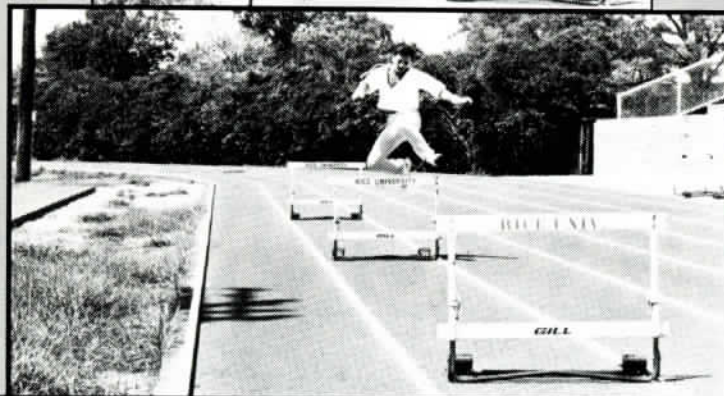

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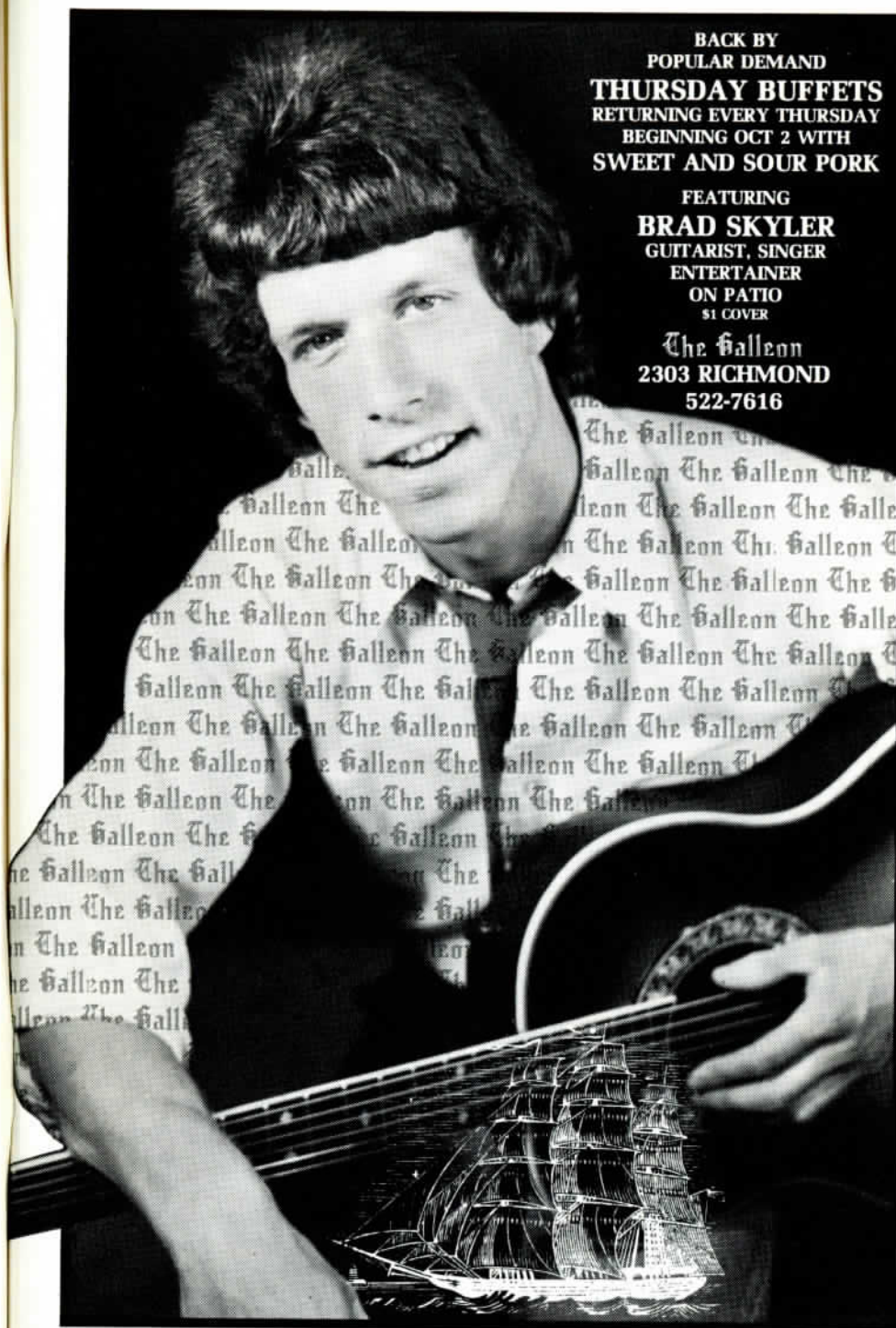

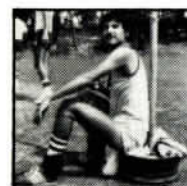

ALLEGED SEX OFFENDER FREE ON BOND

DALLAS — A man who was indicted in June of this year on charges of indecency involving a 9-year-old child has been released on \$5000 bond following his second arrest on those charges. Guadalupe Duarte, publisher of *Tejano*, a bilingual newspaper, was previously arrested earlier this year in connection with the indictment. He was released upon posting \$2500 bond following the first arrest. He failed to appear at his hearing last month, however, and was subsequently arrested again after he was pointed out by a prostitute at Bryan and Carroll Streets.

In a turn of events, Duarte, who lists an East Dallas address, appeared at a meeting of the Dallas City Council and urged the city officials to take action towards cleaning up the prostitution activities in the vicinity of the intersection where he was arrested. He told the council that prostitution had become so serious in the area that families were discouraged from going to neighborhood stores.

One of the ladies of the night who works at the Bryan-Carroll location stated, "He [Duarte] tried to make it sound like we are all slaves to pimps out here. But, believe me, none of us would be here if we didn't want to be."

A HOMECOMING MISS IS SOONER FORGOTTEN

TULSA, OK — Following the finalization of her divorce from Bob Green, Anita Bryant has left the Sunshine State of Florida to return to Oklahoma. She is expected to make her home in Tulsa, according to her mother, Lenore Cate, who also lives in Tulsa.

Bryant was granted her divorce from the former Miami disc jockey on the grounds that the marriage was "irre-

trievably broken." That break-up came, Bryant alleged, because Green, her personal manager and ally in the bitter campaign against gays and gay rights, cooperated "with certain hired staff members who conspired to control me and to use my name and reputation to build their personal careers." Bryant has additionally stated that her husband of 20 years had "violated my most precious asset—my very conscience."

