 50 others can catch local faves 3 Girls 3 singing Burt Bacharach. Plenty of street parking sweetens the deal. (773-278-1830, online at: davenportspianobar.com)

On sunny days in Chicago's brief but intense summer, it seems everyone and their mother is enjoying the benefit of the **LAKEFRONT PATH**. People-watching is at a premium on the narrow tread, stretching over 8 miles from downtown to Roger's Park. Strap on rollerblades and glide through virtually every neighborhood in the city. Shoot past the gawking tourists at downtown Navy Pier, cruise by the glamorous Drake Hotel and chi-chi Oak St. beach, where ladies who lunch mix with Abercrombie model look-alikes. Glide through Lincoln Park and stop for a quick break at the always boy-laden Belmont Rocks. Continue north, Lake Michigan gleaming on your right all the while, through parks featuring family picnics, softball games, even Native American totems. By the time you've finished, you'll have seen the many facets of Chicago and have rock hard glutes to boot.

For an exercise in culture without the stuffy trappings, visit the **MUSE-**

PLAY**UM OF CONTEMPORARY**

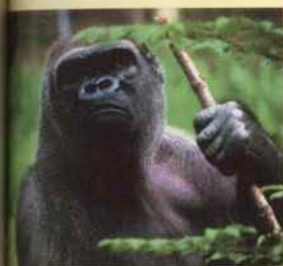
ART (220 E. Chicago Ave.). Near historic Water Tower Place, the museum offers a glimpse of contemporary visual art and performance dat-

ing from 1945. Take a walk with your sweetie through the romantic sculpture garden with a glorious view of Lake Michigan, participate with a friend in one of the interactive exhibits reminiscent of grade school fun houses, or simply stroll by yourself through the sometimes disturbing but always thought provoking video dis-

plays. If probing the issues of masculinity and desire in relation to the mythologies of the West gets too much for you, go check out the hotties in the Mark Morris Dance Group, appearing in performance this fall at the museum's 300-seat theater. A quick nosh at the Spago-style Puck's at the MCA will reenergize you after your rigorous intellectual workout (312-280-2660, mcachicago.org).

DOMINICK'S • FULL MOON • THE CHELSEA HOTEL • WAVE HILL • WOODLAWN CEMETARY • BY CHRIS MEASOM

Only six miles from midtown Manhattan lies an island—an oasis really—in the midst of an almost stereotypical, movie-fed vision of the Bronx. Just beyond the fried chicken outlets, past the menacing gypsy cabs and through the chaotic traffic patterns lies

EAT

a calm, largely Italian-American enclave centered on Arthur Avenue. Turning off the bedlam of Fordham Road is akin to passing through the gates of Shangri-La. Here scattered among businesses like Anthony's Unisex Nail Salon, the Madonna Brothers Bakery and the D'Bari Funeral Home you'll find some of the best Italian food in the city.

DOMINICK'S (2335 Arthur Avenue, Bronx; 718-733-2807; avg. entrée unknown since there are no menus and the bill is a single figure written on a piece of paper—but cheap, no credit cards) while arguably the best, is certainly most popular.

Weekends require a long wait in the teeming upstairs bar until space is cleared at one of the picnic benches downstairs where both portions and personality are plentiful. Listen to your waiter—he knows best.

Heaping platefuls of meat and pasta crowd the table as your neighbors compare and offer to share their abundance. **FULL MOON** (602 E.

187th Street, Bronx; 718-584-3451; avg. entrée \$13)—although the faux marble and mirror-strip walls signal a (debatable) step up—is not as much fun. The staff (if you can get their attention) is serious-minded, there are menus with prices, and no one...um...helps you order. That said, the creamy gnocchi Gorgonzola, the buttery string beans, the spicy arrabiata sauce, huge meatballs and Peroni beer make this an excellent second choice. And while the decor is no great shakes at **ROBERTO'S** (632 E. 186th Street, Bronx; 718-733-9503; avg. entrée \$18) either, this bring-a-date (or Aunt Sofia) dinner place serves up hearty portions and “the family treatment.” After dinner stroll over to the **ARTHUR AVENUE CAFE** (2329 Arthur Avenue, Bronx; 718-562-0129) for a cappuccino and dessert. Clearly the newest establishment on the block—probably by 25 years—this three-month-old cafe has already

managed to attract the cigar smoking, good ol’ boys of the nabe. Dean Martin croons as the waiter squeezes homemade filling to create a fresh, crisp, delightfully rich cannoli.

