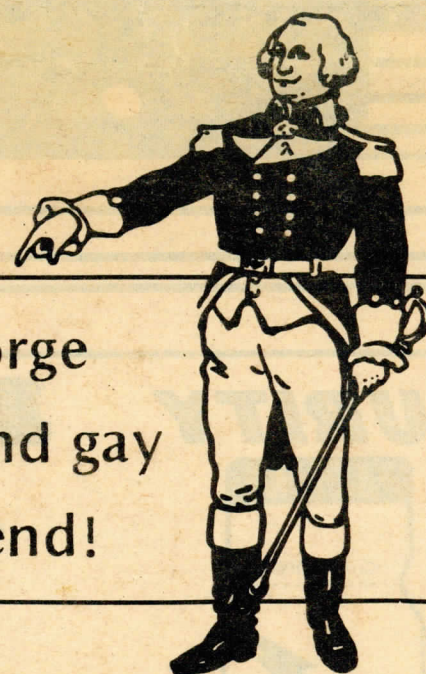
Scenes from LONE STAR ONE, the Texas-wide, Texas-sized gay motorcycle club run held in mid-June, near Magnolia.

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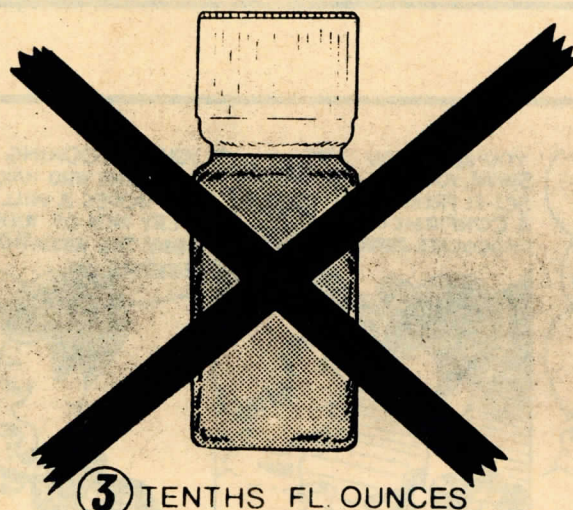
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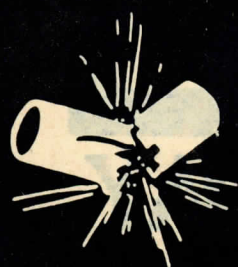


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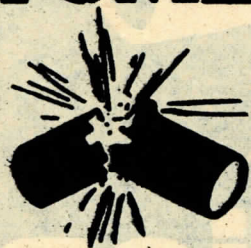
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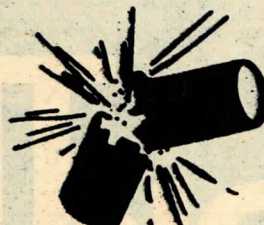
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Music

'African Queen' is hot disco safari

The Ritchie Family's new album, "African Queens," appears to be headlining a hot disco safari this summer. It starts with some heavy percussion and builds into the group's dance pattern. Side A is a tune that runs for 13 minutes and evolves around a spectacular dancing rhythm with plenty of breaks. The song is about four queens: the Queen of Sheba, Cleopatra and two others.

Side B contains a fabulous remake of Martin Denny's classic, "Quite Village," from the 50's.

Midsong records, formerly Midland International, has released the third Carol Douglas album, "Full Bloom," arranged and conducted by John Davis of Monster Orchestra fame. Side A is very up tempo with the tracks having instrumental breaks titled "Full Bloom #1 and #2." Ms. Douglas does a remarkable job on "Light My Fire," made popular by the Doors.

Side B is a mixture of ballads with the exception of "Dancing Queen."