According to her mother, Bryant is not actively dating. "Right now she's off men, and I don't blame her." **TWT NEWS** doesn't blame her either and might even go so far as to suggest she may find happiness in a less traditional love relationship.

EX-MR. BRYANT KEEPS BUSY WITH BIGOTRY

HOLLYWOOD, FL — With divorce proceedings all wrapped up, Bob Green is now free to pursue his mission to "lead America back to the moral path." That mission will be fulfilled through the work of the Crusade for Morality, formerly Anita Bryant Ministries.

Ex-wife Anita Bryant has retired to an Oklahoma exile while Green has announced that his ministry would soon publish a booklet entitled "Strength Through Suffering".

ANTI-GAY IMMIGRATION LAWS SLOWLY CHANGE

WASHINGTON, DC — The U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service official policy of barring "suspected homosexuals" from entering the United States has long been an object of criticism. Such criticism came not only from within this country but from abroad as well. Recently, INS policy led to charges of American violation of the Helsinki Accords and to "the first effort of the international community to ad-



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dress the question of equal rights for homosexuals."

This is one conclusion reached by Larry Bush in his article "Borderline Homophobia," which appeared in the June 9 and June 23 issues of *Inquiry* magazine. Bush's report on the question is one of the most comprehensive to appear in the straight press to date, notes **TWT NEWS**.

Policy at the time the articles appeared, according to Bush, placed the burden of proof "entirely on those seeking to enter the United States, and failure to convince the border patrol that one was not homosexual could mean not only denial of entry, but a stamp in one's passport labeling the individual as 'sexual deviant' and permanent blacklisting from ever entering the country." Bush illustrated his claim with several cases of denial of entry, including one incident at Port Huron, Michigan, in which 55 women attempting to attend a women's music festival were turned away on suspicion that

they were lesbians.

Contrary to INS claims that incidents of exclusion on grounds of homosexuality are rare, Bush's research revealed that records of persons who "voluntarily" withdraw applications for entry after being subjected to harassment are systematically eliminated. A top Washington INS official privately admitted to Bush that the total number of exclusions of "suspected homosexuals" would run into the thousands each year.

Bush pointed out international ramifications of the policy the United States had so staunchly retained in its immigration laws. "The Dutch foreign ministry has now formally announced that U.S. policy is 'incompatible with human rights'; initiatives for similar announcements 'are underway in Sweden, and observers expect that Denmark, Norway, West Germany, and possibly France may join in the protest.'"

Because of the volatile controversy surrounding the United States' posi-

tion, there have been moves in Congress to modify the law, some of which have met with moderate success. Likewise, the Department of Justice has liberalized INS policies and restrictions, most notably in a recent decision to deny admission only to those who personally avow that they are gay. That decision will eliminate the possibility of admission being denied to a visitor on the basis of an arbitrary decision by immigration officials at the point of entry. Additionally, once inside the United States, aliens and visitors will not be harassed or questioned by the government in matters concerning their sexual preferences.

The Justice Department is unable to more liberally relax its policies due to provisions of the 1952 McCarran-Walter Act which establish a legal obligation to exclude homosexuals from entering the United States. The Justice Department did emphasize its support of congressional legislation to rescind the McCarran-Walter Act altogether.

The changes in policy by the Justice Department, an agency of the Executive Branch of government, were made possible when the Public Health Service announced that homosexuality would no longer be certified as a mental disease or defect. The Public Health Service is a part of the Department of Health & Human Services which, like the Department of Justice, is also an agency of the Executive Branch.

TWT NEWS welcomes this gradual trend towards gay-supportive positions by Executive Departments as it is the necessary and preliminary groundwork for eventual gay rights legislation.

MAGNOLIA, TX — The Sixth Annual Texas Renaissance Festival begins this weekend near Magnolia, Texas and as always promises to be festive and royally gay.

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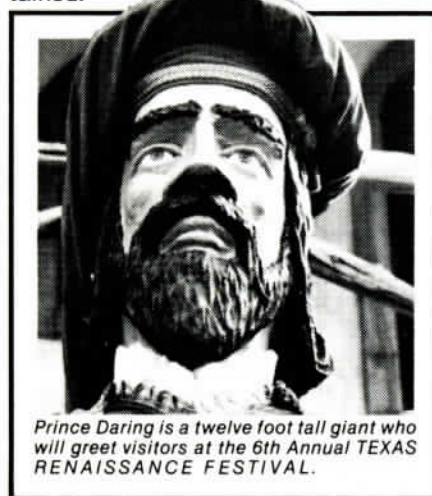


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Prince Daring is a twelve foot tall giant who will greet visitors at the 6th Annual TEXAS RENAISSANCE FESTIVAL.

The festival continues every weekend from the last weekend in September, through every weekend in October and closes November 2.

Festival games, outdoor activities and olde English food from the 1500's earmark the huge outdoor festival, just north of Houston near Magnolia, Texas.

GPC DALLAS ENDORSEMENTS

DALLAS — Multi-time loser John Wiley Price has won the endorsement of the Dallas Gay Political Caucus, pending outcome of his lawsuit contesting the election of Precinct 8 Constable Jesse Dawson.

Price, who lost the June 7 primary runoff to Dawson by 10 votes, also lost two civil court challenges of the election. His lawsuit is pending with the Texas Court of Civil Appeals.

Dallas Gay Political Caucus members endorsed Price in a meeting in which they rejected the endorsement of Libertarian Party candidates because the 3rd party nominees are "not viable" as winners in the

November general election.

The caucus voted its endorsements based on questionnaires mailed to all candidates on the November ballot and based on personal appearances by about 20 candidates or their representatives Monday night.

Caucus members declined to endorse a presidential candidate after appearances by representatives of President Carter and Libertarian nominee Ed Clark, Republican nominee Ronald Reagan and independent candidate John Anderson declined to send representatives.

TWT NEWS notes that the Houston GPC also declined to endorse a presidential candidate.

Candidates for U.S. House of Representatives seats in the 5th and 24th districts received no endorsements, but Republican candidate Tom Pauken and incumbent Democrat Clay Smothers received "warnings" on the caucus's endorsement sheet for their public opposition to homosexual rights legislation.

Democrat Earl S. Porter won endorsement in the 5th district congressional race over incumbent Republican Jim Collins and Libertarian Steve Briggs, who appeared at Monday night's caucus meeting.

Caucus endorsements in state races included Railroad Commission candidate Buddy Temple, incumbent state senator, Ron Clower, District 8 senate candidate James L. McNees and District 16 senate candidate Ron Kessler.

State representative candidates endorsements included unopposed incumbent Sam Hudson, District 33C; Democrat Mary G. Nichols, District 33D; Democrat David Cain, District 33K; Democrat Christopher Craig, District 33P, and Republican Lee Jackson, District 33Q.

