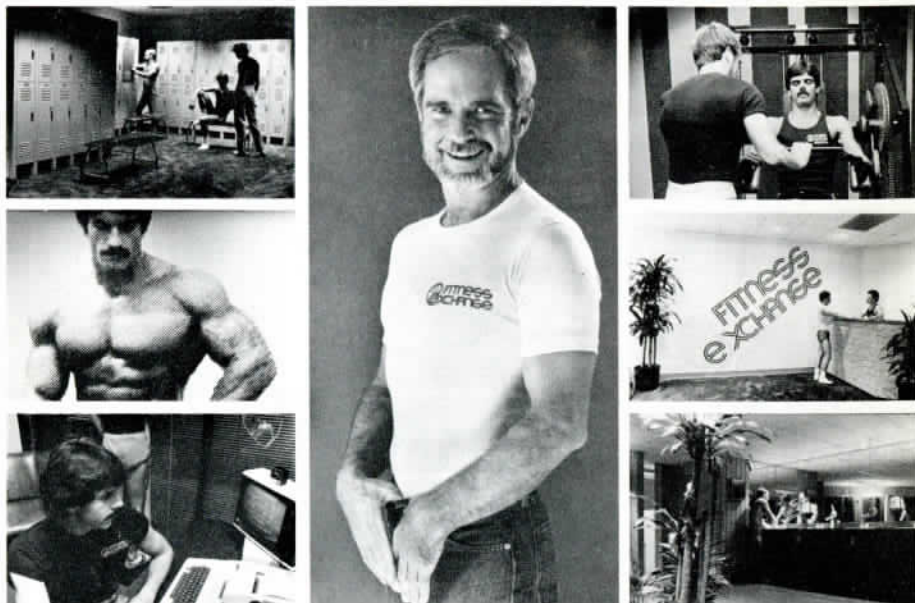

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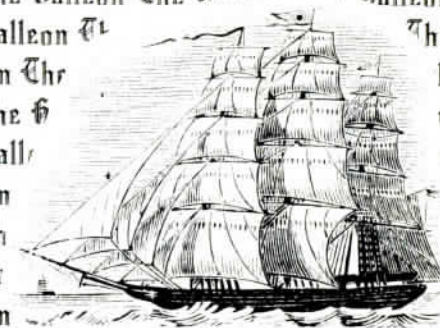

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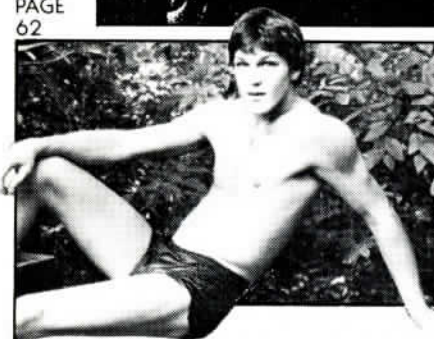

GAY NIGHT AT CITY COUNCIL

HOUSTON — On Tuesday, October 21, the Houston City Council will have one of their scheduled meetings. The Council will convene at 7:00pm, and the Gay Political Caucus has designated this session as Gay Night at City Council.

Everyone is encouraged to participate or at least come and observe our city government in action. For those who wish to address the Council, you must call the City Secretary at (713) 222-3301 to secure a three-minute time period in which to be heard.

Reservations for one to be placed on the agenda will be taken up to 5:00pm, **TWT NEWS** was told.

"This is our opportunity to show City Council that the gay community is concerned about and how local government operates. Therefore a strong showing of lesbians and gay men is urged," reminds Kent Speer, Press Liaison of the HGPC.

NEW PHOENIX PORN LAW

PHOENIX, AZ — A city ordinance which took effect last July requires adult theater owners to remodel their film booths so police can completely see the patrons watching the movies inside. U.S. District Court Judge Carl Muecke upheld the ordinance when he dismissed a suit filed by Ellwest Stereo, Inc., challenging the constitutionality of the law, reports *The Scene* to **TWT NEWS**.

Ellwest Stereo, Inc., operates 20 coin-operated machines showing sex films. It filed suit after being denied a license because it refused to remodel.

The city's attorneys argued that being more visible to police did not deprive the patrons of their right to view the

films. According to facts in the case, Phoenix police made more than 783 indecent exposure and other sex offense arrests at Phoenix film houses last year.

Judge Muecke agreed with the city attorneys in the case, stating his belief that because of the ordinance, the First Amendment rights of neither the customers nor the operators "have been chilled."

TEXAS LEADS IN POLICE BRUTALITY

WASHINGTON, DC — It comes as no surprise to gay men and lesbians who have all too often been victims of police harassment in Houston, Dallas, and other Texas cities, that Texas leads the nation in the number of alleged police brutality cases.

This shocking news has just been revealed by the Justice Department which is conducting 194 "active investigations" of alleged police brutality in Texas.

California, with a population almost double that of Texas, comes in second while New York, also much more populous than Texas, has the fourth largest number of investigations.

A considerably less populous state, Louisiana, is third in police brutality allegations under investigation.

The vast majority of cases under investigation by the department's Civil Rights Division are related to alleged police use of excessive force, department spokesman John Wilson said.