I spent the entire weekend listening and moving to "Rumore," a 12 inch import on the C.B.A. label by Italian songstress Raffaella Carrà. The record opens with a stylized version of the sound of an S.O.S. signal being given over a huge speaker that intensifies into a heavy pounding drum sound accompanied with a vibrant chant of "La, la, la, la, la, la" from the accompanying vocalists. The song has an astounding break.

Shadybrook Records has picked up the rights for distribution in this country of the French import LP "Miss Broadway" by Belle Epoque. This

recording contains an entire 14-minute version of "Black Is Black," recorded in the 60's by Los Bravos and most recently by Cerrone.

Side B has the title cut with the vocals reminding me very much of the lead singer for British group, the Stories, who had the hit "Brother Louie."

T.K. records has unveiled three exciting 12-inchers. One is "Don't Turn Away" by Midnite Flite (the strongest of the three). The second is "Disco Flite Theme '77" by Sassy. Finally a K.C. and Sunshine Band hit, "Wrap Your Arms Around Me," by Lady Love.

The lovely and very talented Vickie Sue Robinson has come up with what promises to be her second biggest seller, "Hold Tight," a 12-incher on RCA. The song runs well over eleven minutes and fans will be pleased to know that "Turn The Beat Around" is featured on the flip.

The latest album from John Davis and the Monster Orchestra is titled after his previous smash, "Up Jumped the Devil." It is called "The Magic Is You" and has a sensational intro that precedes the cut, "You're the One." I highly recommend this album for disco orchestra lovers.

My favorite female singer, Dolly Parton, has surprised disco-dancing-loving-fans with an inspiring rendition of Jackie Wilson's hit, "You're Love Keeps Lifting Me (Higher and Higher)." The song has a country-disco flavor to it and is easy to dance to. You can find it on her current RCA LP, "New Harvest ... First Beginning."

I failed to mention on my last column two weeks ago that the LP, "Give and Take" by the Dynamic Superiors (Motown)

carries an impressive cut, "Nowhere To Run" (a Martha and the Vandellas gaint), that has some massive, gusty breaks. The album was produced by Motown biggies Bran-Holland-Dozier.

Be on the look out for the following releases in the near future: "Magic Fly" LP by the French group, Space, on U.A.; Dr. Buzzard's second RCA LP due sometime in the middle of July; and the debut LP by the First Choice, on Gold Mine, distributed by Salsoul.

Editorial

Candidates must address gays

The race for mayor of Houston is still in the early stages. There are two major candidates announced or expected to announce and a half a dozen lesser known candidates.

The Star will keep a watch on these men as the campaign develops to determine their attitudes toward the Montrose section and the gay people.

Last Tuesday night, former city councilman Jim McConn, considered one of the major candidates, was the guest of announcer Dan Lucas on KULF in a lengthy program where listeners could call in and ask questions. After some time no one had called in to ask for McConn's view on gay rights, so Lucas himself put the question to him.

"How do you intend to address the gay community during your campaign," Lucas said.

McConn responded, "I don't intend to address the gay community, but I will say that certainly no one in a McConn administration would last if they went out and harassed the gay community."

Mr. McConn apparently believes it is politically unwise for "straight" Houston to think he is courting the gay vote, but yet he recognizes the power and influence of the gay vote ... and wants it.

That's good, but the Star thinks the former city councilman could go a little further. He could address the gay community directly.

When Fred Hofheinz ran he appeared before a meeting of Integrity, Houston's only gay activists' group at the time, and openly solicited the

gay vote. The other candidates did not. And Hofheinz was elected with the gay vote.

Mr. McConn, Mr. Brisco, and all the other candidates: You can and you must *openly* solicit the gay vote, if you want it.

Somewhere down the road you're going to be invited to appear before the Star's editors for an interview. And you're going to no doubt be invited by various gay rights organizations to appear before their memberships so they can ask questions.

Accept those invitations! Address the gay community!

You've heard it a hundred times, but it's still true. This is your paper. We want to put things here to make you, your friends and associates all want to pick it up each week and to share it. We can't know what you want unless you tell us.