Unfortunately the search for a Bronx hotel came up short. However, upon entering room 830

at **THE CHELSEA HOTEL** (222 W. 23rd Street, Manhattan; tel. 212-243-3700, fax 212-675-5531; \$175-\$275, suites up to \$385) I was instantly

transported to my grandmother's apartment (in the Bronx) circa 1973—the lived-in mish-mash decor, the bright red and orange bed spreads, the white tiled no-nonsense bath and the 1970s TV (no cable)—it was all there. The feel of this rickety old mini-apartment, with lots of room and funky, funky neighbors, is definitely more residential than hotel. In fact, the 118-year-old building is home to many writers, artists, musicians and theatre-types. And although dozens of well-knowns have stayed here, from Eugene O'Neill and Mark Twain to Jane Fonda and Ethan Hawke, this is not—I repeat not—a chi-chi kind of celebrity hangout. It's more a tattoo, tiger-print-pants-wearing (men), pierced, dyed, strumming-the-guitar-in-the-hall kind of place. The lobby is a mix of Victorian furniture—including the elaborate, disheveled check-in counter/reception desk/mailbox cubbyhole thing—and wacky art; really a who's who gallery of the current New York art scene. An 8'x 6' 3-D deconstruction of a cigar box, a huge Mr. Ed-like portrait, a buxom woman swinging from the ceiling and a really dusty chandelier welcome

you. “We don't want glitz or glamour,” manager Stanley Bard (who took over in 1962) told me in the most amazing Garry Marshall accent, “There's an informality and ambience here that the creative mind loves.” Bring your own shampoo.

If Scarlett O'Hara had given up on Tara and moved to the Bronx, **WAVE HILL** (675 West 252nd Street, Bronx; 718-549-3200; wavehill.org; \$4, free from Nov. 15-Mar. 15) is where she and Mammy would have settled.

There are no cotton fields, antebellum mansions, or Tarleton twins, but the 28 acres of gardens and woods (and former 1840s country home of William Lewis Morris) is endowed with

sweeping views of the Hudson River and the palisades and there are lovely lawns and lily ponds. In October when the trees peak and the wild garden thrives, leave Manhattan behind to sit and read, visit the small art galleries or participate in one of their programs: Tai Chi every Saturday morning, a Beethoven piano/cello/violin concert on October 15th, tasting and discussing butternut squash recipes on October 21 and 22 or a hearthside reading of Robert Frost on October 29.

Even bigger, more spectacular gardens can be found across town at **THE NEW YORK BOTANICAL GARDENS** (Bronx, New York; 718-817-8658; nybg.org; \$3). 250 acres of plant collections, wetlands, and original forest create a dazzling living museum of botany. Demonstration gardens (fragrance, wildlife, shade, cutting and autumn) give how-to ideas, while the graceful turn-of-the-century glass hothouse holds an eco-tour of the planet, from rain forest to desert. Beyond the idyllic, calming landscape—you won't believe you're in the Bronx—and the great architecture (the Beaux-Arts

museum, the 1840 Snuff Mill and Stone Cottage), the park offers events like “Get Up and Garden Day” (October 14)—a series of workshops, lectures, tours and talks by well-versed horticulturists.

Where else but in the Bronx would you find *foeniculum vulgare* and *potentilla fruticosa* happily co-habiting? And right next door to all that flora is 265 acres of fauna at the 101-year-old **BRONX ZOO** (Bronx River Parkway at Fordham; 718-367-1010; wcs.org; \$4-\$9, free on Wednesday). The Congo Gorilla

Forest, an award-winning re-creation of a 6 1/2 acre swath of central Africa, is their latest achievement. Through a combination of Disney genius (forest sounds, a mist-covered trail, fake elephant dung) and conservation science (the natural habitat, the content animals, the hands-on education) the entire production awes and inspires.

With Halloween in mind, **WOODLAWN CEMETARY** (Webster Avenue & 233rd Street, Bronx; 718-920-0500) suddenly becomes a destination. This city of the dead—well, actually more a lovely, well-maintained suburb of the dead—is not so much a spooky graveyard as it is a perfectly orchestrated small town. Filled with famous New Yorkers (Irving Berlin, F.W. Woolworth, Nellie Bly, R. H. Macy), the fantastic crypts range in style from Egyptian to Empire. Hills, dales, umbrella pines and all sorts of weeping trees make this the prettiest boneyard around.

Why 'The' Bronx?

In 1639, Jonas Bronck, a Swedish sea captain left the Netherlands and purchased 500 acres of land in the New World. Here he built a house and began a farm on a tract of land between the Harlem and Aquehug Rivers. And while the Native Americans called the land “Rananchqua,” the Dutch and English thought “Broncksland” sounded better. Soon thereafter the river changed from Aquehug to The Bronck's River, which became ‘The’ Broncks (ultimately spelled ‘Bronx’), and eventually the entire area adopted the name.