Of 1,600 active civil rights investigations nationwide, 1,476 are based on police brutality allegations. Of the 1,476 there are 194 cases in Texas, 125 in California, 114 in Louisiana and 90 in New York. The next highest numbers of cases are in Florida, 72; Georgia, 51; Tennessee, 50; Massachusetts, 47; Pennsylvania, 42; and Illinois, 41. ➤

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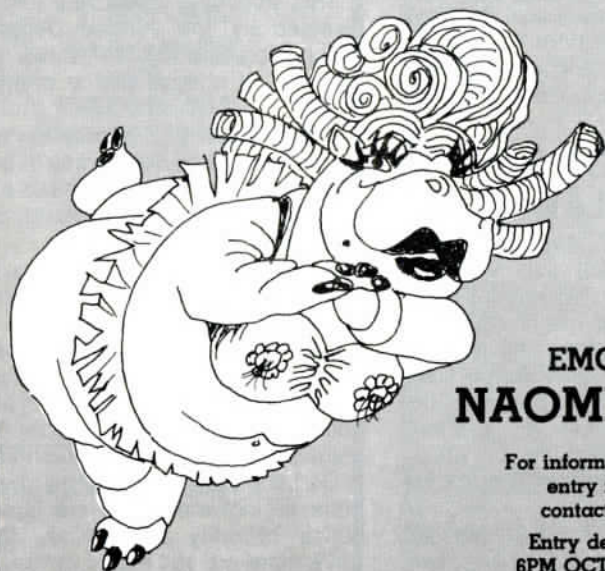
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Statistics are not available by individual police departments or by race of the victim, because the department bases its records on the 95 federal judicial districts in the nation.

In mid-1978, however, the department did a special analysis which showed more probes of police abuse of Hispanics in Texas than any other state.

Although police abuse of minorities has been a focal point of civil rights groups for years, the Justice Department's investigations involve victims of all races and ethnic groups.

They are based on the section of federal civil rights law that prohibits "acting under color of law" to deprive a person of civil rights. The offense is a misdemeanor, unless it results in death, in which case it is a felony.

Texas has historically led all states in numbers of police brutality investigations, Wilson said.

Since 1939, when the department started the record-keeping system it

uses today, there have been 10,682 police brutality investigations in Texas, more than any other state, Wilson said.

He said the Southern Judicial District, headquartered in Houston, has had the most investigations of any district in the nation since 1939, with a cumulative total of 3,124 cases investigated. In addition to Houston, the district includes the Rio Grande Valley and the middle and lower gulf Coast, stretching to Laredo.

Two other Texas judicial districts are next highest in the nation in cases investigated since 1939. They are the Northern District headquartered in Dallas, with 2,592 cases, and the Eastern District headquartered in Beaumont, with 2,591 cases.

Next are a district in Louisiana and one in Florida, followed in sixth place by the Western District of Texas, headquartered in Austin and including San Antonio.

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BAUMAN ADMITS TO GAY TENDENCIES

EASTON, MD — As reported last week in TWT NEWS, [Vol. 6, No. 29], Rep. Robert Bauman, R-Md., has been accused of soliciting sex from a 16-year-old boy. In his first public statement since his court appearance last week, Bauman acknowledged "homosexual tendencies", but said "I do not feel myself to be a homosexual."

Bauman, a conservative, has vowed to stay in the race for a fourth term in the House of Representatives, however, the Republican National Committee has decided that it will not give Bauman any financial assistance for his campaign.

James Edward Regina, 26, of Fishing Creek, Md., has been arraigned in

Baltimore on charges of trying to extort \$2,000 from Bauman by threatening to expose a homosexual relationship with the congressman.

Prosecutors said Regina called and wrote Bauman last month, promising to leave the country and not reveal the alleged relationship if Bauman would give him the money. An FBI agent, posing as a member of the congressman's staff, made the arrest.

Flanked by his wife Carol, and the Rev. John Harvey, a priest who has been counseling him, Bauman, 43, made his first public statement since he pleaded innocent to sex solicitation last week in Washington.

"I have suffered from homosexual tendencies although I do not feel myself to be a homosexual," Bauman told reporters. He said the "twin compulsions" of alcoholism and homosexual tendencies were too much for him to handle.

Bauman would not say whether he actually committed homosexual acts

or patronized the gay bars of the nation's capitol, TWT NEWS learned.

ARTISTS IN NEW GALVESTON PROGRAM

GALVESTON — Five talented artists have been brought to Galveston this fall to participate in the Galveston Country Cultural Arts Council's Artist-in-the-Schools program.

A cooperative effort between the Arts Council, the Galveston Independent School District (GISD), the National Endowment for the Arts and the Texas Commission on the Arts, the AIS program is an educational project designed to introduce students to the arts while providing artists with regular employment and personal development opportunities.

The artists are used in the schools as resource people, helping not only to introduce students to the various art forms, but aiding in integrating the skills used in these art forms into the

learning process.

The Arts Council is local sponsor for the program, coordinating resources and needs with the administration of the Galveston School District.

"The philosophy of the program," said Kim Bryce, Arts Council project coordinator to TWT NEWS, "is to aid professional artists and make them an integral part of the community by placing them in the schools."

THE DEMOCRATIC GAY CAUCUS WIN

HOUSTON — It's taken four years, notes TWT NEWS, but the Gay Democratic Caucus has finally won in trying to get Texas Democrats to vote on record at a convention in support of the repeal of an anti-homosexual section of the Texas Penal Code.

That penal code is 21.06, the sodomy law. The law prohibits "deviant sexual behavior" between two consenting

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adults in the privacy of their own home. Despite pleas from conservatives who said local democratic candidates and President Carter would be harmed in the November election, the repeal support was included in the platform.

The roll call vote came at the recent Democratic State Convention held at Hofheinz Pavilion on the University of Houston campus on Saturday, September 27.

The vote was 1,922 to 1,609; although only about 500 people were in the pavilion hall at the time of the vote, notes TWT NEWS.