In state judicial races, Democrat Joe B. Humphreys won the endorsement for Place 4 on the 5th District Court of Civil Appeals. The caucus declined to endorse a candidate for the state supreme court. ➤

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In Dallas County races, the caucus voted no endorsement of sheriff's candidates despite a personal appearance Monday night by Democrat Al Mattox.

Thelma Tyson spoke to the caucus on behalf of her husband, County Commissioner Jim Tyson, who won endorsement Monday night.

Endorsements in Dallas County judicial races included Democrat B. F. (Bill) Coker, 95th civil district court; incumbent Democrat Joan T. Winn, 191st civil district court; Democrat Alan Kazdoy, 302nd family district court; and Democrat Paul Wisdom, 330th family district court.

In the three new county criminal courts, Democrats Rick Danna, Tom Sands, and Michael Byck were endorsed for the 8th, 9th, and 10th courts, respectively.

Endorsements in other county judicial races included Democrat Joe B. Brown, county court at law No. 2; Democrat Robert C. McGuire, Probate Court No. 1; and Democrat Mary A. Strickland, Precinct 1 justice of the peace.

Incumbent county tax assessor John Childs was endorsed for re-election despite caucus president Don Baker's mistaken request for a vote on "all in favor of the motion to endorse Eddie Chiles."

GPC HOUSTON ENDORSEMENTS

HOUSTON — After almost three weeks of intensive screening on behalf of the Gay Political Caucus's Political Action Committee, the Caucus met September 17, 1980 and voted to endorse the recommendations of the Committee. It should be noted that before this endorsement was given the Caucus was aware of the fact that letters of invitation were sent to every candidate who had a contested race coming up in the general election in November.

The response was good from those individuals, Republican, Democrat and Libertarian who sought GPC public en-

dorsement. The Caucus wishes to thank those candidates who screened, the members of the Screening Committee, those individuals who lent support to insure that the best recommendations could be given to the gay community.

The following endorsements were released to TWT NEWS by Kent Speer, GPC Liaison. Note that there is no endorsement for president. The Dallas GPC also did not endorse either Carter, Reagan or Anderson.

For U.S. House of Representatives, District 18, Democrat Mickey Leland. In the Texas Senate, District 15, Democrat Jack Ogg.

For Texas House of Representatives, Democrat Debra Danburg, District 79; Democrat Paul Colbert, District 80; and Democrat Al Luna, District 87.

District court endorsements are as follows: Democrat Alice Bonner, 80th District Court; Democrat John Ray Harrison, 113th District Court; Democrat Bill Powell, 125th District Court; Democrat Ken Harrison, 151st District Court; Democrat Richard Millard, 152nd District Court; Democrat R. L. "Bob" Smith, 165th District Court; Democrat Bill Hatten, 176th District Court; and Democrat Miron Love, 177th District Court.

Endorsement for the 309th Family District Court went to Democrat Robert Hinojosa, and to Republican Robert Baum for the 314th Family District Court.

Democrats Ed Landry, Jim Muldrow, and Republican Pat Lykos took the endorsements for County Criminal Courts-at-Law 2, 6, and 10 respectively.

In the District Attorney race, endorsement went to Democrat Fred Dailey.

For County Sheriff, GPC endorsed Republican Marvin Lake; and for County Attorney, Democrat Mike Driscoll.

Endorsed for Justice of the Peace, Democrat Kenneth Pacetti, Precinct 1; and in Precinct 7, Place 1, Democrat Cecil Bush. Democrat Walter Rankin was endorsed for Constable, Precinct 1. ▼

False Arrest in Dallas Mall T-Room

Dear TWT:

I recently underwent a dehumanizing experience that I want to share with TWT readers in the hope of informing them that apparently no gay man, despite how carefully he behaves publicly, is safe from being victimized by the *overgrown bullies* who comprise Texas Police departments. I thought I had learned to adjust to the city of Dallas, where I moved 7 months ago, to find a regressive social environment, and a gay community constantly frightened of police hassles, the regularity of which was unfamiliar to me. I had only heard all the

horror stories, but now I have one of my own to tell.

I was recently shopping in a well-known North Dallas mall on a weekday afternoon, when I stepped into the mall men's room to urinate. I noticed that the bathroom was filled with several characters standing around staring. I finished at the urinal and left the rest room. Immediately upon walking outside the door, a group of men stopped me, threw handcuffs on me, and marched me off with two other men. The three of us had been charged with "Disorderly Conduct—Public Display." To be more specific, we were being accused of masturbating in public. The men's room had been filled with plain-clothes policemen, and I realized what the stares had been all about. We were driven down to the city jail, undergoing verbal harassment all the while ("I wish we could beat the shit out of them". . . "We got everyone on hidden cameras". . . "How many times do you jack off a day?")

The absolute absurdity of this whole situation overwhelmed me. I paid my bond and my record now states that I was arrested for "Disorderly Conduct"—because I went to the bathroom! My gay friends, you cannot be too careful. Remember: if it hasn't yet happened to you, there's a good chance that it can.

Montrose Animosity

Dear TWT:

I really am not sure how to put this down on paper, but I feel a very strong need to let someone know.

Last night, Sunday, 9 September at 11:30pm, a friend and I were walking home from the Different Drum; a van pulled up beside us and the passenger asked what time it was, and I said 11:30; the driver then said "Which one of you is a queer?" I responded by saying to just drive on, we aren't bothering anyone! "I am going to shoot one of you", the driver said—by this time we had come to my street, we turned the corner and so did they. We then ran back onto Westheimer. We saw that they

were not backing up, so we hurried onto my house, a half a block away. I was very scared, saw my whole life flash before my eyes. I was so freaked out I felt I was having a heart attack—I did not sleep any last night and had to take off work today because I was so tired and just a nervous wreck!

The van was a custom van, dark blue with either white or light blue sort of lacy designs on the side. Did not get license number—but a good look at the occupants. Both were Mexican—the driver was kind of a big guy, clean shaven, 28-34 years old, and bushy hair...

While living in Montrose for six years, several things have happened—I was robbed twice (once at gunpoint, and once by knife), been chased, hit by a car while riding my ten-speed, had rocks and bottles thrown at me. Even knew a guy who was found strangled by a coat hanger. Last night's incident was the last straw.

If we want Montrose to be a safe place to live, we are going to have to take our own immediate action, or be picked off like flies. I know it is illegal to carry a gun, but my life *does* mean a little to me. If confronted again by such an assault—I

will shoot first and answer questions later!

Everyone, please be careful and alert—it could save your life. I feel very fortunate.

