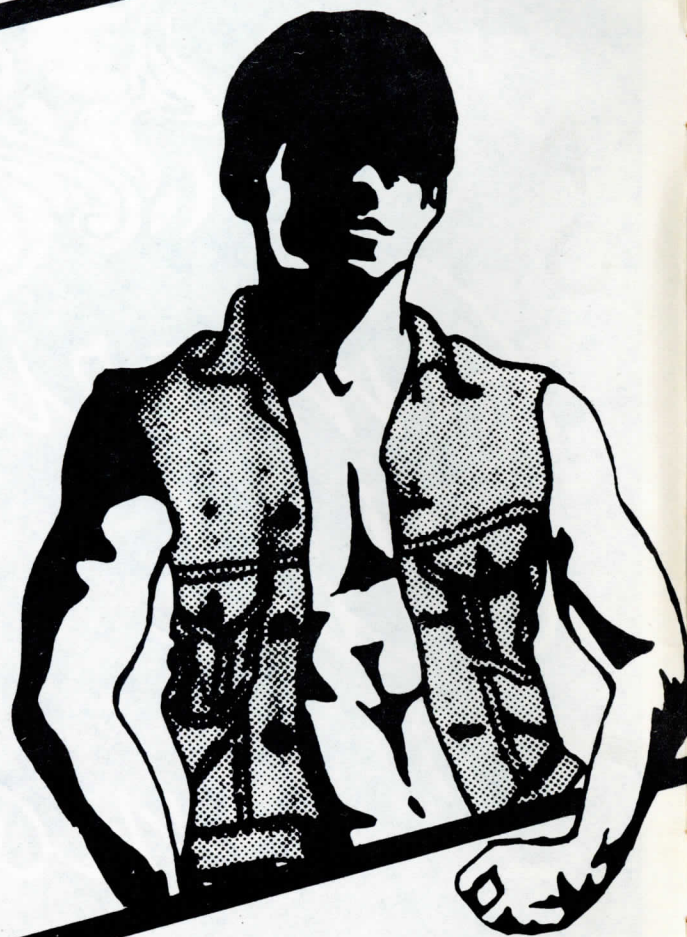


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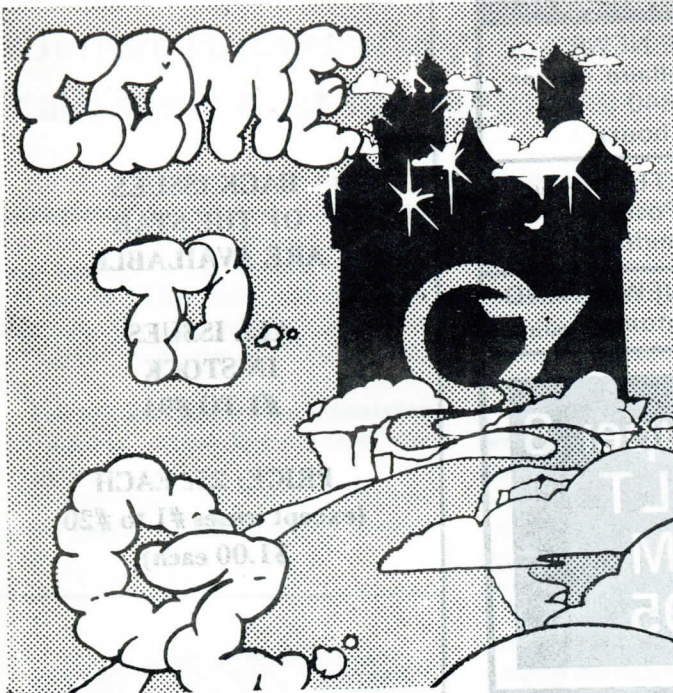
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Geneva Brooks angry, says she may sue talk show host for calling her "moron"

Houston anti-gay and anti-porn spokesperson Geneva Kirk Brooks says she has had three lawyers volunteer their services for her benefit in filing a suit against KTRH Radio talk show host Jim Bell. Brooks says Bell called her a "moron" over the air Tuesday, May 30.

Bell and his listeners were discussing the planned "Town Meeting One" gay convention.

Brooks and Rev. Albert Walling spoke before the Houston City Council

county commissioners and convinced them to pass a resolution condemning the event. The county criticized the Houston Sports Association (which leases the Astrodome from the county and frequently subleases it for conventions) for subleasing it for the gay gathering.

However, the H.S.A. promptly defended itself saying that the convention was a legitimate one and that it would honor its agreement. The county instructed its lawyers to see if they could force H.S.A. not to allow the gay convention.

County Judge Jon Lindsey and Commissioner Tom Bass (whose district includes the heavily-gay Montrose neighborhood) originally voted with the other commissioners for the anti-gay resolution but announced later that they had changed their minds after meeting with gay leaders. They said they would vote against the anti-gay resolution on its second reading.

This whole subject was brought up on Jim Bell's talk show May 30, where listeners phoned in their opinions. Brooks claims she heard Bell call her a moron and she also claims that she has received "30 or 40" threatening phone calls and letters because of her homophobic views.