"It means that we've accepted another group and we welcome them," said outgoing State Democratic Executive Committee member Dick Solo of Dallas.

Bob Beckel, Carter's Texas coordinator, stressed the Carter-Mondale re-election committee was not involved in the formulation of the state platform.

"This was a Texas Democratic battle," Beckel said. "I do not believe it will hurt because there are a lot more controversial issues than this."

Newly elected state chairman Bob Slagle, who probably lost votes in his election because he favored repeal of the anti-homosexual Section 21.06, also said he did not believe local candidates or Carter would be hurt by the provision.

"People look at the platform on the overall," Slagle said. "We can all find things in the platform we don't like."

But D.A. Brazwell of Big Spring, who argues against the provision, said before the vote, "You're going to bring all the churches of Texas down on Jimmy Carter if it goes in there (the platform)."

NEW OFFICERS ELECTED

AUSTIN — The Austin Lesbian/Gay Democrats of Texas have elected new officers. Scotty Scott and Steve Thomas have been elected co-Chairs. Janna Zumbrun is the new Recorder. All three are from Austin.

Meanwhile, ALGPC has acquired a new telephone number. The new

number is (512) 478-8653. This is also the same number as Austin Lambda. Both organizations are using the same phone number "for convenience and financial resource," reports spokesman Gary Fitzsimmons, to TWT NEWS.

ANITA FINDS STRIFE IN TULSA

TULSA, OK — Anita Bryant has grown accustomed to promoting oranges, campaigning against homosexuals and living in a 34-room mansion staffed with servants. Now she is divorced, has given up preaching, is considering career alternatives and living in a modest rented home with her four children.

The adjustment hasn't been easy, she told UPI News.

Miss Bryant returned to her hometown this summer after her much-publicized divorce from her manager, Bob Green, in Florida.

"I prayed a lot about it (the Tulsa move) for some time," she said. "I knew it would be difficult making all the arrangements—getting a house, finding a school for the children and in a sense, starting all over again—but it has been an enjoyable experience. I'm just sorry I didn't get back here sooner."

The former Miss Oklahoma and spokeswoman for the Florida Citrus Growers said she has not decided if she will continue public appearances or "retire." She told the *Tulsa Tribune* she is scheduled to make a few secular appearances, and money from those performances will provide her with some income.

"Maybe I'll give it all up, totally retire," she said. "Maybe I'll concentrate on just a few things. Or maybe I'll get an agent and go whole hog into a new career, but I'm not too enthusiastic about that right now."

Learning to run a household without a housekeeper and a private secretary has been a challenge, she said.

"Things like shopping, doing the

dishes, cleaning the house—it takes a lot of readjusting but I'm getting there. I've lost all my nails by now, darn it. Some things like paying bills and going to the bank and getting loans are new to me, but I was raised to fend for myself so I'll get by."

One of the key reasons for returning to Tulsa was so her children, Bobby, 17, Gloria, 16, and the twins, Billy and Barbara, 11, can be "here with family and friends."

"They (her children) are the most important people in my life," she said. "There isn't anything I wouldn't do for them, and I think the most important thing I can do for them right now is give them a normal life in school away from any distractions."

FOUR ON TRIAL IN LA FREEWAY MURDERS

LOS ANGELES — Four men who allegedly operated together, are now awaiting trial on 14 murder counts, and one of them is suspect in as many as 21 killings of young boys.

One of those accused is a truck driver, William Bonin, 33, charged with killing 14 of the young boys. He had been arrested before and was sent to a state mental hospital for sex offenses with young boys. But, he was released.

Another of those accused is a factory worker, Vernon Butts, 23. He is an amateur magician who likes to dress up in a Darth Vader costume.

Another is a drifter, James Munro. He is from Port Huron, Michigan.

Gregory Matthew Miley, 19, a Houstonian, is accused of two killings and sodomy. He has been described as mentally retarded.

All four have pleaded innocent, **TWT NEWS** has been informed. If they are convicted, they could face the death penalty.

A group of California parents have formed a movement entitled "Victim," since their sons were all victims of the freeway killers. They hope to put an initiative on the California ballot which would tighten sex-crime laws.

The Freeway Killers are responsible

for the murders of 41 teen-age boys. Their young bodies were found dumped near freeways throughout a five-county area.

IOWA GAYS, BARS HIT BY VIOLENCE, ARSON

DES MOINES, IA — Local law enforcement authorities are at a loss for an explanation for a recent rash of homophobic events in which individuals and gay business establishments, particularly bars, have suffered injurious damage to person and property. The chief prosecutor for the county, Dan Johnston, suggests that the incidents are either anti-gay harassment by straights or a particularly vicious round of infighting between gays seeking to control bar business in the city.

Police and fire department records of which **TWT NEWS** has been made aware show that there have been a fire, a shooting and three assaults at the Country Cove Tap Room and Dance Hall.

Near-misses by oncoming automobiles and gunfire in the streets have been reported by individual gays. Gays also report the occurrence of beatings and stabbings in the section of Des Moines where the Cove bar is located.

CHURCH OF CHRIST OPENS NEW CHURCH

HOUSTON — Excited members of the Montrose Church of Christ have happily announced the opening of their new facility at 520K Westheimer. Members sighted this to be a giant leap forward as they move from being a "house church" to a church with a specific address, serving a particular neighborhood.

The congregation was formed this year to fill the void caused by the non-acceptance of gays by area churches of Christ, **TWT NEWS** was told.

Gay Night At City Council

Dear TWT:

Did Fred Paez die in vain?