Gay Parent's Rights

Dear TWT:

I am writing this as a very concerned gay parent, for the gay parent's rights; we have none.

My lover and I raised my son for 12 years. In May, we had a little misunderstanding (my son and I), and he decided he'd rather live with his aunt than me. The judge and sheriff in Leaky, Texas wouldn't let me see my son or talk to him. They had no court order or any legal ways to keep me from him, but they did. They told me a homosexual had no business with a child, as he would turn into a homosexual through association or molestation. As if I'd allow anyone to

molest my son! Mr. Bernardo Garcia of the Texas Human Resources Department wanted me to give custody to any of my relatives of age 18 or older. So I couldn't return him to my environment, being gay.

I called several Resource offices and asked for advice on this situation, and they told me they couldn't keep my son from me as I had legal custody. But after I told them that I'd forgotten one thing, that I was gay, they became flustered and wouldn't give me any advice, made excuses and hung up.

ACLU is always saying they are for human and gay rights, but I tried for months to talk to someone from San Antonio, but could never get an answer or help. Gays don't have any rights.

I tried to find a lawyer to help me, but they wanted thousands of dollars to do 20 minutes work. I don't have thousands of dollars to pay for legal fees.

So, to sum it all up, gays can't get help anywhere, unless they have lots of money. Name Withheld

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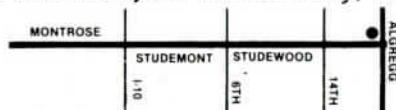

A self-described "born-again Butch" Jewish dyke from Canada who was once arrested in NYC for female impersonation—who is a comic tickling our funny bones while raising our consciousness.

Robin Tyler is known to many of us as one of the emcees at the March on Washington. Since her rise to popularity on college campuses, in nightclubs, theatres, and gay bars, many have described Tyler as the long-awaited successor to Lenny Bruce. Her style isn't anything like his, but as Tyler puts it: "I go completely against the system."

Can sexism, racism, organized religion and homophobia be funny? When Robin Tyler takes a jab at them they sure are. She makes gay humor a political weapon while she makes us laugh at our pain.

Some of her witty observations include:

"Anita Bryant is to Christianity what paint by numbers is to art."

"A dyke is a Doctor of YoungKarate Experts."

On Jerry Brown's support of gay rights: "Jerry Brown—now he's 'suspect'. He just dresses too well to be straight."

Robin Tyler goes beyond "camp" to recreate our lives, getting gay people stirred up to action and to "show straight people what we're really about." Some of Tyler's best material has been recorded live on her album

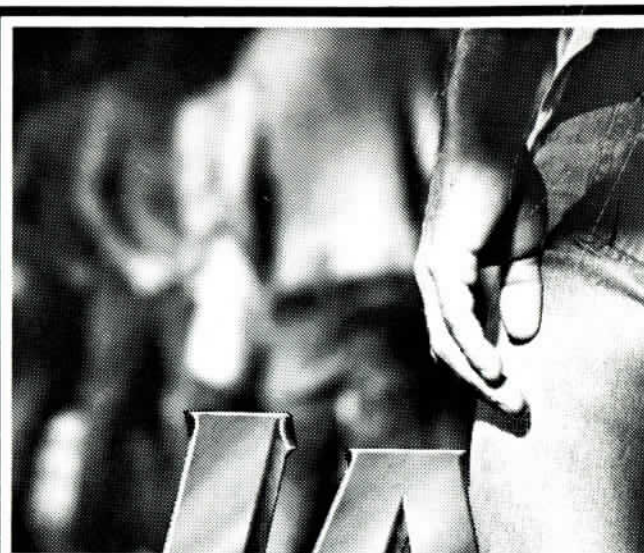

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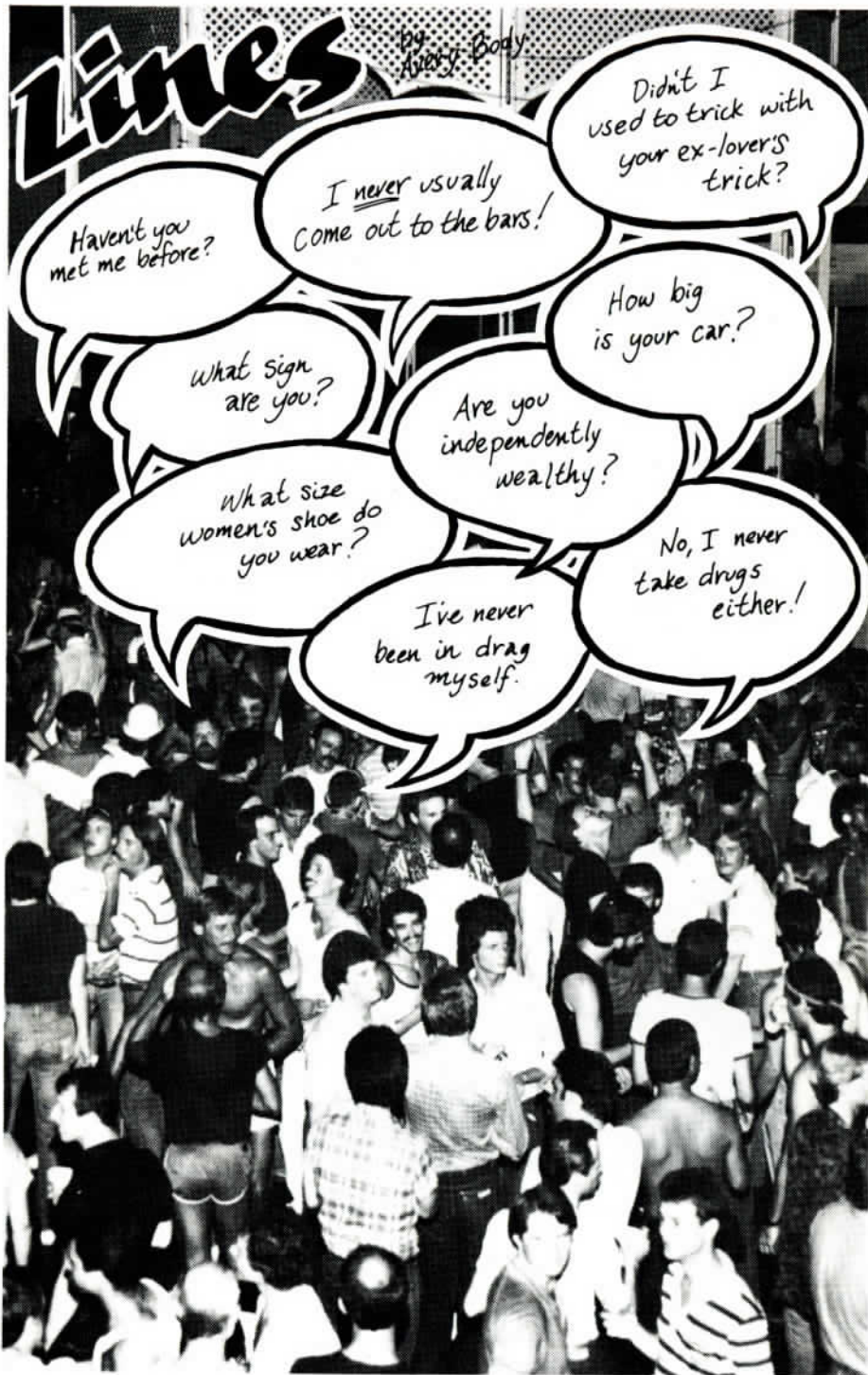

