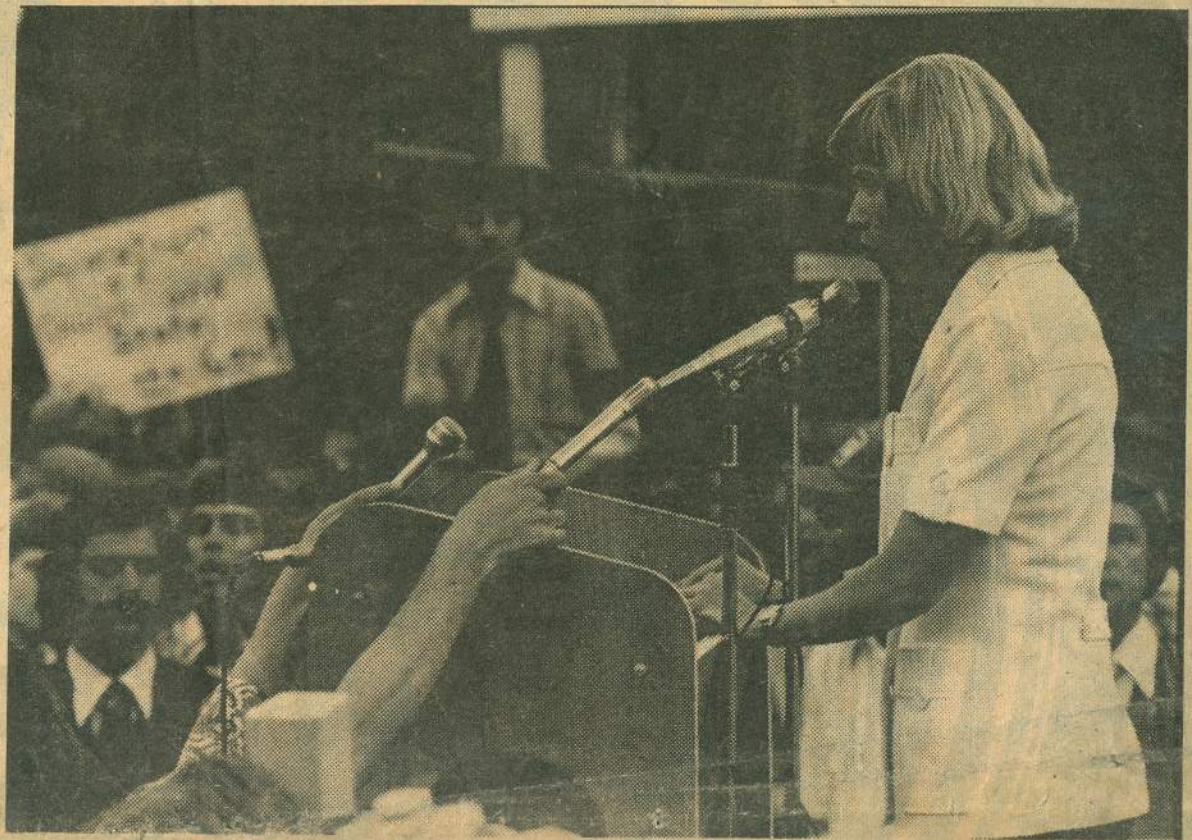
Gay people by the thousands turned out last week to protest the ideas of Anita Bryant Green and to demand equal protection under the law in such areas as housing and job security.

An estimated 2500 marched from Jackson Square through the New Orleans' French Quarter to Rampart Street, site of a singing appearance by Bryant. The marchers sang "We Shall Overcome" as they made their way to the Municipal Auditorium.

A rally and march two days earlier in Houston was also a success, said the organizers. The Star initially reported that 3000 took place in the Houston march, but that figure has been revised. It now appears that as many as 8000 people showed up at the rally and 4500 made the walk to City Hall and back.

Anderson has been active with the Houston Gay Political Caucus, and Endean heads the Minnesota Committee for Gay Rights. Both have been N.G.T.F. board members since 1976.