Once again we have a situation where the only witnesses are two Houston police officers and a dead man. It now seems unlikely that either police officer will be charged and brought to trial. As a community we must not sit back and accept this constant directed violence.

What would Fred Paez say? Fred, as his friends remember him, rarely thought of himself, he was always concerned with other people and how he could help them. If Fred could speak to us now, he would be less concerned with revenge and more concerned with preventing future murder and violence. We must pursue justice as far as we can in the Fred Paez case, but we must look beyond.

With a police force that refuses to allow instruction about homosexuality in their academy, with a police force that refuses to screen out homophobic officers, with a police force that refuses to hire homosexuals, we can expect neither protection nor justice.

But the police are subject to the authority of the Mayor and City Council. We helped to elect both the Mayor and members of the Houston City Council—it is time that we collect our dues. It is time that we petition for redress of the wrongs committed against us, it is time that we demand reform within the police force and the passage of a civil rights ordinance.

The City Council called for a night meeting October 14. It was only a coincidence that that happened to be the anniversary of the March on Washington, but it was a coincidence that could not be ignored and the Gay Political Caucus declared October 14 to be Gay Night at the City Council.

Unfortunately, the meeting was postponed to October 21, but the GPC reaffirmed its declaration and is encouraging all members of the community to attend the City Council

meeting at 7:00pm on October 21. Those who wish to address the Houston City Council can do so by calling (713) 222-3301 by 5:00pm, Oct. 21 to reserve their three minutes.

Let us show the Mayor, the City Council and the media that we are united in our demands for justice, freedom and equality. Neil Isbin

Feminist Perspective on Networking

The following DGPC COMMENT was written by Cynthia Rutledge who is the president of the Dallas County Chapter of the National Organization for Women.

Dear DGPC:

Usually, people who become politically active tend to get involved over an issue that is important to them. Then they branch out into related issues and, after a time, can see that a myriad of other areas they never considered at first are all related to an overall political and social ideology.

This is why feminists in Dallas have, in recent months, been active in the questions of a civilian review board for our police department, nuclear energy, and the housing shortage, among others.

The Dallas Gay Political Caucus and the Dallas chapters of the National Organization for Women recently worked together, with other groups, in a counter rally to the Reagan political rally (masquerading as a religious seminar) in Reunion Arena. The National Affairs Briefing, larger than both the Democratic and Republican conventions combined, publicized opposition to such basic needs as freedom of choice, day care for children, equal civil rights under the law for women and gays, and separation of church and state.

Both the *Moral Majority* convention and Reagan's popularity are symptomatic of our country's shift to the right. Many people think this is because we are in times of stress—threats of war, high rates of ➤

unemployment and inflation, and dwindling natural resources—and the gains won in easier times are now being taken away under pressure from mostly a WASP-male type of mentality which believes that there is simply not enough to go around, and, by God, *they* are not the group that is going to suffer. When there are not enough jobs, not enough houses, not enough money to go around, it is the minorities which suffer—the racial minorities, the minorities of labor union members, and the minorities of oppressed classes such as women; all added together actually form *majorities*. Should we all, as minority groups, unite, we may be able to resist the “take-backs” we see nibbling at our gains.

We need to unite *now*.

We need to network so that we can inform each other of our actions and concerns, and support each other. When we form coalitions, our base of power is more diverse and solid, and larger. When one group can put out a call to another that they trust and have worked with, all parties benefit.

If a few people go to the trouble of organizing a public display of something we all believe in, surely it is very little trouble for the rest of us to turn out for a couple of hours to increase our numbers and show our support. The recent Thinking Majority rally at Lee Park is a case in point. Although the coalition included many groups, those in attendance were primarily DGPC or NOW people. If either group had meant to go and never got there, or just had not gotten the word out to their members, the number of people at the rally would have been at least a third smaller. Both groups can be proud of our collective turn-out there.

This is not merely a tactic, it is a sharing of interests and learning experiences and support. The broadening of outlooks and perspectives will lead to personal and political growth. With an open mind and a will to work, members of many different groups in Dallas can coalesce into the broad base of a network with enormous power.

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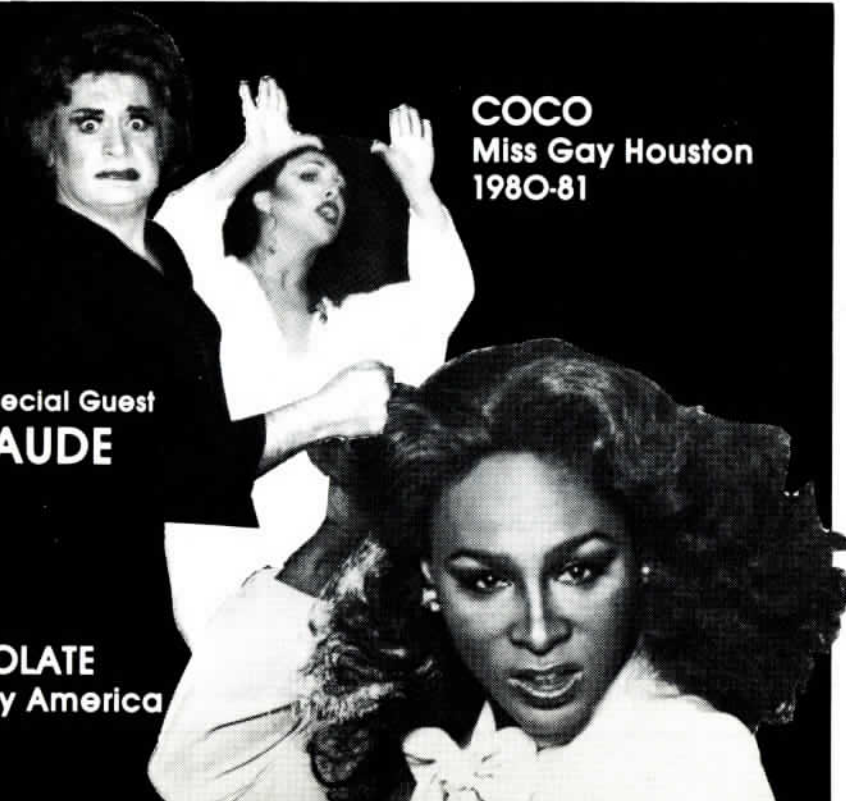