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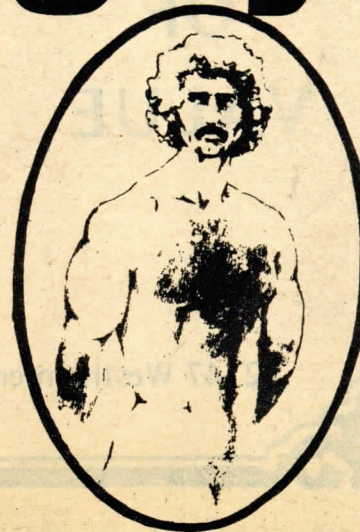
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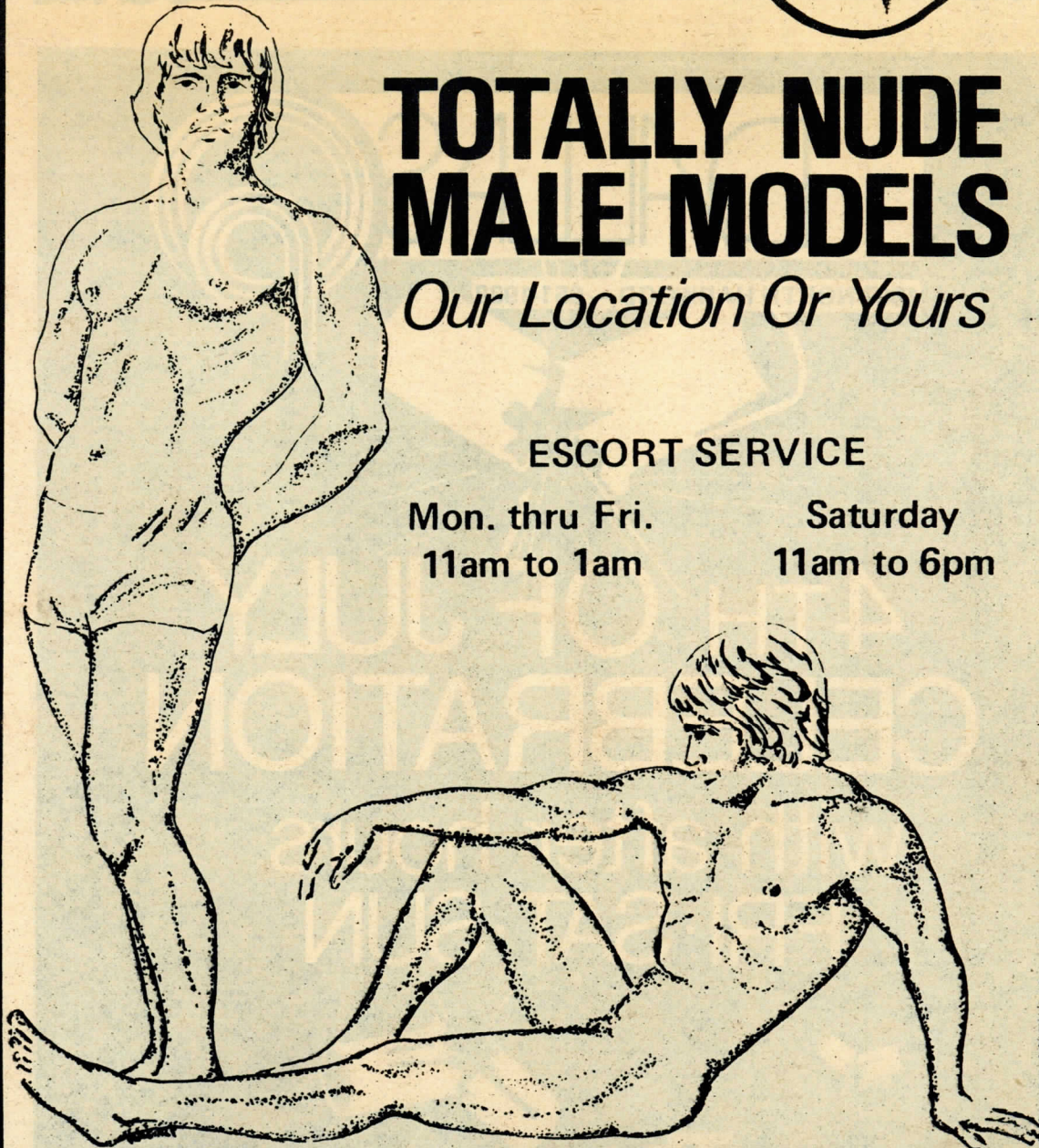
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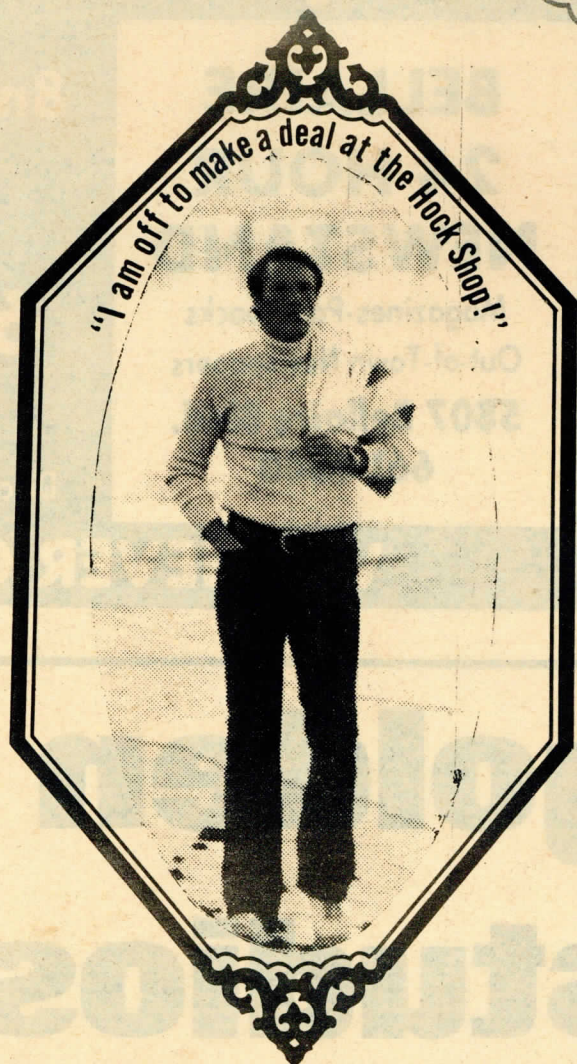