TRESS

Photographs by Arthur Tress with an Introduction by Yves Navarre
(St. Martin's Press)

Gut-level reaction to this volume of photography was so spontaneous and immediate that the usual period of delay between reading and review was im- ➤

possible. What is felt, inspired by the overwhelming strength of this collection's impact, compels expression and demands release.

You have likely seen published elsewhere one or more of the 65 photographs contained herein. If you did, you were touched in some way by its imagery: possibly, you were intrigued by its visual image and disturbed by its mental one; or, perhaps, offended by one and excited by the other. What is certain is the duplicity of your response—the conflict of emotion paired with an incompatible aesthetic. This one-two punch is the nature of Arthur Tress's photographic artistry. It distinguishes him from photographers who are merely technically expert and artistically inspired. It elevates Tress to an acknowledged genius.

A resident of New York City, Tress is somewhat obsessed with urban experience. In the introduction to the portfolio, Yves Navarre says that, "Tress's photos are forceful, flagrant, and *in flagrante delicto* because they are not to be read as exploits or as a spectacle, but as statements, the grip and mark of someone who won't return to somewhere else, and who gets lost inside, inside the city, inside this city."

Tress uses the metropolis, manipulates the urban microcosm, and, by the magic of some visual alchemy of his own secret formulation, the city becomes a sprawling array of backdrops and sets. He somehow turns the ugly to the sublime and the ordinary to the surreal. He is uncanny in his mastery of scenic illusion.

But this, this superlative sense of space and light, this is not the greatest of Tress's skills. Suspended in those unearthly environments are the subjects of his artistic focus. These are pictures of men. More specifically, pictures of men as sexual beings.

Do not presume Tress to be interested in erotica. Nothing could be more distantly removed from the truth. The artist is directly concerned with the fantastic. He appeals to the imagination rather than the libido; he seeks to ex-

cite rather than to arouse.

"What my photographs are about," he says, "and what I think homosexuality is for me and for male sexuality in general, is power—power relationships and power exploitation in both negative and positive ways."

His explanation of his artistic bent is precise but is somewhat subdued and understated. It doesn't adequately prepare one for his disturbing presentations of power nor for the gripping experience of viewing his work.

Tress ranges from the stark, ghastly surrealism of an apocalyptic survivor enduring the weighty burden of the debris of devastation (see photo) to the ridiculously pornographic of men engaged in psychodramatic sex-acts involving gigantic pasteboard illustrations of power tools. He moves from extreme to extreme with the agility of a madman's leaps from paranoid passivity to hallucinogenic hilarity.

Among still-image visual art forms, photography is unique. It does not depend on the artist's ability to make the art come to life so much as on his ability to make life stop to become an art. It's not easy to do, capturing a sense of energy, momentum, and vitality in only a millisecond's exposure. Tress amazes the mind's eye with photographs so spirited that, even more than they explicitly depict the moment of their occurrence, they implicitly suggest both the moment before and the one following. When holding a Tress photograph before the eyes, one cannot help but engage in speculation as to the reasons leading to the situation pictured and the consequences following from it.

You know what they say one picture is worth. Tress proves it. No string of adjectives, superlatives, and explicatives could match the subliminal and cerebral stimulation of these photographs in which male sexuality is depicted in its most unexpected but irresistible variations. The words would fail due to the limitations of syntax and semantics; the pictures succeed due to the limitlessness of their sensuality and sensitivity. ▼

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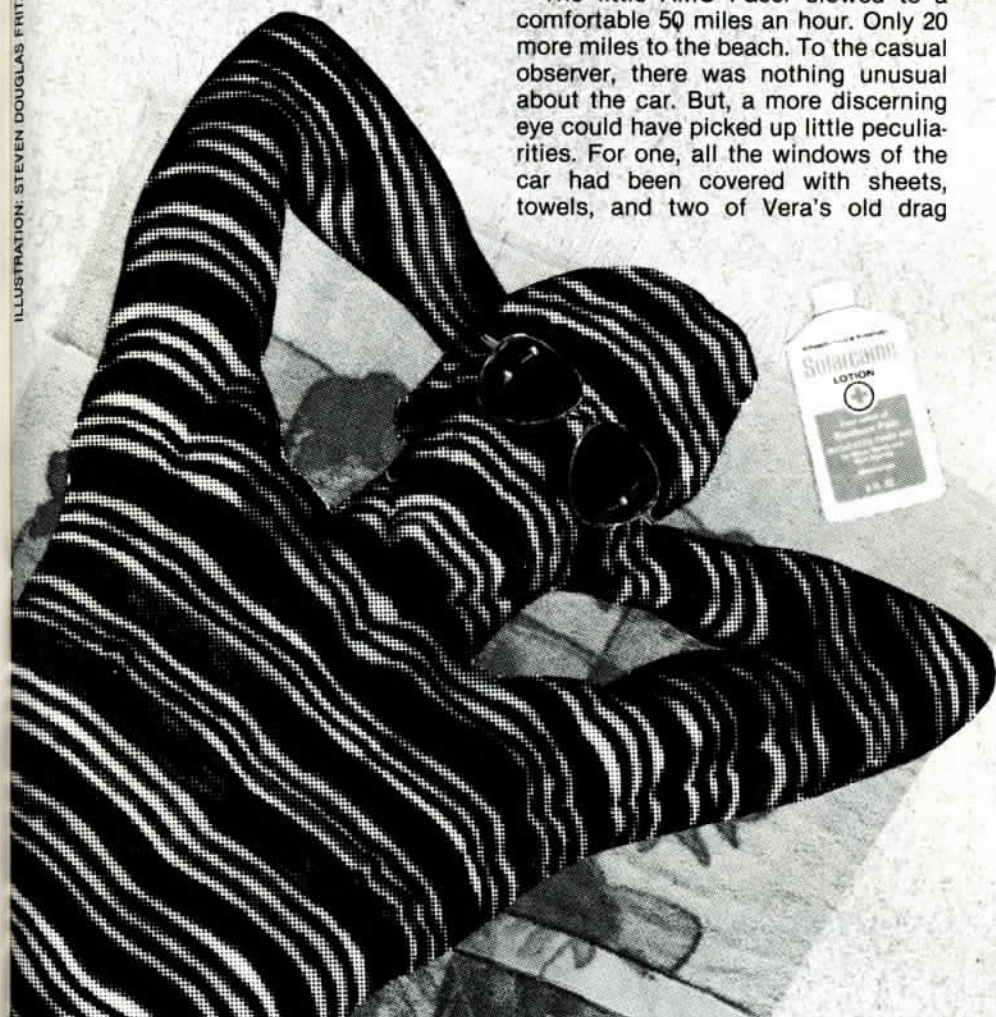

"No."