Thank you for calling my District Office in Fort Worth requesting information on my vote on the Legal Services Corporation appropriations.

I voted in favor of Congressman McDonald's amendment to the State-Justice Appropriations bill, H.R. 7584 which states that "no part of this appropriation shall be used by the Legal Services Corporation to provide legal assistance in promoting, defending or protecting homosexuality". 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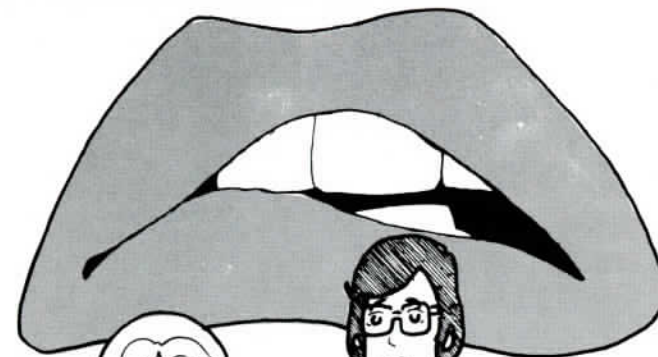


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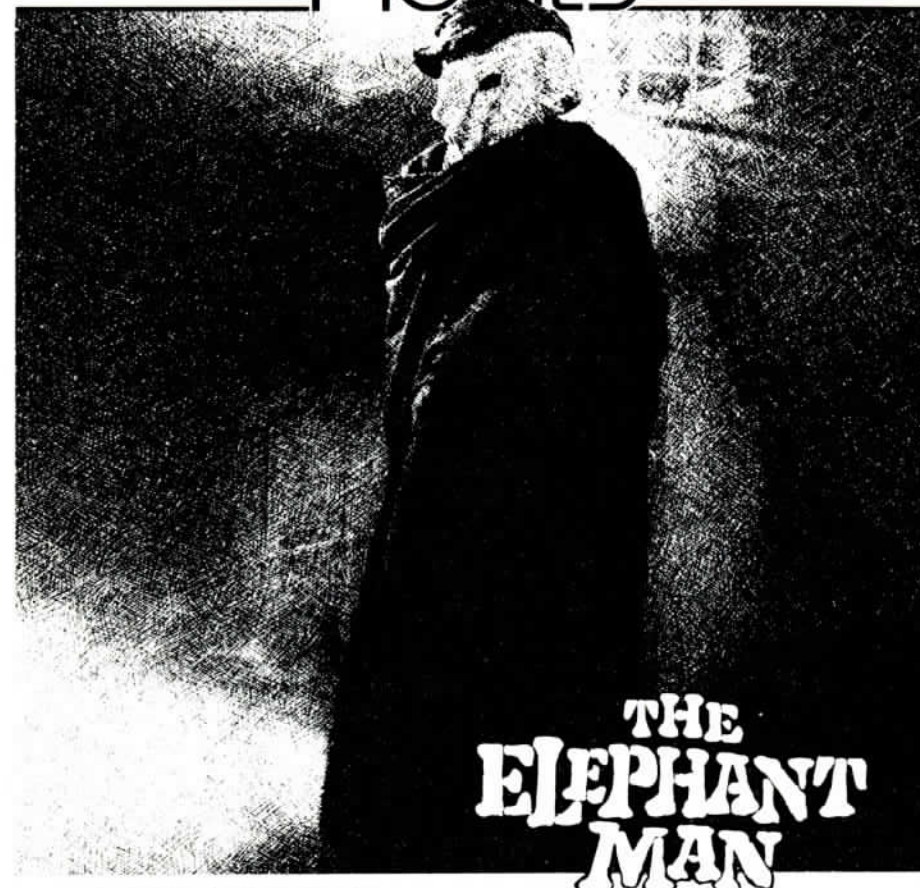
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MOVIES

Barraged with the emotional impact of how cruel people can be when they are frightened by what they don't understand, *The Elephant Man* stands out as a very moving, poignant screen experience.

Set in the Victorian age of old London, *The Elephant Man* is the true-life story of John Merrick, who, because of his grotesque, deformed outward appearance, is used as a circus freak in a sideshow. This superbly, well-presented film evokes and stirs the emotions to a level of human compassion that reaches the heart of the

viewer in an overwhelming way! The fact that it is photographed in black and white adds a sense of reality to the already real story, and it enhances the richness of the characters and their emotions.

An excellent cast is headed by Anthony Hopkins, (previously seen in *Audrey Rose* and *Magic*), who plays the understanding and sensitive Dr. Treves, who rescues the Elephant Man from a life of degradation and despair.

John Hurt, originally seen in *Midnight Express* and the upcoming

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Heaven's Gate, gives a strong and compelling performance as John Merrick. Hurt plays this pathetic and extremely kind character with such depth and insight that at times the audience forgets that indeed this person really did exist!