Charles Brydon was elected to the office of Secretary and Meryl Friedman was elected Treasurer. Brydon, who joined the board in 1975, is president of the Dorian Group in Seattle, and Friedman, who has been a board member since N.G.T.F.'s inception in 1973, is associated with the New York City Gay Teachers Association.

Newly elected to the N.G.T.F. board by the membership were Bobbi Bennett of Reseda, Calif. (Lesbian Rights Task Force); Jack W. Campbell of Miami (Dade County Coalition for Human Rights); William B. Kelly of Chicago (Illinois Gay Rights Task Force); Sean Reynolds of Chicago (Gay and Lesbian Coalition of Metropolitan Chicago); Jacqueline St. Joan of Denver (Colorado Lesbian/Gay Legal Workers); Peter Scott of Los Angeles (Municipal Elections Committee of Los Angeles); and Barbara Weinstock of Richmond, Va. (Richmond Lesbian Feminists).

Re-elected, in addition to the

board officers, were Charlotte Bunch of Washington, D.C.; Robert Carter of New York; Jean Crosby of San Francisco; Frances Doughty of New York; Gerald Gerash of Denver; Barbara Gitting of Philadelphia; Franklin Kameny of Washington, D.C.; Barbara Love of New York; Joseph Norton of Albany, New York; and Kay Whitlock of Philadelphia.

As the result of resignation, there are presently three vacancies on the board. These are, in accordance with N.G.T.F. by-laws, expected to be filled by the directors at their next meeting.

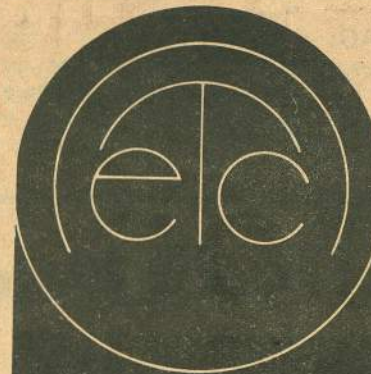

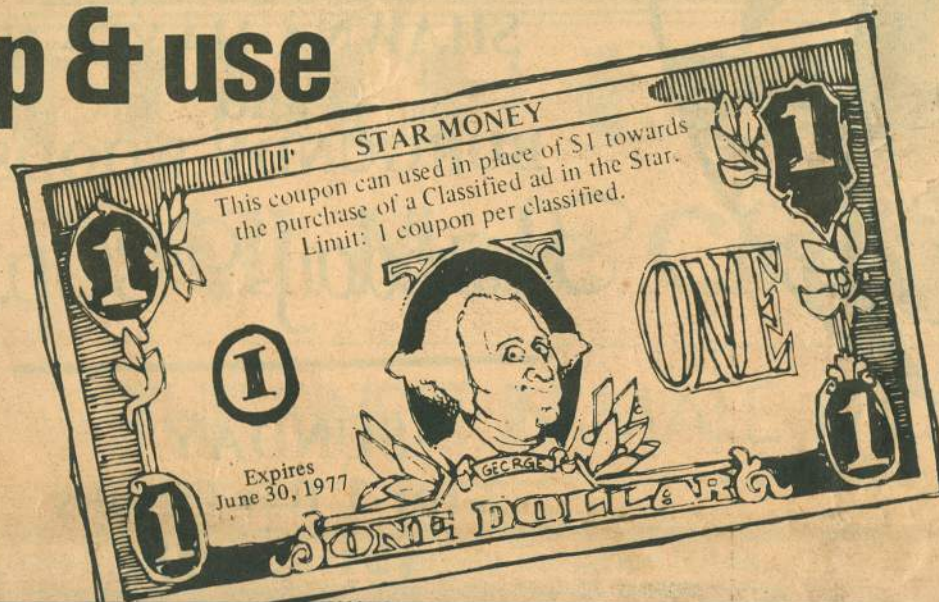

Texas activist gives view on defeat in Miami

It is unfortunate that the citizens of Dade County Florida have let irrational myth, misinformation, and emotion rule over intelligent thinking, human reasoning, and human compassion by their refusal to extend civil rights to the homosexuals of their community.