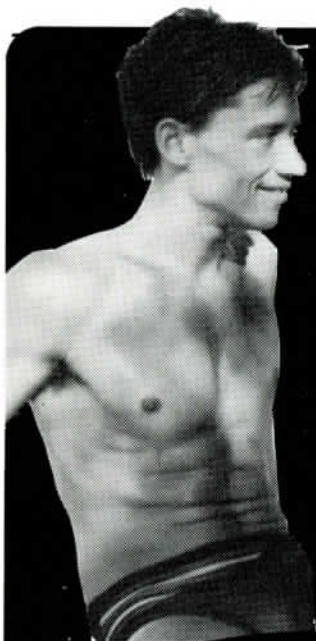
"Then what makes you think we're in for a rough day?"

In the "promo packet" enclosed with Sylvester's new album, *Sell My Soul* from Fantasy Records, there was an invitation to do an interview with the singer from his home in San Francisco. After calling his press agent to confirm the interview, a date and time were set: 3:15pm, Wednesday.

Wednesday arrived, and I rushed to the office at 2:30 to set up the phone tape recorder adapter, test for sound, etc., right? Wrong! The tape recorder was gone. Not only that, there was a note on my desk which read "Sylvester called at 2:15. Where the hell were you?" Well, I was at my apartment waiting for 3:15. Sylvester had also left his phone number for me to return his call.

I quickly called our Managing Editor, Blase DiStefano, to find out where the damned recorder was, and while I was talking to him, the receptionist's voice came over the speaker telling me that I had a long distance call on line one. I put Blase on hold and picked up line one ... "Hello, Rob? This is Sylvester" ... Crack! There I was with no recorder and no act.

After missing his first call, I couldn't just say, "I'm sorry, Sylvester, but I have no act," so I did the only logical thing to do—fake it and take notes. So, here are the highlights of our conversation via my notes. Blase is still on hold.

When asked whether he wanted his public image to be straight or gay, Sylvester said, "I really don't give a shit. They're going to think what they want to anyway."

Sylvester has lived in San Francisco for 13 years. He says it took him about two years to get the "partying" out of his system because the boys there "just give it away." He now lives with his lover of nine months. (This is not the same lover to whom he dedicates a song on his live album.)

Saturday, September 13, was Sylvester's birthday. For the occasion, he gave a party at Dreamland for "three thousand of my closest friends." At 1:30am, he cut his eight-foot birthday cake out of which came his former back-up vocalists, the Two Tons o' Fun, who sang "Happy Birthday" to him. Sylvester stayed until five in the morning, dancing and partying with his many friends. When I asked him how old he was, he said, "I'm timeless."



On his relationship with Martha Wash and Izora Rhodes (the Two Tons), he said that they rarely see each other anymore because "they have their own lives, and I have mine, but we are still very good friends".

Sylvester is very down to earth and easy to talk to. When he came to Houston a couple of years ago to give a concert at Numbers, he made the comment, "It's so good to be with sisters." He also went to the drag show at a local bar here. In reference to performing here again, he said, "I would love to come to Houston again and do a show at a decent place."

In 1979, when Sylvester performed at the Opera House in San Francisco, Mayor Feinstein declared March 11 as "Sylvester Day." His next concert in San Francisco will be this November 12 at the new Symphony Hall. The show will be the very first in the new auditorium, and he will incorporate a full orchestra, the San Francisco Marching Band, fan dancers, and 7000 of his closest friends.



About this far into the conversation, I heard him suddenly screech, "Mother, I can't *believe* you did that!" In the background was a woman's voice explaining that she didn't know what "it" was. He explained in a somewhat panic-stricken voice that, "My mother is visiting me, and she just turned on my house alarm, so I'm afraid I have to let you go so that I can call the police." That ended my interview with Sylvester. He was fabulous.