Anne Bancroft is Mrs. Kendal, the toast of theatrical society, who is moved to acceptance and complete appreciation of the Elephant Man, because of her being a true artist in every sense. She sees what is really beautiful in life (inner beauty) and immediately befriends him without hesitation.

Finally, the illustrious performances of Sir John Gielgud as Mr. Carr Gomm, Chairman of the London Hospital, and Wendy Hiller in the role of Mothershead, Hospital Head Matron, complete this well-acted cast of characters.

All in all, the cast assembled for this often tragic, but true account, demonstrates how love and acceptance and most important—human kindness—can help give even the most lowly of pariahs, moments of happiness and respect.

Please see *The Elephant Man* and realize how important the one outstanding quality of a human being's life is about—human dignity.

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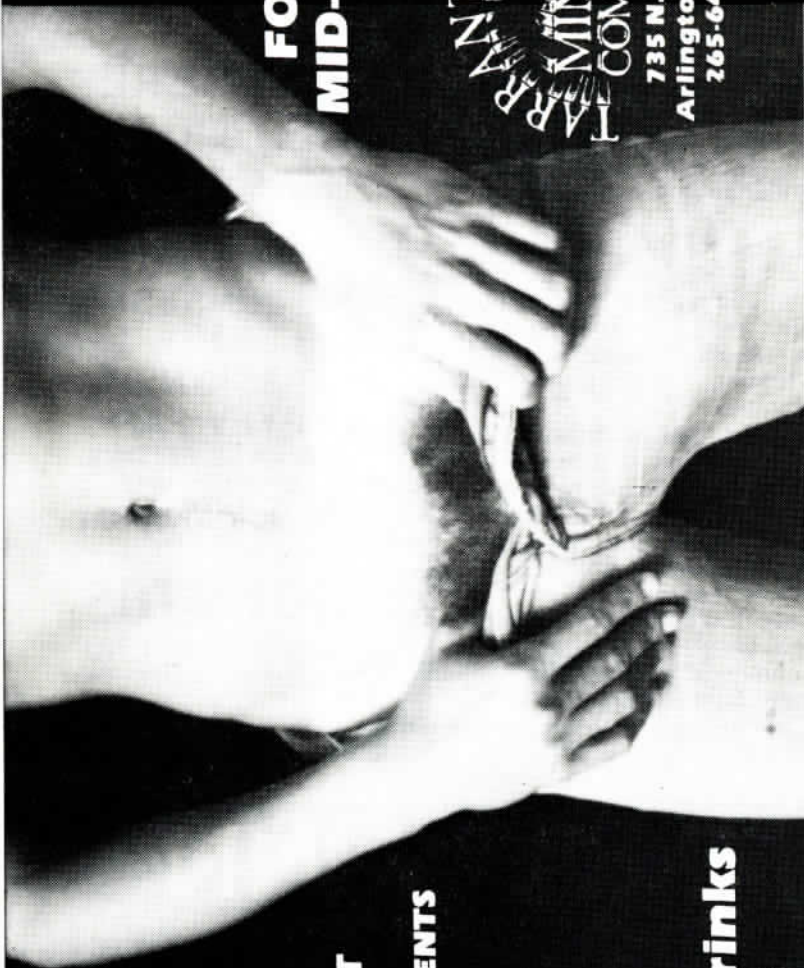
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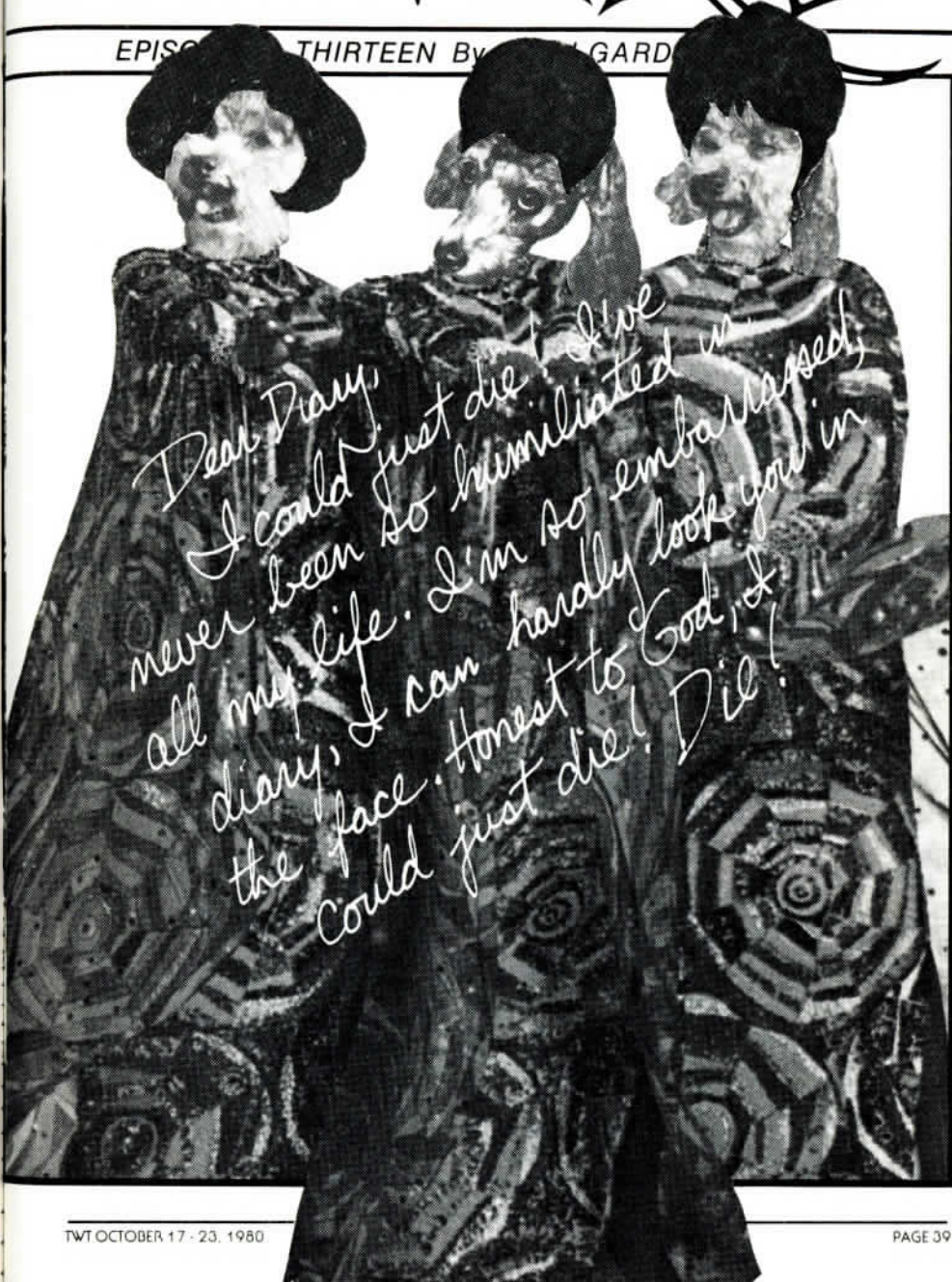
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EPISODE THIRTEEN BY GARD