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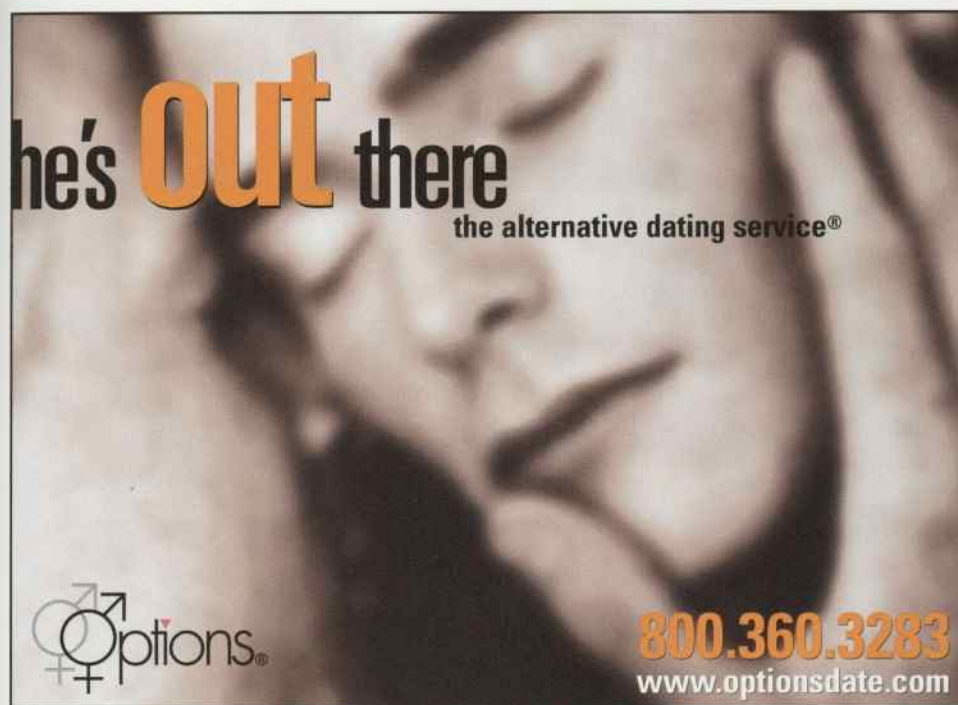
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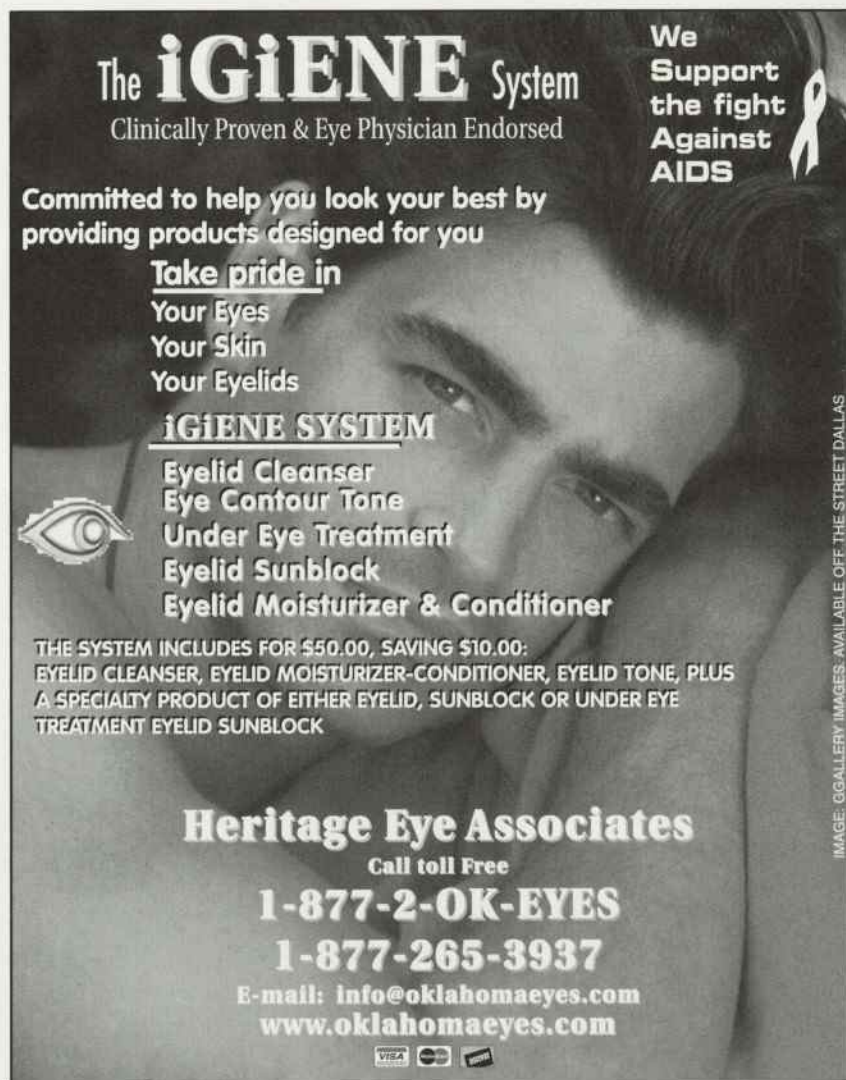