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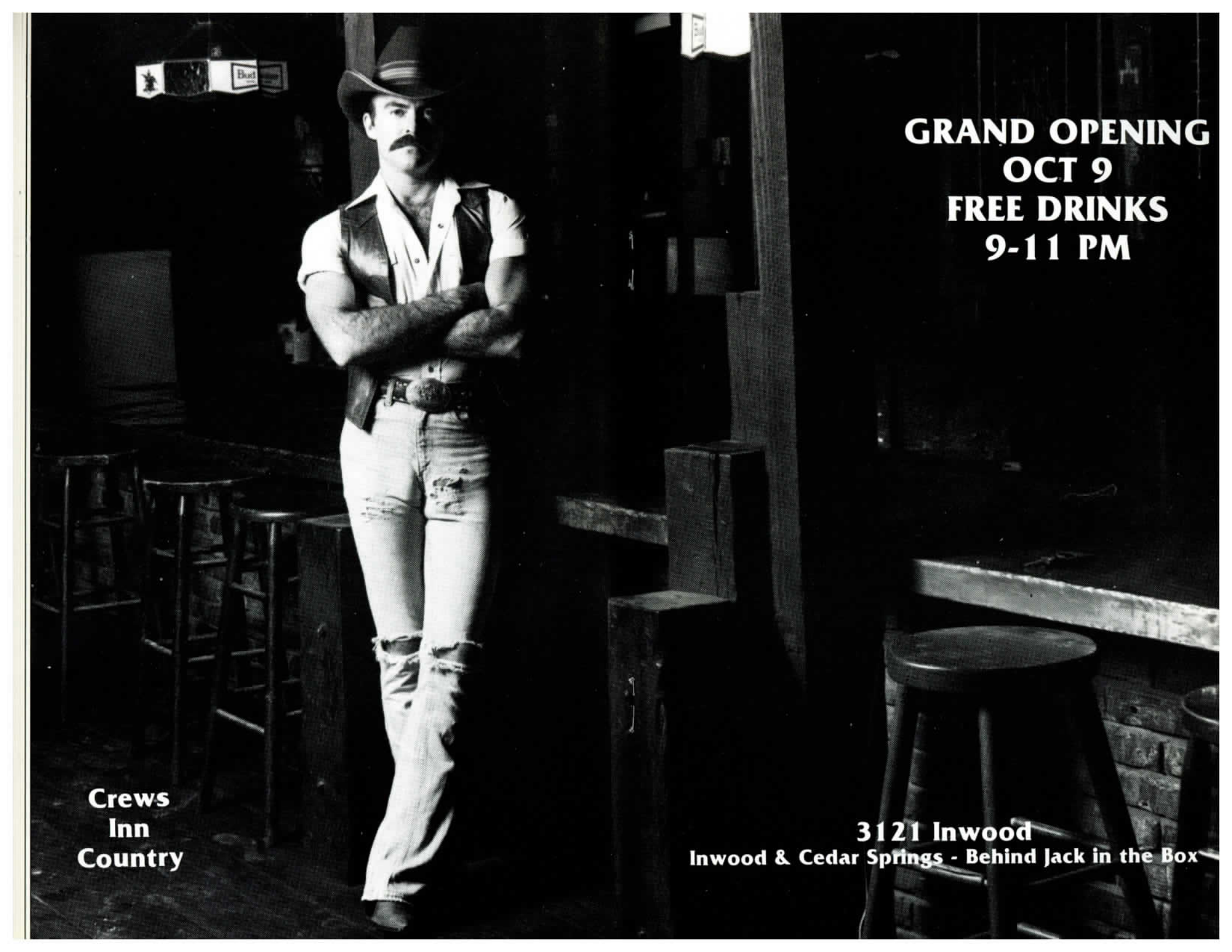
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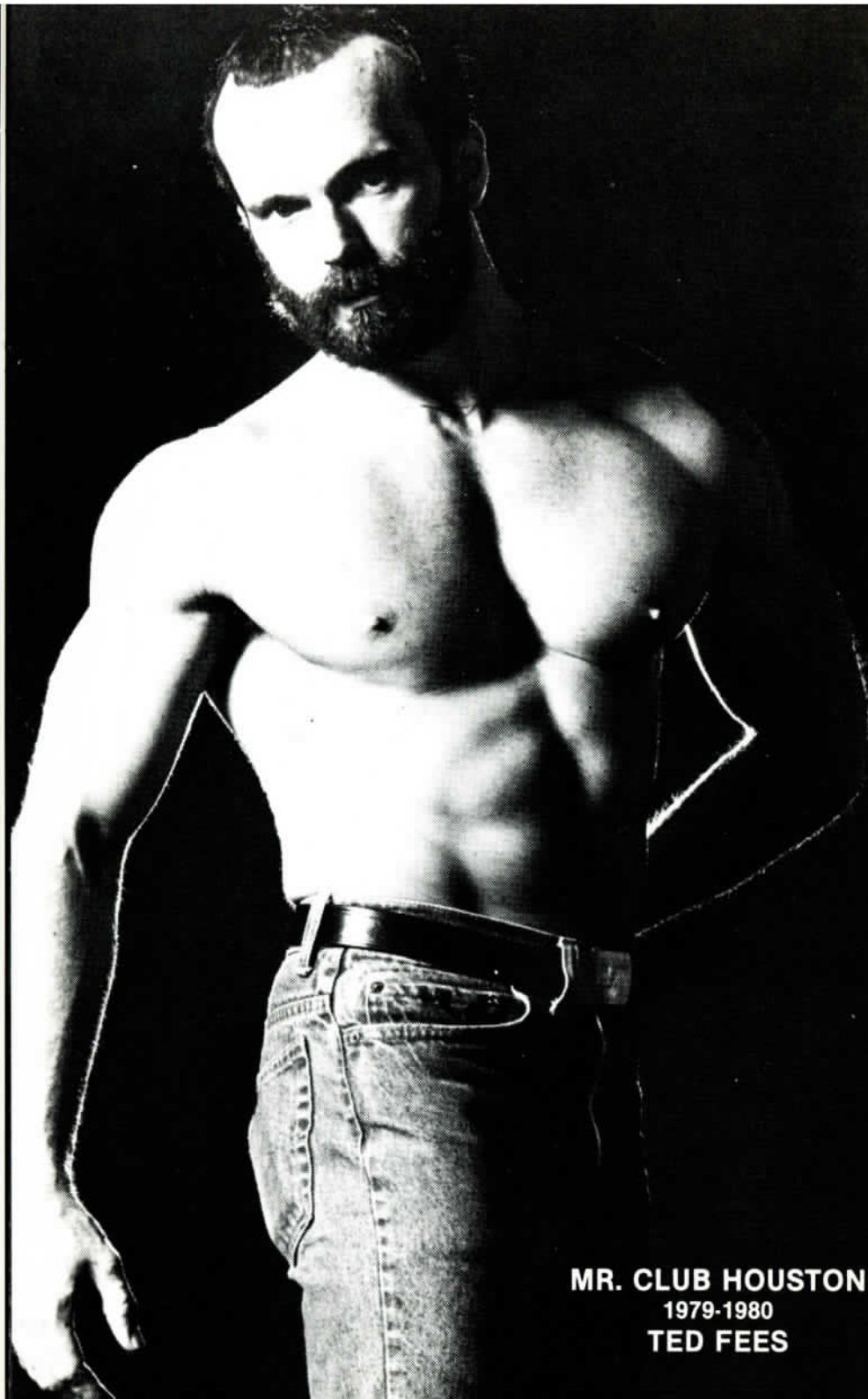