It is difficult to understand how and why their citizenry could view an extension of human rights to a large segment of the human race as a threat to the well being of their society.

Should the idea of extending the concept of "freedom of religion" to the Catholics, Jews, Mormons, and Moslems, back when Protestant America was being established, have been put to a popular vote?

Should the issue of slavery

have been voted on in Atlanta, Georgia after the Civil War in 1865?

Should the extension of the right to vote for women have been determined by a public referendum?

All of these situations would probably have been defeated due to the popular consensus at the times they were debated. So why determine civil rights for homosexuals in this way? Such hypocrisy on the part of American society is inexcusable!

Today, homosexuality is viewed through glasses scarred by myth, bigotry, and hatred. We are committed, therefore, to do everything within our power to stem this flow of ignorance.

The Miami results have provided us, if nothing more, with cohesiveness and visability. We will pursue our cause!

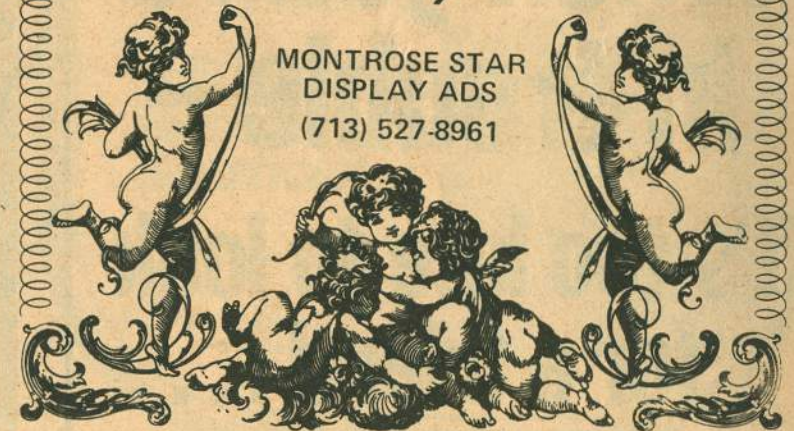

Leaders give views

President Carter, the First Lady and evangelist Billy Graham have all recently given their views on the subject of homosexuality, and if you can read between the lines it appears that each was about equally divided between pro and con.

He said we should be concerned with issues of "substance," such as unemployment, health care and housing. He said the attention being given to the issue of gay rights represents a kind of "moral decadence."