Letters From Mary Anne

I
From dusty windows, nighttime blue liquidates to vibrant pink and orange. Soon, the sun will paint the desert yellow and flood its kingdom with summer madness. Lizards will fly on air cushions from mesquite to mesquite. Sometimes they will pause on still, cool desert rocks, become stone for a moment, and return to their rapid flight of anywhere destination. They are like my dreams, dried hard visions that are prone to hesitation and indecision.

The sun will cast shadows behind desert bushes and yucca. It will peek in rattlesnake holes, but will never dare enter. It will wrap around stones and pebbles and pierce the desert sand with brave brilliance. It will return the pale brick of buildings and dirty gray of streets to the waking city. Then it will bounce skyward, but no one will ever see.

There are so many things that people do not see. Some of it is not their fault, but much of it is. They sleep, and some of them never see a sunrise; they never see the night become another day, the slow turning of dark into light.

I start my days early with journal en-

try, the *El Paso Times*, and orange juice. As the sun rises, I practice *hatha yoga*, the sun salutation from Eastern religions. My body pulls and stretches skin; I release the peaceful dreams through my flesh in hopes they will come true.

A mountain range rests along the eastern horizon. Sometimes, when the sun rises just as it did today, I can see right through one mountain into nothing. It is a mountain peak suspended in the cool morning air. On days when this happens, very little will go wrong.

Outside, the early morning calm is heavy with wetness. The landlord waters the green bermuda canvas in the evening before he goes to sleep. It is better for the grass, he says; they have the night to drink and be happy; during the day, the sun dries drink so quickly. Last spring, I planted a rose bush outside my door. At first, Mr. Everett protested it was against his policy. But I promised upkeep and gentle care of the fragile roses, and to prove my sincerity, took special care in grooming the potted plants inside my polished windows. He complimented the trapped greenery and agreed to let me plant the thorned rose bush. ➤

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The roses are gone now because it is summer and they cannot stand the southwestern summer sun. In April, tiny buds transformed to brilliant red flowers. Mr. Everett said they were beautiful and they were like children because their beauty was short-lived. By early May, the soft petals dried and dropped delicately to the ground. For a while, the bush was sad, but it soon grew stronger under sun and water, anticipating next spring when the buds would once again bleed beauty.

Roses remind me of Mary Anne. She was the first rose in spring who appeared suddenly out of cold, hard earth. She penetrated winter's silence with her own quiet revolution and affirmation to spring. She was beautiful, and I wanted so much to pluck and place her in an equally beautiful vase I saved for special flowers. I wanted to lock her between pages of exquisite poetry upon my bookshelf. But, even my own greed would not allow me to stifle and deny her freedom. At dawn, I

let her reach for the sun, and at night, she slept with the moon.

It was hard to imagine that anyone like Mary Anne existed. In Texas, all the women wore Levis and western blouses, or they bragged southwestern tans through shorts and halter tops with printed flowers and plaids. They swooned over any male over five-foot-nine who ignored them, and laughed robustly at the little awkward men who stumbled over words. They were a cruel breed and were at home in the harsh desert climate.

But Mary Anne was misplaced; she was a rose unsuited to the west. She was accustomed to New England springs where roses were not forced, but appeared in the scheme of things. She was transplanted during the summer of her sixteenth year, from Boston to El Paso. At first, she hid from the sun, but the following spring I found her in delicate rose-petal beauty. It was the spring e.e. cummings promised in



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his child-like poetry. The nights were beautiful and warm, and each day we discovered new secrets together.