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Books

'Coming Out' is a relief

It is a pleasant relief at last to pick up a novel about gay people which does not indulge in the ancient practices so familiar to all of us — killing off a major protagonist, candy-coating the characters into flat stereotypes, or sheer pornography. We have

no objection to killing off major characters, when necessary, and stereotypes are sometimes valuable. As for pornography, we certainly wouldn't want to moralize against that.

"Coming Out" tells simply the story of a blossoming relationship between a recently divorced swinging man named Roger, old enough to have a daughter in college, and a young art student about the same age as said daughter. Michael, the youngest, is sometimes made to play the heavy, with his

tendencies to disregard the real world of earning a living and with his insane jealousy of Roger's ex-wife. However, the author does not hesitate to turn the tables and point to Roger's faults as readily.

Perhaps it may be less than realistic how quickly the lovers kiss and make up each time a new bone of contention pops up and is defeated. In real life, nobody fights like lovers. Nonetheless, the neat cross-section of gay life found in this book makes it a must for those interested in seeing the progress of books on our lifestyle.

Vets eligible for upgrading

Gay people who were discharged from the Armed Forces because of their homosexuality may qualify for an upgrade under President Carter's special discharge review program available to Vietnam-era veterans.

Acting Assistant Secretary of the Army Paul Phillips said in a letter to National Gay Task Force Co-Executive Director Dr. Bruce Voeller, "... individuals separated from the Armed Forces on the basis of their homosexuality may qualify for upgrading within the special discharge review program."

Phillips added, "It is not required that their discharge be characterized in a certain manner simply because of their homosexual function of many factors including the means by which their sexual preferences were expressed and/or revealed."

The Acting Assistant Secretary of the Army indicated the cases of gay service people would be reviewed and a change in status would be made "providing the circumstances of their service and separation meet the criteria of the program and do not constitute a bar for upgrading."

Dr. Voeller said, "This policy statement is a major breakthrough by the Armed Forces on matters concerning gays in the military. At the White House meeting between the N.G.T.F. and representatives of the President last March, we requested the immediate upgrading of all military discharges for homosexuality from World War II to the present. We feel that the present policy change is an important step in that direc-

tion."

The toll-free number for the special discharge review program is 1-800-325-4040. However, since it appears unlikely that Congress will extend veterans' benefits to persons whose discharge have been upgraded through this program, gay veterans may prefer to apply for upgrading through the regular discharge review system, which includes such benefits, although this process may take several months longer to complete.

The regular discharge review process is also available to pre-Vietnam-era veterans.

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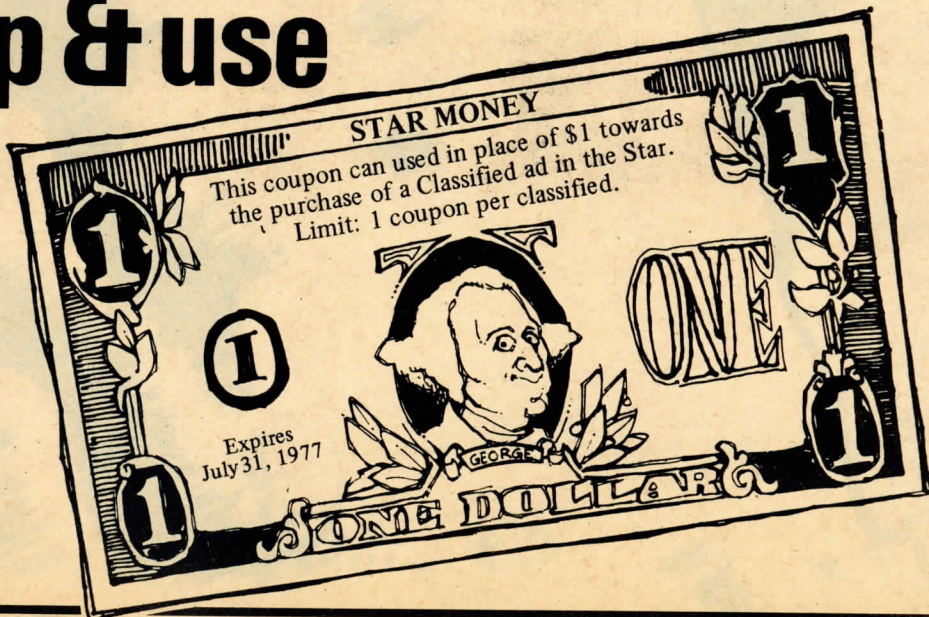