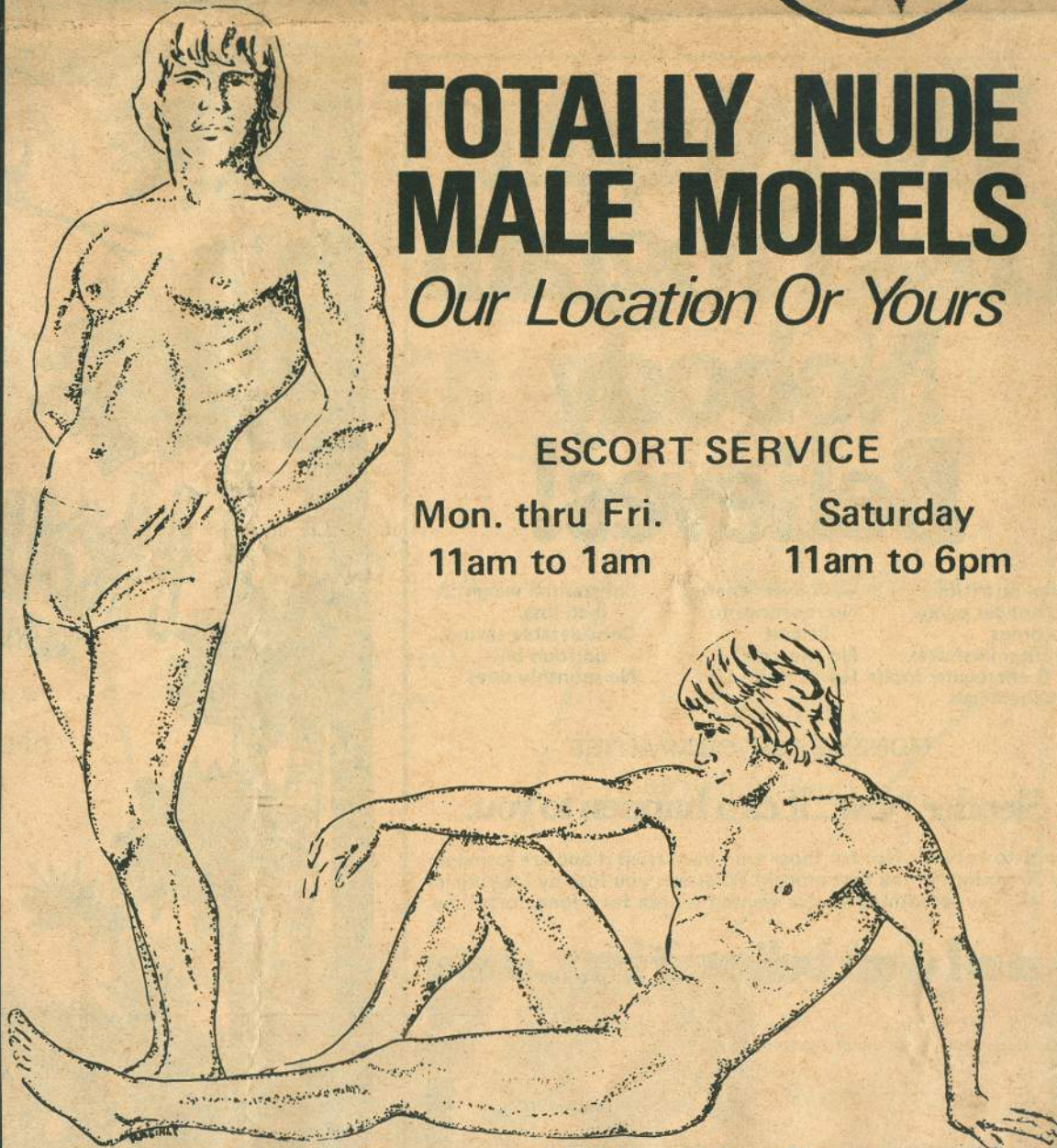

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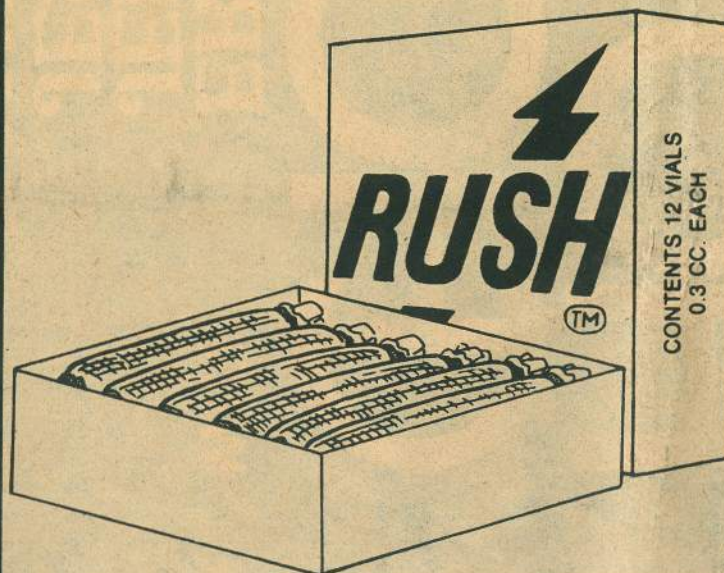
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