She was unlike the other girls who grew up in El Paso. She draped dresses over her alabaster skin and placed flowers in her auburn hair. She was gentle and spoke in whispers of the desert's passion, of the piercing sun that hurt her delicate skin, of the improbability of learning anything at all in public schools—especially in one where so many knew so little and cared even less. *Why, some had never even read the Alice books, she said, much less ever been there.* Everyone else failed to understand her; but I saw the innocent wisdom beyond her subtle beauty. She was the princess from a fairy tale, and I would be the frog she turned into a prince. We were destined to live happily ever after.

Then she returned to Boston, and dreams shattered. I could no longer step through the looking-glass. Instead, shiny fragments lay like crumbs beneath the table. They were like broken tea cups drowning in tainted tea.

On good days, I will get a letter from Mary Anne. She will give analogies between friendship and the sun. Then she will contrast between Boston and the desert sun, how she once knew greater and more passionate friendships in El Paso. She will sometimes write a poem comparing me to a desert flower. She longs to die in the saffron fire of my love, she says, but cannot grasp through cruel thorns. She will say that I was the springtime in her life, that I was the sun who flooded her world with warmth and springtime magic. And she will write of how she mourned when I left her at the end of the day, but soon realized that she was better suited to the ethereal moonlight and stars. She will write me of how well she is doing in school, that she loves her field of study, and though the people are not as warm as El Paso, they too are understanding and will get used to her oddities just as we did. On good days, I look forward to her letters.

II

I am wearing tight pants that squeeze every muscle and a burgundy satin shirt buttoned halfway up my chest. Sexuality oozes through heavy denim; and still-young bodyhairs glisten black over tight southwestern skin. The old men look hopefully to the young men, but their arrogance and their confidence are cruel. The young men are in love with mirrors; they are in love with the men who look like their reflections. It is sameness: the young wear tight pants and fashioned shirts, the young go home with the young. In this world, the old man is forgotten.

There are macho studs in faded Levis, leather boots, and plaid western shirts that burst through enormous chests. There are campy queens in black polyester knits, white silky shirts, and creamed and powdered faces. There are elegant drag queens who could pass for a different breed of dyke. It is like the flower garden; anyone may pick a flower if he can grasp through cruel thorns.

It is the Old Plantation in El Paso. But it could be any gay bar anywhere. The games are still the same.

I brace against the tall white column, take another long swallow from a phallic bottle of Michelob. Somebody is watching me. He looks comfortable in white, an angel to save me from the temptations of evil. He looks American—tossed straw hair, benevolent blue eyes, fair Norwegian skin. He smiles. I turn away and down another long swallow of beer. It is hard not to look, harder not to desire, but in my youth I am naive and ignorant of the big boys' games. I cannot smile, nor even stand without the hard white column behind me. I am destined to drink more drunk, destined to slur my thoughts more senseless.

It is you, Mary, you and your damned knife that split the distance between us, your damned letters that make me want you and turn me loose when you have me. Your words bounce like neon lights and flashing strobe. They sting, I

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do not wish to make you want me anymore, but each time—with each swallow of bitter beer, each flash of blinding light and pounding beat of disco bass—they sting a little less. The surrealistic atmosphere numbs my senses; in a few more beers, I will not care.

The young American slips to the bar and pulls a Camel from his pocket. He asks the bartender for a light, wraps his rose pink lips around the miniature white phallus, inhales, and exhales colorful gray smoke. Each movement is exaggerated, and he stares at me with stoned blue eyes. He smiles. This time, I smile and nod my head in his direction.

The words still echo cruelly. It is difficult to tell them from the lights and sounds. Everything is happily mixed, and I am happily drunk. *I am the sun, goddammit, and you are the rose. I will pick every one of you from the bush, wear you to the theater, place you in glass bottles, between dying pages of*

poetry. The rest, I will burn with intense heat. *I will save the dry, ugly red petals and lock them in the envelopes of your letters. In winter, they will burn again; they will be ashes and cold winter smoke escaping through chimneys. Then, your letters will be dead, and there won't be anymore roses in my life. The looking-glass and windows will no longer be tinted.*

The young man from the bar approaches and places small hands upon my waist. His name is Kevin, he says, and smiles; his straw moustache brushes stiffly over my cheek and lips. He smells of summer nights.

It was your words I loved and your roses and your silent understanding. I am essential to your soul, and now you will burn.

My hands reach to feel his face, to feel the summer twilight of his cool blue eyes. He smiles through pink, rose petal lips and pulls my body deep in his.

It is summer, and I surrender.▼



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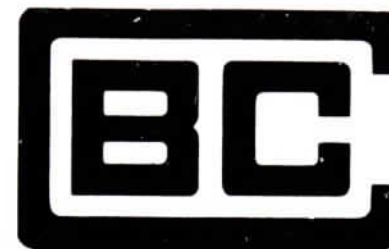
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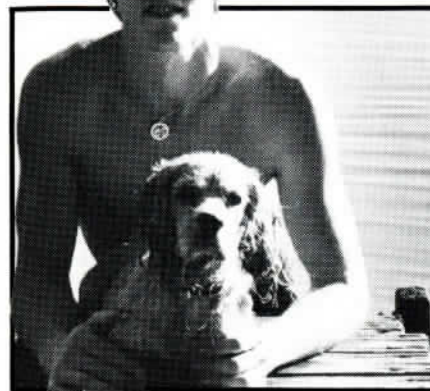

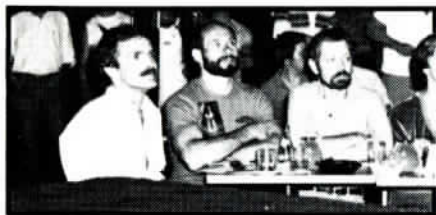