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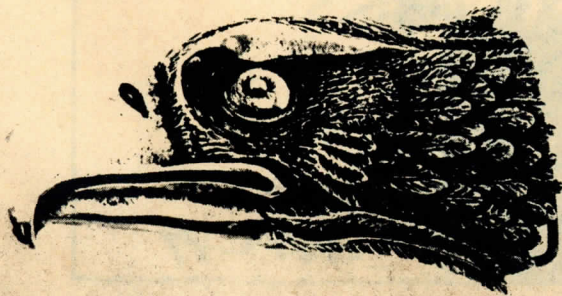
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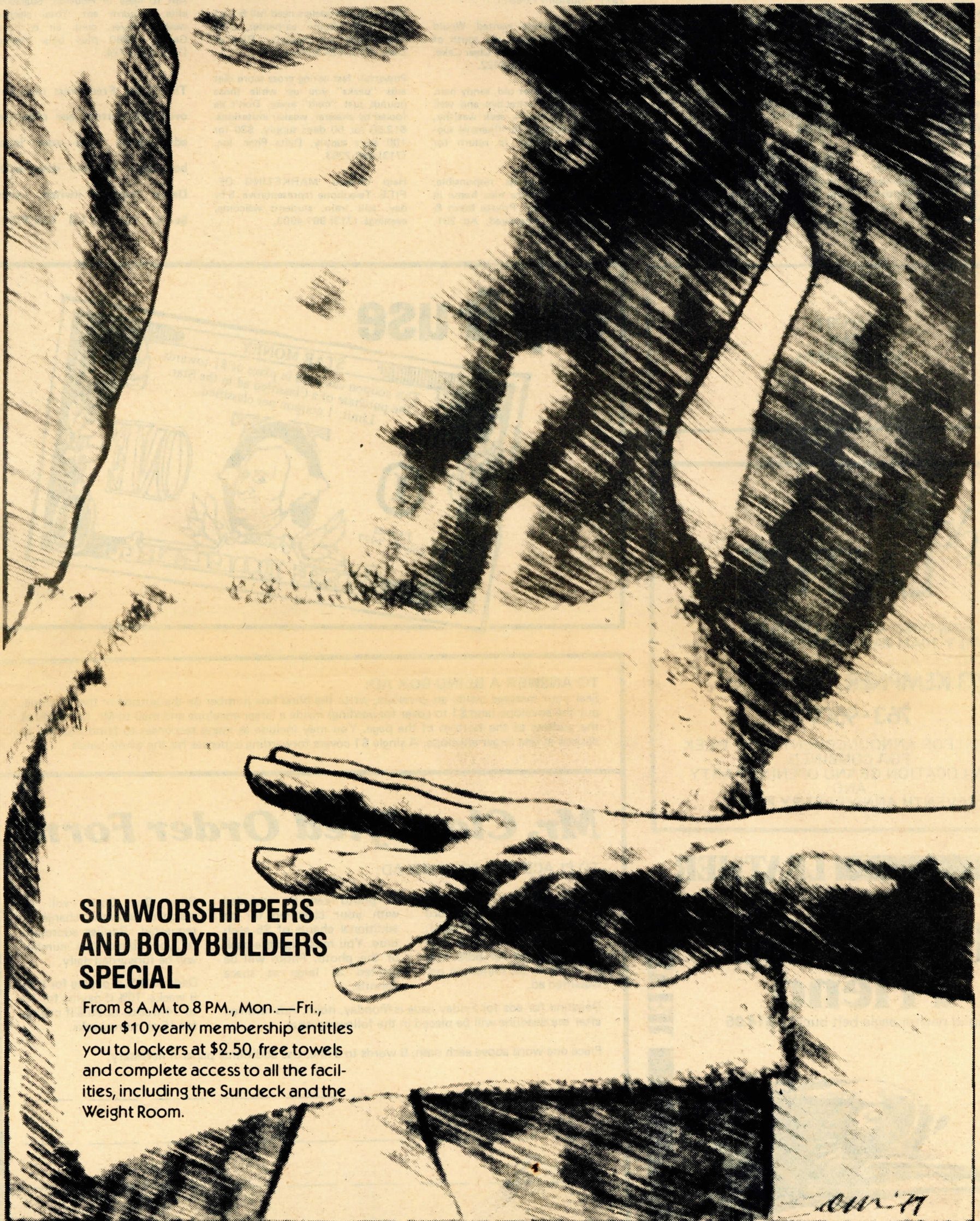
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