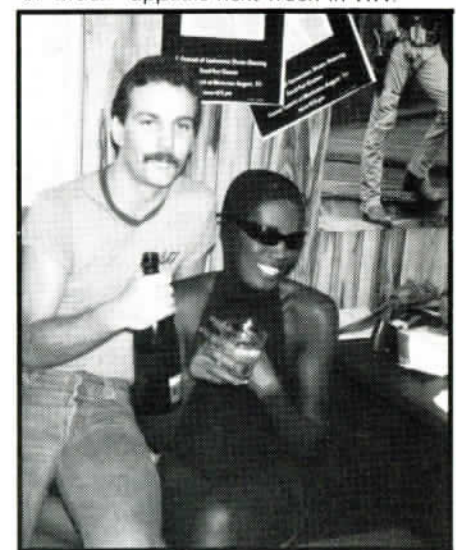

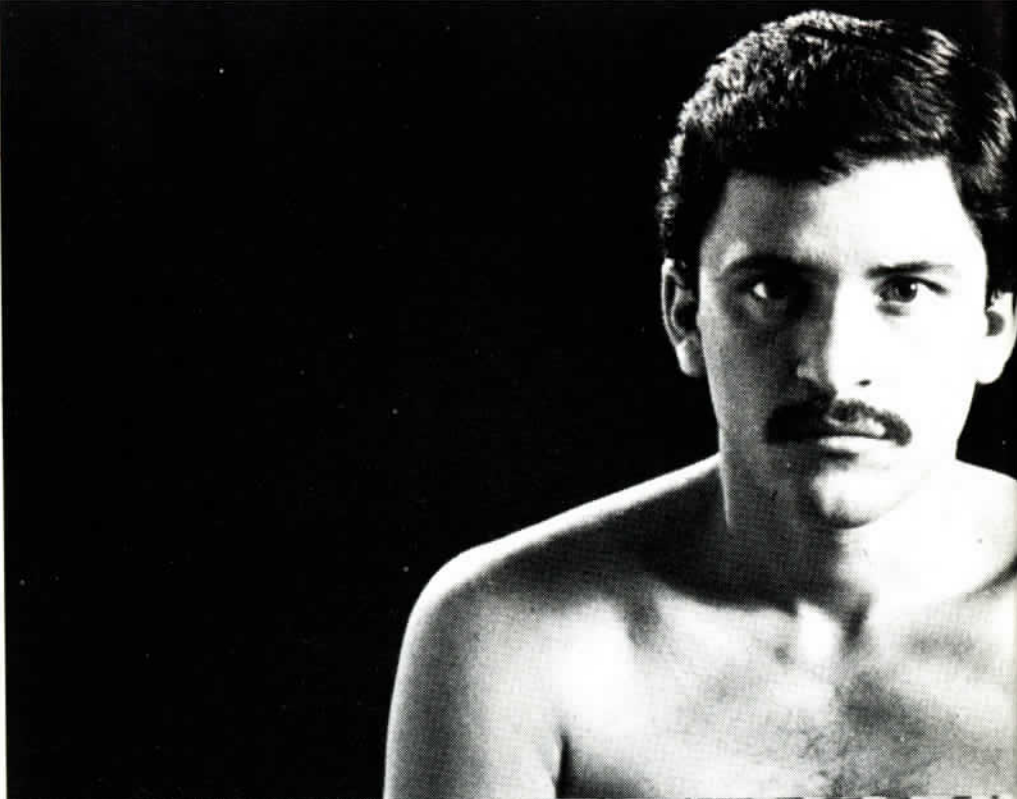

Gay Inmates

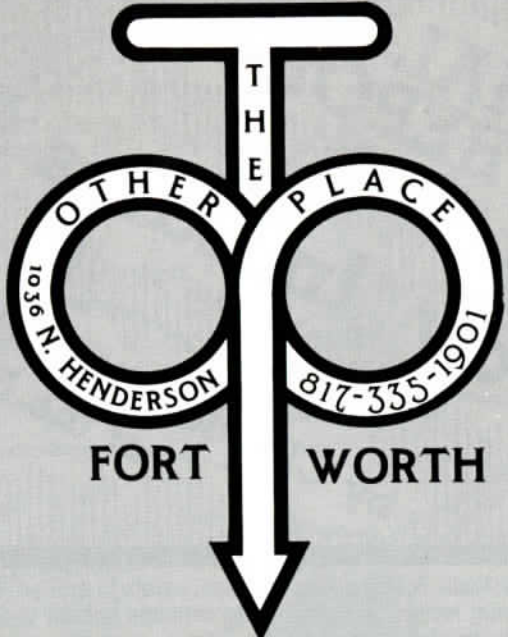
The National Gay Task Force office receives three to four letters a week from gay inmates who explain that they have been raped, harassed, and physically and verbally abused by other inmates because they are gay. The majority of these gay prisoners are afraid to report abuse from other inmates and prison guards because reporting anything to prison authorities is regarded as "snitching," an unpardonable offense in the eyes of inmates. Threats of violence, as they become an everyday occurrence, only worsen the situation.

NGTF recently received a letter from an inmate in Waupun, Wisconsin. He wrote in his letter that "T.B. as well as other diseases are running rampant throughout the institution, with three visits weekly for sick calls. If you are sick on a day when there is no sick call, you are told to suffer. This prison is made worse by doubling up 2 to 4 men in a two-man cell. I remain in voluntary segregation status here for my own protection from the general population. I am denied numerous rights, most important of which is my right to earn good time by working. Because of this, my sentence has been extended by six months. And even in voluntary segrega-

tion, safety is still an issue. Complaints to officials appear to fall on deaf ears."

An inmate from Comstock Correctional Institution, New York, states that "On June 9th I wrote a letter to security with an outline of my problems, and requesting 'Protection.' I was moved to the protection block Monday afternoon; but on Wednesday I was told that 'Superintendent's Proceedings' had denied my request. I was then returned to C-7 block. Only last night I was informed that I had lost my job assignment as 'Inventory Clerk' in the lower store house. The reason given was that I was too 'vulnerable' in that position. A further example of the harassment that I am taking at the hands of the administration. Frankly, I can't help but think that their [security's] action this week stems from a prejudice view with regard to my homosexuality."

It's obvious that the prison system does not see gays as fully human and having basic human rights. Gays are treated as the lowest inmates in the prison system, and as such, gay prisoners have even fewer "rights" than straight prisoners. They are labeled immediately "faggot" or "dyke," and sus-



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pected by both straight inmates and the prison system.

Despite promises by the Federal Bureau of Prisons, reports increase showing that gay inmates are not allowed to receive gay male and lesbian publications and newsletters from organizations of interest to these prisoners.

One of the best ways to combat the inadequacies and inhumanities in our prison systems that both gays and straights face as well as the additional problems that lesbian and gay male inmates are confronted with, is to *write*. Corresponding with a gay prisoner—personal mail is unbothered as long as it is free of "suspicious" inserts—will give that inmate a sense that someone knows, cares, and that we are all willing to fight for his or her rights as a human being. Also, letters of protest to government representatives of the prison systems as well as key legislators can also have a beneficial effect. Remember, writing back is a way of fighting back.

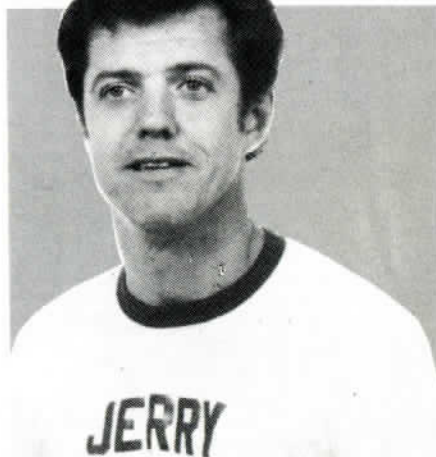