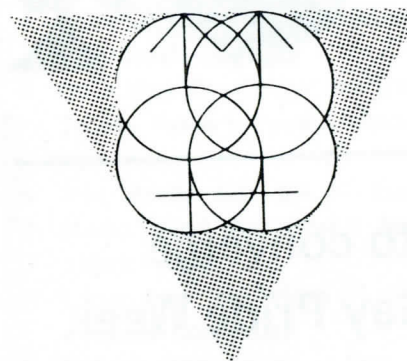

Dignity selects a new president

A California man, Paul Colin Weidig, has been elected president of Dignity, the national organization of gay Roman Catholics.

Weidig is a consulting geologist and civil engineer and has been an officer in the Sacramento chapter.

"On behalf of Roman Catholic gay persons, I intend to secure the endorsement of as many of the bishops and clergy as possible, with respect to both human rights and our Dignity statement of purpose which says that gay persons can express their sexuality in a way that is consonant with Christ's teaching. We believe that all sexuality should be exercised in an ethically and unselfish way," Weidig stated in a May 15 news release.

Weidig is an outspoken gay activist and has also spoken openly for women's rights.

He succeeds Carla Kaesbauer, acting

president since fall, 1977. Kaesbauer will continue as Dignity national secretary.

Dignity claims 8000 members and 76 chapters across the U.S.



Baptists and Bryant to converge on Atlanta prior to Gay Pride Week

Atlanta will be the scene this year of not only their local gay pride week celebrations but also a convention of Southern Baptists about the same time. Noted Southern Baptist Anita Bryant is scheduled to attend.

Christian Index, a Georgia-based Baptist publication, reported in its most recent issue that Bryant has been approached by an unnamed group

which wants to nominate her for first vice president of the thirteen-million-member denomination. Chrisitan Index went on to say, in an editorial opinion, that it does not believe Bryant has enough experience in Baptist life to qualify for such a position.

Atlanta's gay community has been organizing a protest for 7:00 p.m., June 11, at the World Congress Center, when Bryant is scheduled to appear.

Gay rights lose again

Half of the registered voters of Eugene, Ore. cast votes at the polls Tuesday, May 23, to repeal a gay rights ordinance.

The vote against the ordinance was 23,000 while 13,000 voted in favor of keeping it.

Eugene is the fourth city to recently repeal such an ordinance through a vote of the electorate. Miami, St. Paul and Wichita, Kansas suffered similar fates earlier.

However, the Eugene vote had the best pro-gay percentage of the four cities with 37% of the voters voting in favor of the anti-discrimination ordinance. In Wichita only 25% voted for the gay side, St. Paul saw only 33% voting pro-gay and in Miami 30% voted in favor of their ordinance.

Eugene, the state's second largest city, is a liberal college town, home of the University of Oregon, and that is what is thought to have accounted for the extra gay sympathy.

Larry Dean, head of the anti-gay Volunteer Organization Involved in Community Enactments, said, "If they couldn't win in Eugene, they can't win anywhere else, except maybe San Francisco."

"I suspect we'll see these gay rights laws falling one by one across the country," he added.

There are about forty cities in the U.S. with local gay rights laws enacted by their city councils or proclaimed by their mayors.

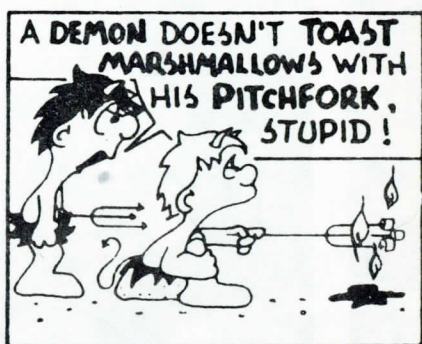
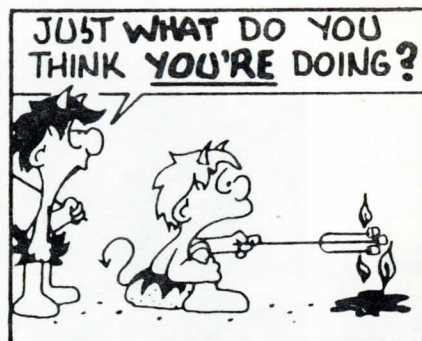
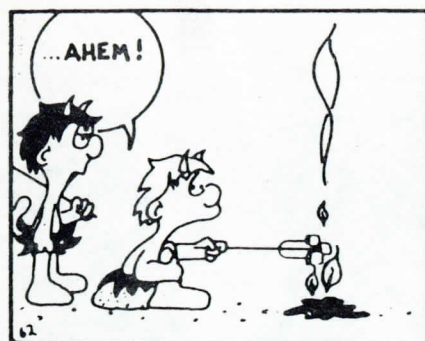
"Gay people are not going to go away and we don't want anything less than our rights," said Douglas Huneke, a member of the Eugene Citizens for Equal Rights.

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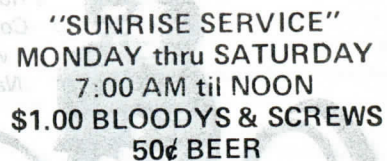
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
